Sunday, February 14, 2021 Transfiguration of Our Lord

Happy Valentine's Day! Today we gather to conclude the Epiphany season with The Transfiguration of our Lord festival Sunday! This day in the church always precedes the beginning of Lent/Ash Wednesday. This Sunday, the Transfiguration is the second time we have recorded Scripture of God speaking.

At the Baptism of our Lord Sunday, back in January, we heard God speak over Jesus after the Lord is baptized. God said: "You are my Son, my beloved, with whom I am well pleased." (Mark 1:11). Today Jesus has gone up on a mountaintop (think more like a large hill) and goes with Peter, James and John.

At this place Jesus is "transfigured" or is "glowing" (another way to see it) and Peter wants to build three tents to stay there and enjoy the mountain top experience. At this point we hear God speak over the Lord: "This is my Son, whom I love, listen to Him." (Mark 9:7).

They all have this mountain top experience and then the Bible reports there was a great crowd waiting for them. They had to come down the mountain and into the valley where people were waiting for them. This is our task as well. We come off of the "mountain top" of worship and celebrate God's love into the "valley" of everyday life. People are waiting for us, they need to know they are loved by God, they are forgiven, and peace is within reach. Let's go into the Lenten season open to how God will "transfigure" us and change us, and lift us, and wash us in baptismal grace. Let's listen to God's Words to us: "This is my son/daughter, whom I love and I am well pleased with, listen to them!"

INTRODUCTION

The Sundays after Epiphany began with Jesus' baptism and end with three disciples' vision of his transfiguration. In Mark's story of Jesus' baptism, apparently only Jesus sees the Spirit descending and hears the words from heaven. But now Jesus' three closest friends hear the same words naming him God's Beloved. As believers, Paul writes, we are enabled to see the God-light in Jesus' face, because the same God who created light in the first place has shone in our hearts to give us that vision. The light of God's glory in Jesus has enlightened us through baptism and shines in us also for others to see.

WORD

First Reading: 2 Kings 2:1-12

Today's reading centers on the transfer of power and authority from the prophet Elijah to Elisha. Their travels, which retrace the path of Joshua back to Moab (the place where Moses died) and the parting of the waters, demonstrate that Elisha and Elijah are legitimate successors of the great prophet Moses.

I Now when the Lord was about to take Elijah up to heaven by a whirlwind, Elijah and Elisha were on their way from Gilgal. 2 Elijah said to Elisha, "Stay here; for the Lord has sent me as far as Bethel." But Elisha said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they went down to Bethel. 3 The company of prophets who were in Bethel came out to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the Lord will take your master away from you?" And he said, "Yes, I know; keep silent."

- 4 Elijah said to him, "Elisha, stay here; for the Lord has sent me to Jericho." But he said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they came to Jericho. 5 The company of prophets who were at Jericho drew near to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the Lord will take your master away from you?" And he answered, "Yes, I know; be silent."
- 6 Then Elijah said to him, "Stay here; for the Lord has sent me to the Jordan." But he said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So the two of them went on. 7 Fifty men of the company of prophets also went, and stood at some distance from them, as they both were standing by the Jordan. 8 Then Elijah took his mantle and rolled it up, and struck the water; the water was parted to the one side and to the other, until the two of them crossed on dry ground.
- 9 When they had crossed, Elijah said to Elisha, "Tell me what I may do for you, before I am taken from you." Elisha said, "Please let me inherit a double share of your spirit." 10 He responded, "You have asked a hard thing; yet, if you see me as I am being taken from you, it will be granted you; if not, it will not." 11 As they continued walking and talking, a chariot of fire and horses of fire separated the two of them, and Elijah ascended in a whirlwind into heaven. 12 Elisha kept watching and crying out, "Father, father! The chariots of Israel and its horsemen!" But when he could no longer see him, he grasped his own clothes and tore them in two pieces.

Psalm: Psalm 50:1-6

Out of Zion, perfect in beauty, God shines forth in glory. (Ps. 50:2)

- 1 The mighty one, God the Lord, has spoken; calling the earth from the rising of the sun to its setting.
- 2 Out of Zion, perfect in its beauty, God shines forth in glory.
- 3 Our God will come and will not keep silence; with a consuming flame before, and round about a raging storm.
- 4 God calls the heavens and the earth from above to witness the judgment of the people.
- 5 "Gather before me my loyal followers, those who have made a covenant with me and sealed it with sacrifice."
- 6 The heavens declare the rightness of God's cause, for it is God who is judge.

Second Reading: 2 Corinthians 4:3-6

The spotlight of Christian ministry is not on the people who carry out ministry but on the Lord Jesus Christ. Just as God made light shine at creation, God makes the light of Jesus Christ shine in our lives through Christian ministry.

3 Even if our gospel is veiled, it is veiled to those who are perishing. 4 In their case the god of this world has blinded the minds of the unbelievers, to keep them from seeing the light of the gospel of the glory of Christ, who is the image of God. 5 For we do not proclaim ourselves; we proclaim Jesus Christ as Lord and ourselves as your slaves for Jesus' sake. 6 For it is the God who said, "Let light shine out of darkness," who has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.

The word of the Lord, thanks be to God.

Gospel: Mark 9:2-9

Mark's gospel presents the transfiguration as a preview of what would become apparent to Jesus' followers after he rose from the dead. Confused disciples are given a vision of God's glory manifest in the beloved Son.

2 Six days later, Jesus took with him Peter and James and John, and led them up a high mountain apart, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, 3 and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them. 4 And there appeared to them Elijah with Moses, who were talking with Jesus. 5 Then Peter said to Jesus, "Rabbi, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." 6 He did not know what to say, for they were terrified. 7 Then a cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud there came a voice, "This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!" 8 Suddenly when they looked around, they saw no one with them any more, but only Jesus.

9 As they were coming down the mountain, he ordered them to tell no one about what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead.

The Gospel of our Lord, praise to you, O Christ.



CHILDREN'S MESSAGE

SERMON

In 1995 I was invited by members of my church to attend a Via de Cristo weekend. I had never heard of it and wasn't sure it was for me, so I declined. That was in the spring of that year, that fall I attended a Via de Cristo weekend.

The Via de Cristo is a 3 day retreat weekend (like many others you may have heard of: Emmaus Walk, Great Banquet, or Kairos). It was held in northern Indiana and it was a great weekend of wonderful fellowship with men I came to love. There were talks on the Christian life, great worship and singing and wonderful food. I loved the weekend and considered this a "mountaintop experience."

All of us have these experiences of what we might consider mountaintop experiences. These are moments of exhilarating joy and happiness and love. These can be all types of experiences, not necessarily Christian retreat weekends. We love the mountain top and really want to stay there if we can. This would be like Peter who wanted to stay on the mountain and build three tents to stay there. But there is much valley work to be done. As Jesus said elsewhere "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few." (Luke 10:2)

Mountain top experiences, in the Christian life, are times of feeling really close to God. Times when we feel enlightened, changed, and maybe even believe we hear the voice of God. We can, when we quiet down enough to be still and know that God is God. (Psalm 46:10).

Today we are celebrating the Transfiguration of our Lord Sunday, the last Sunday in our Epiphany season. This now leads us into Lent, our 40 day period before Easter. We sometimes decide to give up something for Lent, or maybe add something this year? We might add time of prayer, Bible reading, giving a little extra, and serving others. It's God's call upon all of us.

Epiphany has shown us the ministry of Jesus and now we join the Lord on a journey to the Cross, ultimately His death. Lent begins Wednesday, the 17th and then leads us to the ultimate mountain top: Easter!

After my VDC weekend, I began to sense a call from God into the ministry. And my home pastor, Joe Freeman from Christ the Savior in Fishers, was an encouragement to help. The church offered to help with tuition and books and away I went ever ready to experience more of God.

As the story concludes they hear God's voice affirming Jesus: "This is my Son, the beloved (or the one I love), listen to Him!" God is telling us to listen to Jesus as he walks his way to the Cross. We listen for the Lord today as we prepare mind, body and spirit for our Lenten journey.

They head back down the mountain into the valley, the story says, where a great crowd of people wait to be healed. Isn't that the same for us? Whether you have a spiritual retreat weekend, or just the mini mountain top of worshipping Jesus, people need our love, acceptance, forgiveness, and love.

Encouragement also comes today from our Second Lesson from Second Corinthians: "Let light shine out of the darkness, who has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ!" (2 Cor. 4:6)

Let us go forward into the valley of daily living to offer our lights to others, to forgive, love and care for each other. Our valley journey takes us right into the season of Lent as God has called us forward. One thing I learned on my Via de Cristo weekend: God does not call the equipped, God equips the called!"





In Person vs Virtual Worship

Starting the week of February 15th, the decision to hold worship in-person will be determined by Marion County's color-coded level which is updated every Wednesday at noon, assigning each county in the state a status of yellow, orange, or red.

- When Marion County achieves a designation of "**yellow**" in-person worship will resume the following Sunday immediately following.
- The church will continue holding in-person worship, unless Marion County is listed as "**red**" at which time worship will return to virtual-only starting with the Sunday immediately following.
- Anytime the **status of worship changes, you will receive an email** from Kelli. Those who do not receive email communications will be **contacted via phone**.
- When we are able to return to in-person worship, it will be important to continue under the same guidelines that we have followed during Covid.
