## Leaning into Lent:

#### **Jeremiah 31:31-34** The Message (MSG)

31-32 "That's right. The time is coming when I will make a brand-new covenant with Israel and Judah. It won't be a repeat of the covenant I made with their ancestors when I took their hand to lead them out of the land of Egypt. They broke that covenant even though I did my part as their Master."

33-34 "This is the brand-new covenant that I will make with Israel when the time comes. I will put my law within them — write it on their hearts! — and be their God. And they will be my people. They will no longer go around setting up schools to teach each other about God. They'll know me firsthand, the dull and the bright, the smart and the slow. I'll wipe the slate clean for each of them. I'll forget they ever sinned!"

## John 12:20-26a The Message (MSG)

A Grain of Wheat Must Die 20-21 There were some Greeks in town who had come up to worship at the Feast. They approached Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee: "Sir, we want to see Jesus. Can you help us?"

22-23 Philip went and told Andrew. Andrew and Philip together told Jesus. Jesus answered, "Time's up. The time has come for the Chosen One to be glorified.

24-25 "Listen carefully: Unless a grain of wheat is buried in the ground, dead to the world, it is never any more than a grain of wheat. But if it is buried, it sprouts and reproduces itself many times over. In the same way, anyone who holds on to life just as it is destroys that life. But if you let it go, reckless in your love, you'll have it forever, real and eternal.

26 "If any of you wants to serve me, then follow me. Then you'll be where I am, ready to serve at a moment's notice.

#### Scripture Reading(s):

Scripture is our song for the journey, the living word passed on from generation to generation to guide and inspire.

God calls us to be doers of the word and not hearers only.

#### Message/Reflections

We are coming closer to our destination on our Lenten road. On this 5<sup>th</sup> week of Lent, when we have been challenged to ask ourselves and each other "How are we doing?" we may have simply learned that we really don't know.

Our life journey right now is filled with a lot of questions, a lot of wonderings, a lot of uncertainty. Many of us really don't know how to identify how we are doing, how we are feeling.

What we do know is that we continue to travel this journey together. Together, we are holding each other up, holding on to each other, encouraging each other. Together, we are sharing our frustrations and our joys. For many of us, the changes that we are living through are the most challenging we've experienced and we resist the lack of choices we have, the feeing of being contained.

There are also many who could remember and share, if we are willing to listen, other challenges of Wars, of Illnesses, of violence, of natural disasters that took away loved ones, choices, and freedom that, in retrospect, were far worse that we are living through now.

I think that one answer to How Are We Doing? might be that we are learning to appreciate more what we do have - no, who we do have in our lives. We express our yearning to be together with family and friends that, in our Before Times, we may have taken for granted.

Another answer might be that we are learning that there are a lot of things we had that we need to let go of if we are to live forward into a world that is safe for all.

In our Jesus story today, even knowing that he was about to take his biggest risk and face his hugest challenge, Jesus reminded the disciples that there are times when you must be ready to give up what you have for what could be.

Jesus said, that if you give up all you are for the good of someone else, you have that possibility to feed, to support so many and to reap the harvest of love. Then he says, to get it right we must follow his teachings.

Holding onto the present and the past holds back life. Trying to remain as the one grain of wheat we are, will not bring healing or hope to the world. But, if we are willing to take the risk, to rise to the challenge...oh... the

differences we can make. If, he says, we are willing to let go of ourselves, and give our life for others the reward is more than we might imagine.

Isn't that true for us today? Aren't we asked to give up the life we are used to so that others can have life? It's also true that being asked to make that decision is temporary – we know it is. So why is it so hard to do?

We live in a privileged part of the world and we often become blind to our privilege. We grumble about how hard our life is – and I agree, our challenges are many... but...

Have you been aware of the turmoil in Myanmar? Since the military coup at the beginning of February 2021, at least 193 peaceful protesters have been murdered as part of a terror campaign by the military to force the people of Myanmar to accept military rule. Once again Rohingya citizens find their lives in danger and are becoming Refugees looking for safety.

Have you been aware of a shooting in Atlanta that has taken the lives of 7 women and 1 man? And that the Asian communities are experiencing a great fear of persecution?

Have you been aware of an incident in a school in Leduc this week that resulted in the loss of the life of a young woman?

Have you heard that the Vatican has said that LGBTQ couples are unable to receive a church blessing because they are a 'sin'?

Have you heard the concern with choices around coal and oil that are negatively impacting the environment we share?

The world is not horrible place, really it's not, but it's not perfect either. It needs work and support to be it's best. How are we doing?

In the scriptures that Jesus would have known and heard, from the story of Prophet Jeremiah, we are reminded that we have some of the answers within ourselves. We see God's capacity to assess a situation, see what sacrifice and change is needed, and to change directions to fill the need.

We are reminded that God has placed within us the power of and the capacity for love.

We are told that we don't need to be told what to do – God has already placed the answers in our hearts. Love and be love in an imperfect world.

Listening with our hearts, following the many examples that Jesus gave us of risking, of taking up the challenges God puts before us to give up ourselves so that others may be protected, is what we gather to learn and live in our worship.

Our words, our prayer, our songs connect us with God – with that voice of love written on our hearts. We are reminded to be grateful for what we have. We are reminded to give all that we can because of the love God has given us.

Where is our capacity to change directions to fill the needs of God's people? We are taught by so many of our stories to give in to God, to give up for God, to give out love as God did – this is what we are meant to do. This is what Jesus asked us to do and showed us how to do.

How are we doing?
