1st READING: A reading from Genesis 9:8-17

Today's reading is the conclusion to the flood story. Because of human sin, God destroys the earth by flood, saving only Noah, his family, and the animals on the ark. Yet divine destruction gives way to divine commitment. As in the first creation, God blesses humanity and establishes a covenant with all creatures.

8 God said to Noah and to his sons with him, 9 "As for me, I am establishing my covenant with you and your descendants after you, 10 and with every living creature that is with you, the birds, the domestic animals, and every animal of the earth with you, as many as came out of the ark. 11 I establish my covenant with you, that never again shall all flesh be cut off by the waters of a flood, and never again shall there be a flood to destroy the earth." 12 God said, "This is the sign of the covenant that I make between me and you and every living creature that is with you, for all future generations: 13 I have set my bow in the clouds, and it shall be a sign of the covenant between me and the earth. 14 When I bring clouds over the earth and the bow is seen in the clouds, 15 I will remember my covenant that is between me and you and every living creature of all flesh; and the waters shall never again become a flood to destroy all flesh. 16 When the bow is in the clouds, I will see it and remember the everlasting covenant between God and every living creature of all flesh that is on the earth." 17 God said to Noah, "This is the sign of the covenant that I have established between me and all flesh that is on the earth."

2nd READING: A reading from 1 Peter 3:18-22

As God acted through Christ's suffering and death to bring us to God, so God acts through baptism to save us from a sinful existence. This spiritual cleansing marks our new life in Christ.

18 Christ also suffered for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, in order to bring you to God. He was put to death in the flesh, but made alive in the spirit, 19 in which also he went and made a proclamation to the spirits in prison, 20 who in former times did not obey, when God waited patiently in the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight persons, were saved through water. 21 And baptism, which this prefigured, now saves you—not as a removal of dirt from the body, but as

an appeal to God for a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, 22 who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers made subject to him.

Reflection for First Sunday of Lent:

Today's reflection comes courtesy of Pastor Zieske very dear friend, Pastor David Hernes, from their all-too-brief time together in Albert Lea, Minnesota. Pastor Hernes died in 2014; may he rest in peace. He often put his thoughts into poetry and sometimes a stream-of-consciousness style of writing. He called it "Some Writings from God and David." This is his reflection on Lent 2008.

WALKING IN TWO CENTURIES

The Church walks funny.

It walks with one foot in the first century. And the other in the twenty-first.

It has to.

If it walked only in the twenty-first century, it would lose its message. If it walked only in the first century, it would lose its message also.

So it's a tricky walk. Hard to keep a proper balance.

But – when it does – it is graceful. Er – Grace full.

Where did the Church get this strange way of walking?

From Jesus.

He walked in the first century (his own)

And he walked in the twenty-first century BC. (Or the forty-first – or the eighty-first BC).

Anyway, clear back to the beginning of time.

That's where his message came from.

And he applied it and offered it to his own time.

So here we go with Lent again.

We go back to the first century.

To the last week in the life of Jesus.

We remember – and re-live – and realize.

What do we realize?

We realize that Jesus walked in the first century – and walks in the twenty-first.

So if the Church walks funny – so does Jesus.

And – some folks laugh. They laugh at our Jesus. And they laugh at us.

That's okay.

Because Jesus has freed us up to laugh as we humans were meant to laugh.

From the depths of our beings. From the joy of being restored to our Father.

To laugh at ourselves. Our own tacky self-righteousness. Our own false pride.

To laugh at the hilarity of Grace. Grace that is greater than all our sins!

Jesus fit the first century. And he fits the twenty-first.

May we walk as gracefully as Jesus did – and still does.
