#### MINUTES FOR THE ANNUAL VESTRY MEETING 2020

THE PARISH OF CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL, VANCOUVER, BC FEBRUARY 23, 2020

The meeting convened at 12:45pm with Canon Dr. Richard LeSueur in the chair

#### CONSTITUTING THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

#### 1. CALL TO ORDER & OPENING PRAYER - CANON DR. RICHARD LESUEUR AND REV. HELEN DUNN

There were 119 Parishioners in attendance.

Richard called the meeting to order.

Helen led the group in the opening prayer and read an "In Memoriam" listing those parishioners who died in the last year.

#### PRESENTATION & ADOPTION OF THE 2020 VESTRY AGENDA

Richard presented the agenda.

Ros Kellett asked in regard to item #4, if those nominated would please stand when their names are called.

There were no additional items and the agenda was adopted.

Alisdair Smith MOVED, seconded by Ren Amor that the Agenda be adopted. CARRIED.

#### APPOINTMENT OF VESTRY CLERK

Richard appointed John Ross as Vestry Clerk.

#### 2. APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF 2019 ANNUAL VESTRY (FEBRUARY 25, 2019)

Donna Wong-Juliani MOVED, seconded by Carol Cook, that the minutes of the 2019 Annual Vestry be approved. CARRIED.

#### 3. 2019 IN REVIEW

#### • Reception of the Annual Report

Richard introduced the Annual Report and asked that it be received.

David Van Blarcom noted that on page 10 of the Annual Report, the reference to the 127 Housing Society should read
"The 127 Society for Housing" and the contact person should be David Van Blarcom, not Joan Seidl.
Kathy Shier MOVED, seconded by Sondra Marshall, that the Annual Report be adopted. CARRIED.

#### Looking Back & Looking Ahead

Tegan Smith presented the Transition timeline showing the key milestones:

- o Recognizing Peter Elliott and the succession planning activity.
- The Congregational Assessment Survey from 2018.
- Resulting engagement was very high.
- o An "on boarding" plan is ready for a new rector.

Tegan expressed thanks to staff and the congregation for their high level of energy and work.

#### Maundy Café Report

Andrew Stephens-Rennie gave a report on the Maundy Café. He reviewed the Cathedral Food Policy from 2017 with a reminder that it is not just about food, but about the quality of relationships. He presented his report by numbers:

- ∘ 5 meals per week
- ∘ 75 Volunteers
- ∘ 190−days per year open
- ° 22,754-meals served

#### And...

- o I New Thursday meal by a group in Kitsilano
- 2 People connected with housing
- o 5-Guests who have become volunteers
- 6-Organizations convened to address dignified food access in Vancouver
- o 10-Visits from Community Librarian
- 12 Days of team building and training (Foodsafe/De-escalation)
- o 68 Page toolkit for faith communities (A Table for All)

#### Q & A

- Ros Kellett asked regarding Tegan's report and timing of the new rector's appointment:
   Can we get a "ballpark" idea of timing? What would be the earliest date or the latest?

   Answer: Tegan replied: The target is May of this year, but the process is confidential and we are seeking a high profile candidate.
- David Van Blarcom expressed gratitude for Andrew's report on the Maundy Café and looks forward to developing initiatives in the years to come.
- o Richard expressed thanks to Tegan and Andrew on behalf of all.

#### 4. REPORT OF THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Members were Kathy Shier, Kathy Irwin and Nicky Seppala with assistance from Rev. Helen Dunn.

Helen presented the names of those nominated for various positions and requested an omnibus motion to elect all positions at once. James Conklin MOVED, seconded by David Smith.

#### 5. FINANCIAL REPORT

Presented by Cheryl Slusarchuk, Treasurer

#### Adoption of Audited 2019 Financial Statements

Cheryl presented the 2019 financial results as follows:

#### • Attendance

o The number of attendees in 2019 for all services was 35,001.

#### • Income (all sources)

- o 2019 Financials:
  - Cheryl presented audited statements which are balanced with a surplus of \$3,135.
- "Active" revenue:
  - Donations Receipted of \$931к up by \$34к; non-receipted of \$114к down by \$16к.
  - Other Grants and Outreach (fundraising) of \$194κ up \$53κ (including \$38κ for passing the torch).
  - Other Grants and Outreach including pass through donations of \$50к.
  - Undesignated bequests of \$512к.
- o Other Revenue:
  - Park Place: \$300к per year, but only used \$75к in 2019 (\$225к moved to 2020).
  - Investment income brought into Operations/Parish Ministry up by \$27K.
- ∘ Salary/Admin up \$14K:
  - due to first step to living wage, staff transition and new Curate.
- Ministries and Outreach:
  - \$494к, including Diocesan assessment of \$193к, Ministries at \$261к.

#### O & A

- Richard McAlpine asked for an explanation of the Park Place agreement for the benefit of new members.
   For example, is the agreement in perpetuity or limited?
   Answer: It is an air rights agreement with Park Place which currently gives us a payment of \$300κ annually.
   This is to be reset in 2024, based on fair market value of the property. The agreement expires in 2083.
- A Parishioner asked how we deal with an "alms" fund for those in need.
   Answer: It would be a small fund for discretionary uses. Richard suggested that it be tabled for the new Rector to consider. Kathy Irwin added that the Griffiths fund can be used for emergency aid. Funds for the Maundy Café are mainly via the Endowment Fund Administrators.
- Irene Pang asked about financial investments and whether or not there are any investments in fossil fuels or other investments; i.e., are they ethical or not?

Answer: David Smith responded that the investments are in Ethical Funds and controlled by the Diocese.

Carol Cook MOVED, seconded by Alisdair Smith

that the Audited Financial Statements for 2019 be adopted. CARRIED.

#### APPOINTMENT OF AUDITOR

Rejoice Anthony MOVED, seconded by Rosalind Kellett

that Rolfe, Benson LLP be appointed auditor for 2020/2021 fiscal year. CARRIED.

#### PRESENTATION & ADOPTION OF BUDGET 2020

Cheryl Slusarchuk presented the proposed Budget for 2020 (beginning on page 43 of Annual Report).

She has proposed a balanced budget with a proposed 3% increase in total offering and a 5% increase in operating expenses. This results in a proposed deficit of \$3,135 for 2020.

#### O & A

- Sheila Wex asked about the continuation of fundraising for "Raise the Roof...".
   Answer: There will be an invitation to continue giving after the initial 5-year period.
- Bonnie Amor asked about the Parish Nurse fund is it still active?
   Answer: Kathy Irwin responded that the initial funds are a gift from a parishioner and that there is continued interest in this concept. The funds are invested each year in the Consolidated Trust Fund. It is hoped to fully fund this position in the future.
- Sheila Pepper asked if JEAM is included in Ministry funding.
   Answer: Kathy Irwin responded—yes, it is included.
- Paula Pryce asked about the quality of the proposed LED lighting under the lighting project. Answer: The project will give proper attention to the quality of light used (colour temperature, etc.).

Kathy Shier MOVED, seconded by Jane Osler that the Budget 2019 be adopted as presented and accepted by Trustees. CARRIED.

Richard LeSueur commented on the commitment, vision and dedication of the congregation and staff. He also emphasized the need for continuing funding for the Maundy Project. He reported that Vincent Carey is the Safe Church officer for the Cathedral and that Kathy Irwin is the Privacy Officer.

#### 6. NO RESOLUTIONS WERE SUBMITTED

#### 7. ANY OTHER BUSINESS

Carol Cook presented the list of Lay Administrators for the approval of the Archbishop (listed on page 14). Carol Cook MOVED seconded by Vincent Carey that the list of Lay Administrators for 2020 be presented to the Archbishop. CARRIED

Ros Kellett asked about regular communications from Parish Council; specifically, if Minutes could be made available —perhaps to view in the office.

Kathy Shier responded—stating that perhaps a summary could be published monthly in the *Chronicle*. She suggested referring this to Trustees and Parish Council.

Richard McAlpine suggested that perhaps a summary could be emailed to those who request it.

Barbara (?) suggested that as a charitable organization, the Cathedral by-laws would govern access.

Frances Picherack stated the need to decide what is published and suggested that approved minutes could be published after being voted on.

Kevin Smith clarified that the Cathedral is not a registered society under the Societies Act, but is under the Diocese. We are a registered charity under CRA rules. He stressed the importance of communicating information.

Chris Ellison added a vote of thanks for the congregation's flow through donations to PWRDF, VST, etc.

Liz McCausland reported that at the last meeting of Wardens and Trustees the extension of the Memorial Garden into the Hillman Garden was approved. Kevin Smith requested (and received) a show of hands in approval for this and will report this to the Diocese.

A Parishioner asked if a portion of the Park Place funds should revert to First Nations (referencing the Diocesan resolution). Tegan Smith replied that the issue is being studied by a Diocesan Task Force (she is the Cathedral representative).

Barrie Vickers added a statement of recognition and thanks to Cathedral Custodial Staff for their continuing care of the building and site.

#### NOMINATING COMMITTEE

BIOGRAPHIES OF PARISH LEADERS TO BE ELECTED &/OR DEAN'S APPOINTMENTS IN ALPHABETICAL ORDER

JENNIFER BARR (Parish Council Co-Chair, Delegate to Diocesan Synod) and her husband Jim Riva moved to Vancouver from the Ottawa area in 2016 to be closer to their children and grandchildren. They have been thrilled to join the Cathedral and count it as one of the many blessings as they make a new life for themselves here. Jennifer enjoys time with her children and grandchildren, exploring beautiful British Columbia and working part-time as a consultant. She chaired Parish Council in their home parish of St. Paul's Anglican Church in Almonte, Ontario. She co-chaired the Christ Church Cathedral Welcoming Committee and is on the Altar Guild.

IAN BIRTWELL (Endowment Fund Chair) and his wife Jenny have been involved, committed and active parishioners for over 45 years. Ian is a retired community planner and development manager, and former Treasurer and Warden and provided handson project management and fundraising leadership through all phases of heritage building restoration from 1995 to 2017. Ian has been involved for many years in building and financial Ministry through the Cathedral Trustees, Stewardship Committee, Legacy Bequest Stewardship, Buildings and Grounds, Treasurers Advisory Group, and Restoration Fundraising. Ian is passionate about organ and choral music, and specifically implores all parishioners, for just a few minutes each week, to be quiet and appreciative during our superb post service postludes.

TED CHIASSON (Endowment Fund Administrator) is a retired Judge of the Court of Appeal for British Columbia; legal consultant to Borden Ladner Gervais LLP; arbitrator and mediator; former Trustee; Chair, Cathedral Succession and Transition Committee; member of a number of arts society boards; and singer with the EnChor Choir.

PETER DEGROOT (Parish Council Co-Chair, Delegate to Diocesan Synod) has been a member of Christ Church Cathedral for more than two decades. Peter continues to be inspired by the members of the community and the work of the various ministries. One can usually find Peter at the 8am service where he takes the role of server—or reader or greeter. For the past two years he has served as the Co-Chair of Parish Council which has been a rewarding experience for him. Over the years he has participated as Secretary for the Dean's Council on Liturgy & Music, facilitator of a Disciple Bible Study Group, and co-organizer of the Cathedral's entry in the Pride Parade. Outside of Cathedral life, Peter works at the Vancouver Public Library in the role of Supervisor.

KEVIN DE LA MARE (*Treasurer*) is originally from Langley (England), he grew up in South Africa when his parents immigrated there as missionaries when he was seven years old. Growing up in apartheid South Africa was influential in forming his commitment to social justice, as was his involvement as a parishioner in the ministry of St. George's Cathedral, Cape Town, where he was confirmed. He has been a parishioner at Christ Church Cathedral for 19 years and has been involved in the healing prayer ministry, as well as an intercessor, reader, server, and lay administrator. Kevin is a risk manager with the community

real estate credit group at Vancity and is grateful to be part of an organization as well as a faith community which are both committed to social justice.

CHARLES DEMERS (Parish Council Member at Large) began worshipping at the Cathedral in early 2018, beginning with Compline services and then weekday Eucharists before becoming a regular member of the St. Brigid's congregation. A writer and comedian in his professional life, Charlie can be heard on the CBC radio program *The Debaters*, and contributes semi-regularly to *Topic*, the Diocesan newspaper. He is a postulant in the Third Order of the Society of Saint Francis and is currently engaged in a process of diaconal discernment and concomitant study at the Vancouver School of Theology. He is husband to Cara, and father to Joséphine, who was baptized at St. Brigid's.

MIKE DEN HAAN (Associate Warden, Delegate to Diocesan Synod) has served as an executive, board member, mentor and consultant in the education, health, environmental and faith-based sectors, over the past 25 years. His executive leadership experience includes roles with the MS Society of Canada, University of Toronto, University of Waterloo, and Simon Fraser University. Mike is also a Director with Ecology Project International, a mentor with Beedie Luminaries and a Knowledge Philanthropist with Vantage Point. As a consultant, Mike helps organizations create new futures through Board development, capacity building, strategic planning, communications, fundraising, and volunteer/alumni engagement.

RICHARD DOUGLAS (Parish Council Member at Large) began attending the St. Brigid's congregation six years ago. He appreciated the warm welcome and hospitality. This led him to become a greeter and to participate in discernment groups. He values the openness of the parish, and the rich and supportive connections throughout the Cathedral family.

JAMES DUNLAP (Secretary) grew up in Edmonton, did history and languages at university, then taught English in China (1981–1984) while studying Chinese. He studied law at Berkeley and practised in Hong Kong (1989–2015). He and his wife Geraldine met and raised their children there, and he sang in the choir at St. John's Cathedral, among other church activities. They retired to Vancouver in 2015. At Christ Church Cathedral James sings in the choir and has been on Parish Council since 2017.

CHRIS ELLISON (PWRDF Representative, Parish Council Member at Large) has been a member of Christ Church Cathedral for over ten years, serving in a variety of volunteer roles. The faith and solid, down-to-earth nature of the elders at the Cathedral and in the Anglican Church, as well as the good work of its people, most inspire Chris to work and serve inside and outside the church and to worship in the Anglican Church and at the Christ Church Cathedral. Outside of the Cathedral community, Chris works in the outdoor living industry, helping people get outside and enjoy the outdoors and all Vancouver has to offer in the Spring/Summer and Fall/Winter seasons.

CASPER ZUZEK FRIESEN (Parish Council Member at Large) has attended the 5:30pm St. Brigid's service for over four years and serves on the congregational discernment group. He works in e-commerce and sits on a rotation of Cathedral and diocesan committees especially related to LGBTQ+ identities in the church. Between all that, he manages to find time for his two cats and corgi puppy!

#### INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Trustees of Christ Church Parish Vancouver B.C.,

#### Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

#### **Qualified Opinion**

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Christ Church Parish Vancouver B.C., (the "Parish"), which comprise the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2020, and the statement of revenues and expenses and changes in fund balances and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matters described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section of our report, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Parish as at 31 December 2020, and the revenues and expenses and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

#### **Basis for Qualified Opinion**

In common with many not-for-profit organizations, the Parish derives revenue from specified donations and parishioners offerings, the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, verification of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Parish. Therefore, we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to donation revenue, excess of revenues over expenses, and cash flows for the years ended 31 December 2020 and 31 December 2019, current assets as at 31 December 2020 and 31 December 2019, and net assets as at 1 January and 31 December for both the 2020 and 2019 years. Our audit opinion on the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2019 was modified accordingly because of the possible effects of this limitation in scope.

As discussed in Note 2(c) to the financial statements, the Parish has not recorded the cost of land and building, which constitutes a departure from Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. The effect of this departure and the related unrecorded annual amortization expense from Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations has not been determined.

Subsequent to the year-end, the Diocese submitted a 2020 Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy (CEWS) claim on behalf of the Parish. Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires government assistance to be recognized when received or receivable. As discussed in Note 3(a), the Parish has recorded these amounts as deferred revenue, which constitutes a departure from Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. The effect of this departure is described in Note 3(a).



#### **INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT - continued**

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Parish in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified audit opinion.

#### Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Parish's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Parish or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Parish's financial reporting process.

#### Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or
  error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is
  sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material
  misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion,
  forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are
  appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the
  Parish's internal control.

- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Parish's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditors' report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditors' report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Parish to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

#### 1. Purpose of the Organization

- (a) Christ Church Parish Vancouver B.C. (the "Parish") was incorporated on 1 August 1908 under the terms of the Anglican Synod New Westminster Act. The Parish is a registered charity and is exempt from income tax.
- (b) Christ Church Parish Vancouver B.C. is an inclusive community of disciples of Jesus Christ serving God in downtown Vancouver through worship, ministry and outreach. The Parish community values its history and heritage; since 1888, people have met on this site to worship God and witness to Christ's love for the world; since 1929, this has been the seat of the Bishop of the Diocese of New Westminster. It is a place of worship, sanctuary and celebration where differences are welcomed, outreach is encouraged, faith is nurtured and arts and culture valued and supported.

Vision of the Parish: In keeping with this tradition, and yet within the context of today's society, the Parish community holds up the following vision:

We envision a Cathedral which is radically inclusive, restlessly inquisitive, intentional, and inspired. This is a place that is called to lead and to serve, in communion and in community, with healing, reconciliation, and love, living out Christian mission. Together, we look to the power of Christ for the transformation of each person, this city, and the world.

We recognize our history and traditions, while seeking renewal and growth in spiritual depth and size. Curious and adaptable, this chorus has room for all voices. Whoever you are, wherever you come from, whomever you love, and regardless of what you may bring or are searching for, you are welcome here.

The value statement of the Parish is "Open doors, open hearts, open minds".

Mission of the Parish: Following our vision, our mission is to deepen faith and commitment to the God we know in Jesus Christ by:

- making our heritage building a place where beauty, reverence and creativity can flourish, in our worship and through music and the arts;
- ii. committing faithfully to liturgy;
- iii. developing lay and ordained leadership;
- iv. growing through welcoming new people into the life of the Cathedral;
- v. answering spiritual and secular calls to reconciliation;
- vi. providing a place of nurturing and sustenance, for body, mind and spirit;
- vii. embracing LGBTQ1A/2S people, their families, and their friends in a positive, safe environment;
- viii. welcoming the uncomfortable and the unknown;
- ix. accepting the duty and responsibility of being the "City's Church" and the Cathedral Church of the Diocese of New Westminster.

#### 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. The significant policies are detailed as follows:

#### (a) Revenue Recognition

The Parish follows the restricted fund method of accounting for revenue whereby externally restricted contributions are recognized in the fund corresponding to the purpose for which they were contributed. Restricted contributions for which no corresponding restricted fund is presented are recognized in the Parish Ministry Fund using the deferral method. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenues in the Parish Ministry Fund when received or receivable.

Investment income includes interest, dividend income and realized and unrealized investment gains and losses. Unrealized gains and losses of financial assets are included in investment income and recognized as revenue in the statement of operations. Investment income is recognized as revenue when earned.

#### (b) Contributed Services

The Parish benefits greatly from contributed services in the form of volunteer time for various activities. Because of the difficulty of determining their fair value, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.

#### (c) Tangible Capital Assets

Tangible capital assets are recorded at cost except for land and building, which are recorded at a \$1 nominal amount. The Parish provides for amortization using the straight-line method at rates designed to amortize the cost of the tangible capital assets over their estimated useful lives. The annual amortization rates are as follows:

Computer equipment 3 years Equipment 5 years

There is no amortization provision for building as historical costs were not capitalized but have been expensed in the accounts and/or not recorded.

#### (d) Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses and disclosure of contingencies at the date of the statement financial position. Amounts subject to estimates include amortization of tangible capital assets and accrued liabilities. Management believes that the estimates utilized in preparing the financial statements are prudent and reasonable, however, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Notes to the Financial Statements For the Year Ended 31 December 2020

#### 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies - continued

#### (e) Impairment of Long-Lived Assets

The Parish tests long-lived assets for impairment when events or changes in circumstances indicate that their carrying value may not be recovered. When a tangible capital asset no longer contributes to the services provided by the Parish, its carrying amount is written down to its residual value. No impairment losses were determined by management to be necessary for the year.

#### (f) Pension Plan

The Parish and its employees contribute to a defined contribution multi-employer pension plan (the "Plan") administered by the Pension Office Corporation of the Anglican Church of Canada. The Plan provides pension based on length of service and final average earnings. As the assets and liabilities of the Plan are not segregated by member, the Plan is accounted for as a defined contribution plan and any contributions of the Parish to the Plan are expense incurred.

#### (g) Investments

The Investment in the Diocese Consolidated Trust Fund is recorded at fair value and is comprised of a marketable security portfolio administered by the Diocesan Administration and Finance Committee. The Investment held at the Vancouver Foundation is recorded at amortized cost.

#### (h) Financial Instruments

#### i. Measurement of Financial Instruments

The Parish initially measures its financial assets and liabilities at fair value, except for certain non-arm's length transactions.

The Parish subsequently measures all of its financial assets and financial liabilities at amortized cost, except for investments in equity instruments that are quoted in an active market and fixed income securities, which are measured at fair value. Changes in fair value are recognized in the statement of operations.

Financial assets measured at amortized cost include cash, accounts receivable and investments held at the Vancouver Foundation.

Financial liabilities measured at amortized cost include accounts payable and accrued liabilities, funds held in trust, Canada Emergency Business Account (CEBA) loan and bank term loan.

The Parish's financial assets measured at fair value include the investments in Diocese Consolidated Trust Fund.

#### 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies - continued

#### (h) Financial Instruments - continued

#### ii. Impairment

Financial assets measured at cost are tested for impairment when there are indicators of impairment. The amount of the write-down is recognized in the statement of operations. The previously recognized impairment loss may be reversed to the extent of the improvement, directly or by adjusting the allowance account, provided it is no greater than the amount that would have been reported at the date of the reversal had the impairment not been recognized previously. The amount of the reversal is recognized in the statement of operations.

#### iii. Transaction Costs

The Parish recognizes its transaction costs in the statement of operations in the period incurred. However, financial instruments that will not be subsequently measured at fair value are adjusted by the transaction costs that are directly attributable to their origination, issuance or assumption.

#### 3. Financial Assistance during the COVID-19 Pandemic

#### (a) Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy (CEWS)

In 2020, the Synod of the Diocese of New Westminster (the "Diocese") allocated \$83,934 to the Parish as its share of the Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy ("CEWS") claimed by the Diocese. The wage subsidy is included in revenue. In addition, the Parish received \$36,229 of CEWS directly from the Federal Government of Canada.

In addition, subsequent to the year-end, the Diocese submitted a 2020 CEWS claim on behalf of the Parish for the amount of \$149,447. Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires government assistance to be recorded as income when received or receivable. Due to certain uncertainties, the amount has been recorded as deferred revenue. If the amount had been recorded as revenue, the Parish's Unrestricted Parish Ministry fund revenue for the year ended 31 December 2020 would increase by \$149,447, and deferred revenue as at 31 December 2020 would decrease by \$149,447. The measurement of the CEWS is subject to uncertainty as the claims are subject to review and possible adjustment by the Canada Revenue Agency.

Notes to the Financial Statements For the Year Ended 31 December 2020

#### 3. Financial Assistance during the COVID-19 Pandemic - continued

#### (b) Canada Emergency Business Account (CEBA)

In 2020, the Parish received the Canada Emergency Business Account ("CEBA"), an interest-free loan of \$40,000 to support the Parish operations by providing financing for expenses that cannot be avoided or deferred as steps are taken to safely navigate a period of shutdown. Repaying the balance of the loan on or before December 31, 2022 will result in loan forgiveness of 25%, or \$10,000. If the loan is not repaid by that date, the loan can be converted to a 3-year term loan, monthly payments at an interest rate of 5%. As at 31 December 2020, the forgivable portion of \$10,000 was recognized as a government subsidy.

#### (c) Assistance from the Diocese

The Diocese also approved a financial assistance package to mitigate the financial exigency existing within parishes of the Diocese as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. The assistance included suspending Diocesan assessment payments for five months – this reduced the Parish's 2020 Diocesan assessment expense by \$90,148.

#### 4. Fund Descriptions

(a) Parish Ministry Fund (formerly General Fund)

The Parish Ministry Fund's purpose is to report on the operation and administration of the Parish.

#### (b) Endowment Funds

The bylaws of the Endowment Fund (and "other Endowment Funds") prevent the withdrawal of capital from the funds.

#### i. Endowment Fund

The Endowment Fund's purpose is to provide grants to parish-based ministries via the generation of investment income.

#### ii. The Rupert Lang Endowment Fund for Music

The Music Endowment Fund's purpose is to support the Parish musical ministry.

#### iii. W.I.S.H. Endowment Fund

The W.I.S.H. Endowment Fund's purpose is to support the operation of the W.I.S.H. Drop-in Centre Society.

#### 4. Fund Descriptions - continued

#### iv. Fuller Memorial Endowment Fund

The George and Lois Blatchford Fuller Memorial Fund for Social Justice supports local and national social justice projects.

#### v. Rhoda Fraser O'Clery Outreach Fund

The purpose of this fund is to support efforts to care for the poor and hungry.

#### vi. Jim and Cathy Pence Endowment Fund

The purpose of this fund is to support social justice projects.

#### vii. M. Griffiths Fund for the Poor and Homeless

The purpose of this fund is to provide assistance to needy persons (including the homeless, the hungry and the destitute).

#### (c) McLeod Outreach Fund

The purpose of this fund is to provide funds for outreach use at the discretion of the Trustees as they respond to requests for ministry. The fund may not be used for support of the building or operations.

#### (d) Capital and Special Projects Fund

This fund was established to manage the stained glass windows projects and other special projects or designated purposes, such as commissioning new stained glass windows, musical instruments, icons, artwork and others.

#### (e) Hillman Garden Fund

The purpose of this fund is to improve and maintain attractive landscaping and gardens on the property of the Parish.

#### (f) Sustaining Ministries Fund

In 2004, the Trustees approved the establishment of an Income Stabilization Fund (now known as the Sustaining Ministries Fund). Non-designated bequests and donations of \$5,000 or more designated by the donor "to the greatest need" are first recognized in the Parish Ministry Fund, then transferred to the Sustaining Ministries Fund and reviewed by the Trustees for current or future year use.

#### 4. Fund Descriptions - continued

#### (g) Sabbatical Fund

The purpose of the Sabbatical Fund is to support senior staff when on sabbatical leave and to fund replacement staff costs if necessary.

#### (h) Curacy Fund

The Curacy Fund has been established to support a curacy program which could include salaries, training costs, courses, books, etc.

#### (i) Heritage Building Fund (formerly Restoration Fund)

The purpose of the Heritage Building Fund is to make funds available for capital building and maintenance projects. In January 2019, Cathedral Trustees approved a change in presentation of the Park Place Agreement within the financial statements to align the income from this agreement with the recommendation of the 1976 Task Force on Diocesan-Cathedral Relationships which states that "All moneys received by Christ Church Cathedral from Grander Developments Ltd., on and after 1 July 1976, should be construed as Capital Receipts and used by the Cathedral as a priority for maintenance, renovation and extension, as necessary, of Cathedral premises".

#### (j) Parish Nurse Fund

The purpose of this fund is to provide health and welfare resources to both the Parish and street ministry projects.

#### (k) Rector's Discretionary Fund

The purpose of this fund is to support the rector's initiatives in new areas to facilitate the growth and development of the Cathedral, outside of the annual operating budget.

#### 9. Bank Term Loan

On 24 February 2020, the Trustees of the Parish approved the arrangement of a credit facility with the Royal Bank of Canada under the following terms:

A \$1,600,000 term loan with interest at 3.07% per annum with blended monthly payments of \$13,143. The balance of the loan is due and payable on 25 February 2025.

Security for the above credit facilities is by way of a general security agreement constituting a first ranking security interest in all personal property of the Parish.

#### 10. Park Place, Mortgage Receivable

Pursuant to an agreement dated 31 October 1979, the Parish granted certain development rights, at no cost to the Parish, in exchange for the right to receive annual cash payments. Under the agreement these repayments amount to \$300,000 per annum from 2005 to 2023, and from 2024 to 2083 amounts to be determined based on 8% of market value of the Parish lands as if vacant and unencumbered. These annual payments are secured by a mortgage granted by the Owner in favour of the Parish for a term expiring in 2083.

#### 13. Pension Plans

#### (a) General Synod Pension Plan

The Parish contributes to a multi-employer defined benefit pension plan (the "Plan") administered by the Pension Office Corporation of the Anglican Church of Canada. The Plan covers clergy and some lay employees who work over 20 hours per week as well as the employees of the other participating organizations.

The Plan provides pension based on length of service and final average earnings. The annual funding requirements are determined in consultation with the actuaries to provide long-term stability of the Plan.

The Parish contributes 11.9% (2019 - \$11.9%) and the employees contribute 5.3% (2019 - 5.3%) of their stipend plus the greater of  $\frac{1}{2}$  stipend of housing allowance to the Plan.

#### (b) Lay Retirement Plan

The Parish also contributes to a multi-employer defined contribution pension plan administered by the Pension Office Corporation of the Anglican Church of Canada whereby employers and employees contributed at a defined rate. Some lay employees who work over 20 hours per week participate in this plan. The Parish contributes 5% (2019 - 5%) and the employees contribute 5% (2019 - 5%) of their salaries to the Plan.

Total pension plan expense for 2020 for both plans above amounted to \$53,980 (2019 - \$58,888).

#### 14. Financial Instruments

The Parish is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments. The following analysis provides a measure of the Parish's risk exposure and concentrations at the statement of financial position date, 31 December 2020.

#### (a) Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that an entity will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The Parish is exposed to this risk mainly in respect of its accounts payable and accrued liabilities, funds held in trust, CEBA loan, and bank term loan. The Parish manages liquidity risk by maintaining adequate levels of cash. There has been no change to the risk exposure from the prior year.

Notes to the Financial Statements For the Year Ended 31 December 2020

#### 14. Financial Instruments - continued

#### (b) Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk that one party to a financial instrument will cause a financial loss for the other party by failing to discharge an obligation. The Parish's main credit risks relate to its cash and accounts receivable. The Parish manages credit risk on its cash by placing its cash with regulated financial institutions and assesses on a continuous basis, its receivables and writes off any amounts that are not collectible. Assessment for uncollectible amounts are performed by management and provided for. There has been no change to the risk exposure from the prior year.

#### (c) Market Risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market risk comprises three types of risk: currency risk, interest risk and other price risk.

#### (d) Currency Risk

Currency risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in foreign exchange rates. The investment in the Diocese Consolidated Trust Fund includes a component denominated in foreign currency. In addition, as at 31 December 2020, cash of \$32,154 (2019 - \$34,057) was denominated in U.S. dollars and converted into Canadian dollars. There has been no change to the risk exposure from the prior year.

#### (e) Interest Rate Risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. The Parish is exposed to interest rate risk on its fixed and floating interest rate financial instruments. Fixed-rate instruments subject the Parish to a fair value risk while the floating-rate instruments subject it to a cash flow risk. The Parish does not use financial instruments to reduce its risk exposure. There has been no change to the risk exposure from the prior year.

#### (f) Other Price Risk

Other price risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flow of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices (other than those arising from interest rate risk or currency risk), whether those changes are caused by factors specific to the individual financial instrument or its issuer, or factors affecting all similar financial instruments traded in the market. The Parish is exposed to other price risk through its investments, which are held in professionally administered funds. These funds are subject to fluctuating returns based on the market and are exposed to the risk of market volatility. Risk has been assessed by management and an investment policy adopted to mitigate such market risk. There has been no change to the risk exposure from the prior year.

Notes to the Financial Statements For the Year Ended 31 December 2020

#### 15. Impact of COVID-19

In March 2020, the World Health Organization declared the COVID-19 outbreak to be a public health emergency. This pandemic has caused an increase in economic uncertainty that has led to volatility in international markets and disrupted business operations around the world. The Parish's primary source of revenue is derived from building use and donations. At the date of the Independent Auditors' Report, the Parish continued to receive a reduced amount of building use revenue and donations. Currently, management is unable to determine the extent to which COVID-19 will have a significant impact on future revenues, expenses or operations.

We made significant changes to upgrade our website to better showcase the Cathedral and our events.

The budgeted increase in this area is primarily due to transition back to 100% staffing. (Pastor of St. Brigid and Maundy Café went from half time to full time and the Director of Finance was vacant for several months). There is also a 2% cost of living increase for staff part way through the year.

Pre-pandemic the Cathedral's doors were open 7 days a week, rain or shine and the building and grounds ministry ensures that the Cathedral building is safe, clean, and efficiently run. We hope to be back to 7 days a week openings soon.

A key parish priority is on the long-term maintenance of this historic downtown heritage building. Included in this budget is \$100,000 for the lighting project.

The Cathedral has partnerships and relationships with many local community groups and performing arts organizations that contribute to the Cathedral's vitality in the city through their community service and public performances. Each group shares in the responsibility of stewardship for this Heritage building through building use donations. A strategic plan developed in 2010 projects growing numbers of arts and community organizations having their activities scheduled at the Cathedral and this plan is still in use today within COVID-19 limits. Soon occasional concerts, dinners or other events bringing vitality and fun back into the life of a parish and will contribute to building community.

God's work can continue to flourish here thanks to the annual stewardship by members of the Cathedral Parish. Donors give through automatic debit, monthly credit card, weekly cheque/cash, PayPal and donations of securities. Our donors have been generous, and their gifts are growing and recognized with gratitude.

Friends of the Cathedral from across North America and around the world, support the work and mission of Christ Church Cathedral. All our visitors are invited to make a gift in support of the Cathedral's work. As much as possible this offering is receipted and the Cathedral's goal is to keep in touch with all who have expressed interest and support.

To sustain ministry and invest in the growth of the congregation, donations are supplemented by Endowment & Reserve Funds. These funds are designated to support Cathedral Music and Ministry, Mission and Service, the Heritage Building and the Sustaining Ministry Fund. Christ Church Cathedral has restricted and unrestricted reserve funds of \$2,247,309.

- 1. Growth of donor base in annual financial stewardship so that a greater percentage of the entire annual costs of Cathedral mission and ministry are provided by members and friends; and,

The increase to the Cathedral's 2021 Ministry and Outreach will be funded primarily through \$523,500 from Cathedral Endowment & Reserve Funds (last years budget was for \$763,000 and actual was \$387,684).

The Diocese, which oversees the payroll for our full-time employees, applied for a CEWS grant for the last quarter of 2020 and did not qualify. However, the Diocese resubmitted and was notified after year end that their revised application was accepted. We were notified in mid-February that we should expect an amount from the Diocese in the near future. The position of Trustees and Officers is that this amount should be applied in 2021 when it is received, as our books were closed, our audit was completed for 2020 and as of that time we had no written guarantee of any amounts to be received. Therefore, the Trustees decided to apply it to 2021.
