Elders Report - 2020

I need not share how 2020 was definitely a year that will not soon be forgotten. Though Jan and Feb of 2020 seemed to start off normal as far as Taber E free church is concerned by mid-March the whole world pretty much was in a lock down and every store, school, business, and church was closed. Not knowing what we were dealing with it was obvious to us as elders the appropriate action was to submit to authorities. As elders we tried our best to encourage people to use technology to communicate with others, and to worship and to listen to sermons online. By end of June with restrictions being lightened we opened church up to services while abiding by the govt drawn up restrictions. We were able to accommodate all members/ adherents who wanted to attend by having 2 services. Though I know this wasn't ideal for everyone, as elders we felt we were honouring the Lord by respecting the govt. restrictions. We continued with these services until mid-Dec when we were hit with another blow and given more restrictions. This meant we could only have 15% of the allowed occupancy as per the fire code. We had to change how we accommodate members/ adherents to only allowing 49 people in total per service. This is how we ended the year. Throughout the year as elders we had many many meetings, our goal and mandate, was always to do what's best for our church. Remembering the church is NOT the building but the body of believers.

I know many of us are struggling with anxiety and fear. I want to encourage you all with Gods word from 1 Corinthians 15:55 "O death, where is your victory? O death where is your sting?" We need not fear Jesus has conquered death. That does not mean we won't have hard times in this world but as believers we are guaranteed to be in eternity as immortals. I want to encourage you all that we can still be the light Jesus has called us to be. Thessalonians 5: 5 "You are all children of the light and children of the day. We do not belong to the night or to the darkness". Let's be the "Light" to the unsaved world that needs Jesus in spite of the circumstances.

On a personal note after serving as an elder for 5 years I decided to step down this past year end. The past year was very challenging which brought with it many more meetings than usual which took away from my family and business. I am taking time to spend with my elderly parents who are in need and my wife, children and grandkids whom I have truly missed spending quality time with. Lead Pastor Annual Report

2020 marked the arrival of a global pandemic that changed numerous facets of our lives, both individually and corporately as a church. I can recall a special meeting of the leadership in March where we considered what COVID-19 was going to mean for us. I aimed to encourage and remind everyone in the room that our mission as a church to make disciples who know God, grow to be like Jesus, and go in the Spirit to make further disciples has not changed. The only change comes in the multitude of adjustments that we have had to make in order to maintain a God-honouring and authority-respecting posture so that our community can see that we love Jesus but also consider the needs (and requests) of our neighbours around us.

As a church, we have aimed to “render to Caesar the things that are Caesar’s, and to God the things that are God’s” (Luke 20:25). We have sought to worship God, to continue growing followers of Jesus Christ, to love God, and to love others while rendering to our country, province, and community all that is needed and requested of us to in response to the pandemic.

I believe that we can remain encouraged as we minister to each other and to the community. We remember the words of Paul as he celebrates how the resurrection has the last word - not death, or pandemic, or conspiracies, or upheaval. Jesus has been resurrected and we who believe in him have this same hope of the perishable giving way to the imperishable.

“Therefore, my beloved brothers and sisters, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain.” (1 Corinthians 15:58)

Our work to make disciples is not in vain, regardless of the challenges, set backs, or circumstances. I hold on to these truths as I work out my calling and role in the areas of preaching, pastoral care, and leadership.

PREACHING

The preparation and delivery of Sunday’s message occupies a great deal of time and thought each week. My prayer is that the weekly sermons help you hear God’s voice in his Word, understand his desires for you as a disciple of Jesus, and determine new ways to keep in step with the Holy Spirit. Here is a summary of what we covered in 2020:

Acts - Preaching through Acts was important so that the church can see the ways that we are to be positioned in the world and how we proceed together in fulfilling the mission to make disciples. We journeyed together to explore the various ways that the church grows in its witness in the midst of change and challenge.

Lent - We took a break from Acts to recognize and celebrate the season of Lent - 40 days of preparation before Easter to remember our human frailty and need for redemption. We held an Ash Wednesday service which was well received by many as a start to this season. It was during Lent that COVID-19 interrupted our regular gatherings as a congregation. However, we remained committed to ensuring that the regular preaching of the Word would continue so that we could carry on growing in Christ together.

Kingdom Life - As we started a new ministry season in the Fall, we walked through the Kingdom Life series - a collection of sermons designed to help people see that, as a follower of Jesus Christ, each one is part of the Kingdom of God. When a person believes in Jesus, they begin a new life in the Kingdom. This means seeing Jesus as their King. Our

challenge is to submit our lives to him in greater ways and exchange our wills for the will of our King - Jesus.

Advent - This year's Advent series focused on the book of Isaiah. This prophet was writing in a time when hope was dwindling and the nation was feeling numerous pressures from places that they did not have control over. These themes were able to connect with our congregation as we all were processing the challenges of the pandemic. Our hope in life and salvation remain anchored in the promise and gift of Jesus Christ.

PASTORAL CARE

Visitation, pastoral care, and discipleship are regular elements of my ministry and I always value the time that I can share with you as a shepherd - helping guide people in their spiritual lives as requested. COVID-19 became the overwhelming concern of many. The pandemic brought a level of disconnectedness for many. To address this, I joined with the Elders in doing more calls to people, specifically identifying people who may not be able to tune into the online services being offered. When we were able to meet again, this emphasis shifted towards those who were not able to attend on Sundays or who were staying away from gathering for understandable and legitimate reasons in light of the pandemic.

We continued to impress on the church that we are able to support each other in this time. Most notably, we circulated a list of the members at the last congregation meeting to encourage each member to call one or two others to offer care and companionship in this time. As a church, we are the Body and must look to give care for each other.

Another avenue of care for the congregation was developing a method of more regular communication. In March, a weekly newsletter was established to relay important news to the entire congregation. Over the course of time, the weekly newsletter has also become a helpful tool for relaying prayer needs and articulating important directions for discipleship and congregational life. My desire is to continue helping the congregation see the needs of others and see that they are equipped to help those needs as followers of Jesus.

LEADERSHIP

This year marked the completed transfer of my ordination to the Evangelical Free Church of Canada (EFCC). I appreciate being part of a larger ministry community and to be officially credentialed with our denomination, confirming both a trust and partnership with the EFCC.

In addition to working with the Elders and Executive Board, I also have served our denomination by being a part of the Prairie District Board of the EFCC. In October, I was elected to be the Chair of this Board. I look forward to the ways I can continue serving our District and the member churches.

This sums up the highlights of 2020. I am grateful for my role in serving you as your pastor and shepherd, aiming to make growing and fruitful disciples of Jesus Christ.

Associate Pastor Annual Report - 2020

This past year will always be remembered because of the pandemic and the effects it has had on our world in so many different ways. Yet even in these difficulties and the unique challenges this year has brought us, it has been a time to experience the faithfulness of God. Faithfulness has been a word that has continued to come to mind during the challenges of this year. As we look around at all the ways our world has changed this year and all the ways it may continue to change the thing that remains constant is His faithfulness. Regardless of my circumstances, regardless of the difficulties that surround us in the world God is still active, he is still working, and he is not surprised or caught off guard by any of the events of the last year. He promises to complete his work and he is faithful to end, and he will remain faithful to us.

Youth:

Our youth ministry is broken up into two different streams our Tuesday night bible studies/ life groups and our Friday night events. Our Tuesday nights are all about learning, experiencing and equipping youth to understand and embrace who Jesus is and help them say yes to his call on their life. Fridays are little different while this is still the goal, we create Fridays to be a safe place for any youth in our community to come, meet people and build relationships, have fun, and experience who God is through teaching and worship. Many of our youth attend on both Tuesdays and Fridays, but for many youth our only chance to make impact on their lives right now is because of our Friday events/ services. We find joy in both nights for different reasons and love being able to serve the youth of this church and of this community.

Bible Studies:

Our Bible studies run Tuesday nights for both junior and senior highs. Senior high starts at 4pm and junior high starts at 5pm, after we have a meal with all the kids. We ran bible studies from January until mid-March in person we then moved bible studies from the end of March until June to online bible studies. The move to online bible studies, though not ideal or always well attended enabled us to be able to connect weekly with youth during the early lockdown of this year. We resumed in person bible studies in June and have ran them in person ever since while following the appropriate guidelines. This year our Junior and Senior highs worked through Awana books, junior high worked through a series on apologetic and senior highs on a series focused on discipleship. During our online session the junior highs went through the book of Philippians and the Senior highs went through the book of Ephesians. In the fall senior high went through a series by the bible project on how to read the bible, while the junior highs started the bible projects overview of the entire bible. Our youth bible studies have been able to be a source of normalcy during this past year and we have appreciated that for our youth.

Friday night events:

Our Friday nights are always a big part of our week and a lot of fun. These are nights where we play games, have times of worship and have a devotional. We started our Friday events normally this year until mid-March and then we moved them to online events in April. These were held over google hangouts and we played some online games and some

Jack box tv games that we could play virtually while still connecting together. We began meeting for youth in person again in the summer having some outdoor events and then began meeting weekly in the building on Fridays in September. From September-December we met for youth weekly and fairly normal in regard to activities. Once we had stricter guidelines at the end of November, we moved to running more seated events with mandatory masks. We have continued into 2021 meeting weekly in this way. Our youth attendance has been between 30-40 youth since September.

Youth Leaders:

I am extremely grateful to those who choose to serve in youth ministry with us. Our 2020 youth leaders were Heather McCoy, Ryan Robak, Tracy Bydevaate, Bruce Warkentin, Aj Friesen and Chris Lecuyer. This group has been an awesome and adaptable to the ever-changing circumstances of the year, they have also been a great encouragement to our youth and to me this past year. Thank all of you for your servanthood.

Kid's Church

January until Mid-March we ran our kids church during our church services until the pandemic required us to shut down our services. We were using new city catechism (NCC) as our curriculum which is a curriculum that goes through theological truths for the entire year. Due to the pandemic and the guidelines placed on places of worship we did not run kids church from mid-March on throughout the year. In the fall of 2020 we began looking for a kids church director and that position was filled by Diane Noble. Since Diane has taken on the position, we have actively been preparing to be able to have kids church when future guidelines allow. We look forward to offering this important ministry soon and I want to thank Diane for all the work she has done and continue to do to get things ready.

Life Groups:

We currently have 100+ adults in life group. This past year has been difficult for our groups to meet and engage in person. Many have not met physically in months and have continued to connect virtually and encourage and support each other in other ways other than meeting together. In the fall we have had some of our life groups meet in the church to continue to meet and gather together. This continues to be an option for any Life group who would like to continue to meet either to encourage and pray together or to go through a study. As the new year unfolds, I want to make Life groups a higher priority of support from myself as this year has shown us just how important they are. If you are not connected to a life group, please let me know and I would love to find a place for you.

Church Services and COVID

In mid-March we began to move our services and ministries to online and this was a considerable curve ball for Keith and I. Working to get our services online before we had our services on video as well as after took considerable work and was a learning experience for both of us. I want to acknowledge the work that Keith has done to get our services online to our church family especially last spring and summer. I also want to acknowledge the work he has put in over the last few months to make it possible for us to now live stream our services, thanks for your extra work this year Keith! It's been a unique year

with some new challenges in how we offer our ministries, I have appreciated our churches patience as we work out how to engage our church best.

- - Worked on weekly newsletter with Staff.
- - I serve as treasurer on the Taber ministerial.

- - Worked with a group of Youth Workers on best ways to engage youth ministries in rural areas during the unique year.
- - I also try to get involved in the community; I serve as the president of the Taber soccer association. I also sit on the town of Taber recreation board starting January 2019.

It is my pleasure to serve here at Taber EFC. I love the church and the ministry the church has in Taber. I have appreciated working with Keith through the challenges of the pandemic this year and appreciate his friendship. I also appreciated my 9 years of working with Karen Oddan and wish her all the best. Heather and I love being part of the church and appreciate the relationships and friendships we have made here, we look forward to many more years of ministry at Taber EFC.

Deacon Annual Report - 2020

Like everyone we have had to navigate through this following government mandated requirements, while also trying to obey God's Word. We can be encouraged through God's Word however knowing that He knows the beginning from the end and is in control over every aspect of our lives.

John 16:33 I have told you all this so that *you may have peace in me*. Here on earth, you will have many trials and sorrows. But take heart, because *I have overcome the world.*"

This has been a difficult year for our church leadership trying comply and obey our governing authorities as well as continuing to obey God in providing fellowship and care for our members. As a Deacon board it has been a challenge to know the needs of our congregants and responding to them in a responsible manner, not putting anyone at risk due to Covid 19 transmission.

Hebrews 10: 23-25 ²³ Let us hold unswervingly to the hope we profess, for he who promised is faithful. ²⁴ And *let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds,* ²⁵ *not giving up meeting together,* as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching.

As deacons we recognize the need to meet physical needs of an individual which allows us the opportunity to speak spiritual truths into their lives. We continually evaluate how can we best serve the church body so that our pastors and elders can focus on the spiritual oversight of the church community. We do this by maintaining the facility, ensuring services are orderly and comfortable and looking after the physical needs of our church body.

As the restrictions placed on the church as well as societal restrictions preventing the contact of people were put into place, it has been difficult for the deacons to know all the needs of our congregants. As such we encourage our church body to continue responding to these needs as you have opportunity or are led by God to do so. Highlights for 2020

- Deacons continue to meet monthly to discuss the needs for the building and congregants. Also continue to start each meeting with a devotional led by a different deacon.
- We are doing monthly extinguisher and emergency light testing as part of our fire inspection report.
- Major church cleaning and disinfecting all surfaces, toys, tables, chairs, bathrooms by deacons, deaconess and numerous volunteers was done in the spring.
- Cleaning of all floors including sanctuary, lobby, offices, Sunday school rooms. We want to thank Mary Fehr for the countless hours spent helping with this.
- Dealt with spring flooding issue in new addition due to excessive rain and poor drainage. Will be looking at mitigating this problem in 2021
- Worked with pastors, administration and executive board in implementing Covid 19 protocols within our church facility to continue hosting Sunday services.
- Oversaw the scheduling of ushers to accommodate 2 services and to orientate them on proper greeting and after service disinfecting of high touch surfaces.
- We have had some HVAC maintenance and repair done on rooftop heating units.

I would like to thank the deacons for their continued service in using their gifting this previous year serving our church family. We appreciate your continued support and prayers to help us better discern our role in the coming year. Thank you to our outgoing deacons Tim Reinke and Terry Enns for all you have done and we will miss you at our monthly meetings.
