After considering all of the wonderful deeds of the Lord, she refused surgery. In the middle of that very night, she woke up to the voice of the Lord telling her that He had healed her. As she examined her arm, she saw the miraculous work of God in her perfectly healed arm.


Asia, Australia and Oceania
