

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A Reading from John 2:13-22

The towering, glittering Temple may have impressed Jesus as a boy: now he finds the outer court, the Court of the Gentiles, turned into a noisy market serving the Temple treasury but distorting its purpose.

Like a well-barnacled ship, the gospel lumbers through time encrusted with layered domestication. We find it difficult to think of Jesus angry. Love God. love you neighbour. love your enemy. But anger? Jesus' anger disturbs yet reveals there's a time for anger.

When we focus on places in which to worship rather than people to serve there's a time for anger. When we focus on self and ignore the extreme need of many there's a time for anger. When we accept poverty, injustice, war as part of the natural order there's a time for anger.

There's a time for anger that results in action that heals the hurting supports the suffering relieves the exploited frees the enslaved brings God's love to bear.
