Genesis 17:1-8 The Message (MSG)

17 ¹⁻² When Abram was ninety-nine years old, God showed up and said to him,

"I am The Strong God, live entirely before me, live to the hilt! I'll make a covenant between us and I'll give you a huge family."

³⁻⁸ Overwhelmed, Abram fell flat on his face.

Then God said to him,

"This is my covenant with you: You'll be the father of many nations. Your name will no longer be Abram, but Abraham, meaning that 'I'm making you the father of many nations.' I'll make you a father of fathers—I'll make nations from you, kings will issue from you. I'm establishing my covenant between me and you, a covenant that includes your descendants, a covenant that goes on and on and on, a covenant that commits me to be your God and the God of your descendants. And I'm giving you and your descendants this land where you're now just camping, this whole country of Canaan, to own forever. And I'll be their God."

¹⁵⁻¹⁶ God continued speaking to Abraham, "And Sarai your wife: Don't call her Sarai any longer; call her Sarah. I'll bless her—yes! I'll give you a son by her! Oh, how I'll bless her! Nations will come from her; kings of nations will come from her."

Focus on Faith...

Even the elders needed to be reminded, once in a while, that they had much to offer the world, that their stories would be shared through the generations, that they really didn't know what their story would reveal.

Even the elders need to remember that God made a promise... more than once ... to care for and guide people. The elders and the generations that follow them are part of a covenant of faith where God and people promise to walk with each other to learn from each other and to grow together.

Mark 8:31-38 The Message (MSG)

³⁰⁻³² Jesus warned them to keep it quiet, not to breathe a word of it to anyone. He then began explaining things to them: "It is necessary that the Son of Man proceed to an ordeal of suffering, be tried and found guilty by the elders, high priests, and religion scholars, be killed, and after three days rise up alive." He said this simply and clearly so they couldn't miss it.

³²⁻³³ But Peter grabbed him in protest. Turning and seeing his disciples wavering, wondering what to believe, Jesus confronted Peter. "Peter, get out of my way! Satan, get lost! You have no idea how God works."

³⁴⁻³⁷ Calling the crowd to join his disciples, he said, "Anyone who intends to come with me has to let me lead. You're not in the driver's seat; *I* am. Don't run from suffering; embrace it. Follow me and I'll show you how. Self-help is no help at all. Self-sacrifice is the way, my way, to saving yourself, your true self. What good would it do to get everything you want and lose you, the real you? What could you ever trade your soul for?

³⁸ "If any of you are embarrassed over me and the way I'm leading you when you get around your fickle and unfocused friends, know that you'll be an even greater embarrassment to the Son of Man when he arrives in all the splendor of God, with an army of the holy angels."

Scripture Reading(s):

Scripture is our song for the journey, the living word passed on from generation to generation to guide and inspire.

God calls us to be doers of the word and not hearers only.

Message/Reflections:

Lenten Learnings: Stories that remind us: Trust God.

Ninety nine years old and God says "you will have children." No wonder Abram fell down and Sarai laughed. Who would want children then? Who would have the energy?

Like many others, this bible story begins with what would appear to be impossible. Seriously, God? Seriously, Abram.

Having dropped this unexpected news, God then shares a bit more of the unfolding story. God names and recognizes that Abram has more to offer the world than he realizes. That, as a man of great faith, he would become a legend for his dedication and unwavering following. God changes his name to foretell of the story ahead and Abram becomes Abraham 'The Father of Many Nations" and Sarai becomes Sarah which means "Princess" or "Princess of the multitudes." God changed their story, which they may have thought was slowing down, and it continued much further and longer than they imagined it could.

Their stories are not filled with perfection – indeed they show us doubt, and jealousy, and bad decisions. But they also show us that, when the best of us make unfortunate decisions, God doesn't give up on us and that we never know where faith will lead us.

Do you remember the children's book by Robert Munsch "I'll love you forever, I'll love you for always..."?

The story shows that through all the stages of life the baby/child/teenager/adult's parent continues to sing a song of love to them. God does that too, picks us up, climbs through windows and loves us.

We also see in a unexpected twist that there is a time when the love is reciprocated, when the grown-up realizes that power of love that has accompanied them through all of their life and they try to give it back -- not a rejection – but a reflection of the dedication and steadfast love they were gifted with.

We look back on the stories of our parents and grandparents, on the Elders in our faith stories and we see that being loving, being faithful means following God and letting go of our wants to respond to God's direction.

As people delve more and more into their ancestry, stories emerge of young boys running away to fight for the truth, of strong women standing up for their rights, of people who put their own lives at risk so that others could experience freedom: stories of people following their heart so that others could have justice, and compassion and love in their lives.

How many times have we heard the story of walking to school uphill BOTH ways in deep blizzards? How many times have we heard "when I was a boy..." How many times have we heard that Mom fed all 15 kids and had left overs for the hired hand AND she grew all the food in her garden – no pre-packaged easy stuff for her!

The truth is that those stories aren't about the snow or the many pounds of potatoes. They are about looking after others. They are about never giving up. They are about being where you were supposed to be, digging in to what needs to be done and not looking for an easy way out.

Living our faith will never be taking the easy way out. In our Jesus story from the Gospel of Mark today, Jesus shares just enough of the unfolding story that he knows about that those around him are afraid. They don't understand what is coming, they are still not strong enough to faithfully follow.

Peter tries to change directions but Jesus will have none of it. He calls Peter "Satan" which seems a bit harsh.

But in the Hebrew language the word translated as Satan means an "Adversary, or One Who Resists." Peter resists. He doesn't understand how this story that is coming up fast in front of him can be real. Can't you imagine him saying "Seriously, Jesus?" and Jesus replying with "Seriously, Peter"

Here is where schooling, uphill in all directions, happens. Jesus says, if we are going to succeed you have to trust that I know what I'm doing. If this is going to work, we have to give all we've got for the sake of others. This is not going to be easy.

We have given up our connections to family and friend for the sake of the vulnerable, the weak. Haven't there been times in the last few months when we've been asked to give up more and we've said "Seriously?" and the answer has been "Seriously"

Abraham had to give up his retirement to raise a son. He would experience a lot of frustration, a lot of challenges. Sarah had to learn to mother at a very advance age too. Mistakes were made. God never gave up.

Peter had to listen to his friend and to follow him into possible, well, probable, danger. Peter had to let go of resistance to be where and who God needed him to be. Jesus had to share harsh truths to get people to be part of something that was unexpected, unpredictable so very necessary to show the strength of God's love for the world. God never gave up.

God called Abraham and Sarah and they answered the call – imperfectly, yes – but they did their best to follow God's way. God called the disciples and the imperfect Peter resisted but then answered the call to follow the way of God.

God calls us.

In this season of Lent, we may find ourselves feeling as though we are in the desert, or surrounded by danger. As we ask ourselves the Lenten question "How are we doing" we really aren't sure if we know the answer or if we want to.

If we will only look up, we may see that God is twinkling at us through the darkness or standing beside us to hold us up. If we will only take that step forward into the storm, toward garden of God's people that needs tending, God will get us through.

God calls us, as has happened through many generations, to follow the path of love, to trust that God will guide us through, to know that we can do this.

God calls us. What will we answer?

Come, Lent with me.

Responding to God's call...

We are on a journey of mystery, of discovery together. As people of God we are called to care for all on the journey, wherever they may be. We are called to be bold... to be unafraid to follow God into new places to hear how others did to follow their example, to learn from their stories. As we boldly continue on our Lenten journey, offering our hearts, our heads and our treasure for God's work in the world, may our gifts be blessed and a blessing. Amen.
