Sunday, March 14, 2021 4th Sunday in Lent

Today is the Fourth Sunday of Lent, the days are going by rather quickly it seems. Palm Sunday is in two weeks, the 28th, leading then into Holy Week. Easter is April 4th, but let us come back to Lent today.

Recall Lent is the season of being sorry for our sin, repentance, and seeking forgiveness. Lent is a word that in the Latin means "the lengthening of the days" noting the season of Spring. Remember the call at the beginning of Lent to either give up something or take on something. If you have not followed thru, there is still time!! Listen to what God is telling you and follow your heart.



INTRODUCTION

The fourth of the Old Testament promises providing a baptismal lens this Lent is the promise God makes to Moses: those who look on the bronze serpent will live. In today's gospel Jesus says he will be lifted up on the cross like the serpent, so that those who look to him in faith will live. When we receive the sign of the cross in baptism, that cross becomes the sign we can look to in faith for healing, for restored relationship to God, for hope when we are dying.

WORD

First Reading: Numbers 21:4-9

Though God provides food and water for the Israelites in the wilderness, they whine and grumble. They forget about the salvation they experienced in the exodus. God punishes them for their sin, but when they repent God also provides a means of healing: a bronze serpent lifted up on a pole.

4 From Mount Hor [the Israelites] set out by the way to the Red Sea, to go around the land of Edom; but the people became impatient on the way. 5 The people spoke against God and against Moses, "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food." 6 Then the Lord sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died. 7 The people came to Moses and said, "We have sinned by speaking against the Lord and against you; pray to the Lord to take away the serpents from us." So Moses prayed for the people. 8 And the Lord said to Moses, "Make a poisonous serpent, and set it on a pole; and everyone who is bitten shall look at it and live." 9 So Moses made a serpent of bronze, and put it upon a pole; and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live.

Psalm: Psalm 107:1-3, 17-22

You deliver your people from their distress. (Ps. 107:19)

- 1 Give thanks to the Lord, for the Lord is good, for God's mercy endures forever.

- 3 gathering them in from the lands; from the east and from the west, from the north and from the south.

- 20 You sent forth your word and healed them and rescued them from the grave.

- 22 Let them offer sacrifices of thanksgiving and tell of your deeds with shouts of joy.

Second Reading: Ephesians 2:1-10

While we were dead in our sinfulness, God acted to make us alive as a gift of grace in Christ Jesus. We are saved not by what we do but by grace through faith. Thus our good works are really a reflection of God's grace at work in our lives.

1 You were dead through the trespasses and sins 2 in which you once lived, following the course of this world, following the ruler of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work among those who are disobedient. 3 All of us once lived among them in the passions of our flesh, following the desires of flesh and senses, and we were by nature children of wrath, like everyone else. 4 But God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us 5 even when we were dead through our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ—by grace you have been saved—6 and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, 7 so that in the ages to come he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus. 8 For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God—9 not the result of works, so that no one may boast. 10 For we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life.

Gospel: Mark 9:33-35

33 Then they came to Capernaum; and when he was in the house he asked them, "What were you arguing about on the way?" 34 But they were silent, for on the way they had argued with one another who was the greatest. 35 He sat down, called the twelve, and said to them, "Whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all."

The Gospel of our Lord, praise to you, O Christ.



CHILDREN'S MESSAGE

SERMON

I have many sayings I like in my life. For my children, friends, family and church family I like "Be Yourself, everyone else is taken!" For my schedule, and to do list I love the WIN formula: What's Important Now!

I have introduced a new one to both congregations that I really like as we operate and run these churches: KISS! You have no doubt heard it's original definition but I have changed it to fit our churches: Keep It Simple Saints!! Yes! Let's keep it simple!

This is how I have always operated going back to while I was at Seminary. These professors have Biblical doctorates and are very intelligent. And there have been and are today many of my colleagues who are deeply intelligent and understand theology and eschatology and all of those big words. I like my faith, and my theology more simplistic.

And I would be willing to bet that's the case for most of you. I don't believe you have called me to this task as your Pastor for what we might call "high church!" Now, don't misunderstand, as I can do high church if needed. But I look at what it would mean to you and how you would be able to take these words and apply them to daily living.

Our Lenten story continues to unfold today on this 4th Sunday in Lent. Today from our devotional book we are reading the story of Jesus as told to us in the Gospel of Mark. Our verse today from chapter 9, has Jesus and his disciples traveling around and Jesus hears them arguing among themselves. They each want to be able to sit at the right hand of Jesus when He comes to set up His kingdom. They are arguing about who is the greatest.

I am sure somewhere in all of our lives we have all "argued" about this in our sinful, judgmental ways. We might feel we are better than someone else, we might judge someone as we see them across the street, or across the living room. We do this all the time and it's our sin nature we cannot help. We thank God for the grace and ability to have a "do over" (simply put) and try again.

So Jesus pulls them aside and teaches again the basic, SIMPLE truth of the life of a Christian: "Whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all!" We are to be last.....think about that a minute. How would that apply to daily living??

I have told you before of the "Fishy Order" story of my childhood. In our family home growing up my mom had three fish on the wall in the bathroom. Three different sizes large, medium and a small size. I had two younger brothers and I initiated "Fishy Order" when I wanted to be first!!! It didn't take my younger brother, Steve, too long to figure out "reverse fishy order!"

The call of Christ on us is to be "servants of all" and this is simply putting others' needs ahead of ourselves. To serve is an amazingly simple word that really doesn't take much effort, time or even energy on our parts. Look up the word "serve" and you will find: "To act as a servant" from Dictionary.com. Tennis?? Waiter or waitress?? Armed Forces?? Or how about the more simplistic definition: " to give assistance" or "be useful!"

I have a memory of visiting a restaurant (back in the day) and seeing a pad of applications by the register. At the top, written in red ink, were the words "Servers wanted!" For us, it's the same thing. Servers are wanted in the Lord's Kingdom, today, now, and that's you and that's me.

When I served as a waiter in high school I remember my manager complimenting me on how I handled my section. He said I served with a "great sense of urgency!" Important work in a restaurant but even more so in the church and in the world today. Let us serve with urgency, people need what we have to give now, not yesterday. It's so simple, so let's KISS friends, and Keep It Simply Saints!! We are here to serve, Amen.



In Person vs Virtual Worship

Starting the week of February 15th, the decision to hold worship in-person will be determined by **Marion County's color-coded level** which is updated every **Wednesday at noon,** assigning each county in the state a status of yellow, orange, or red.

- When Marion County achieves a designation of "**yellow**" in-person worship will resume the Sunday immediately following.
- The church will continue holding in-person worship, unless Marion County is listed as "**red**" at which time worship will return to virtual-only starting with the Sunday immediately following.
- Anytime the **status of worship changes, you will receive an email** from Kelli. Those who do not receive email communications will be **contacted via phone**.
- When we are able to return to in-person worship, it will be important to continue under the same guidelines that we have followed during Covid.

Constitution Updates

As was presented at our recent annual meeting, below are the two proposed amendments to our Constitution, as required. We will officially vote on these at a meeting in the future. No action is required now, however, if you have any questions, please contact Suzy Henschen. The proposed changes are in bold and underlined: C12.01 The voting membership of the Congregation Council shall consist of the pastor and <u>at least 7</u> members of the congregation.

C12.2 The members of the Congregation Council except for the pastor(s) shall be elected by written ballot to serve for <u>2</u> years or until their successors are elected. Such members shall be eligible to serve no more than <u>three</u> full terms consecutively.
