THE GATHERING OF THE COMMUNITY

The Greeting

Presider All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to our own way, and the Lord has laid on Christ the iniquity of us all.

Christ the Lord became obedient unto death, even death on a cross.

Silence

God of mercy and forgiveness, we have sinned in thought and word and deed; we have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbours as ourselves. We pray you of your mercy, forgive us all that is past, and grant that we may serve you in newness of life to the glory of your name. Amen.

The Collect of the Day

Presider The Lord be with you. And also with you. Let us pray.

Almighty God, look graciously, we pray, on this your family, for whom our Lord Jesus Christ was willing to be betrayed and given into the hands of sinners, and to suffer death upon the cross; who now lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD

The Psalm: Psalm 22.1-6, 15-22, 29-31

Psalmist

My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?

¹ My God, my God, why have you forsaken me * and are so far from my cry and from the words of my distress?
² O my God, I cry in the daytime, but you do not answer; * by night as well, but I find no rest.
³ Yet you are the Holy One, * enthroned upon the praises of Israel.

My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?

⁴ Our ancestors put their trust in you; * they trusted, and you delivered them.
⁵ They cried out to you and were delivered; * they trusted in you and were not put to shame.
⁶ But as for me, I am a worm and not human, * scorned by all and despised by the people.

¹⁵ My mouth is dried out like a potsherd; my tongue sticks to the roof of my mouth; * and you have laid me in the dust of the grave.
¹⁶ Packs of dogs close me in and gangs of evildoers circle around me; * they pierce my hands and my feet.
¹⁷ I can count all my bones * while they stare and gloat over me.
¹⁸ They divide my garments among them; * they cast lots for my clothing.

¹⁹ Be not far away, O Lord; * you are my strength; hasten to help me.
²⁰ Save me from the sword, * my life from the power of the dog.
²¹ Save me from the lion's mouth, * my wretched body from the horns of wild bulls.
²² I will declare your name to my kindred; * in the midst of the congregation I will praise you.

²⁹ To God alone all who sleep in the earth bow down in worship; * all who go down to the dust fall before God.
³⁰ My soul shall live for God; my descendants shall serve God; * they shall be known as the Lord's for ever.
³¹ They shall come and make known to a people yet unborn * the saving deeds that God has done.

Psalmist

Holy One, Jesus felt abandoned and cried out in anguish from the cross, yet you delivered him. He overcame the bonds of death and you raised him in triumph from the grave. Do not hide your face from those who cry out to you: feed the hungry, strengthen the weak, and break the chains of the oppressed, so that your people may rejoice in your saving deeds. This we ask in the name of your Beloved, Jesus Christ. **Amen.**

The Reading: John 19.1-42

Reader 1

The Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

Reader 1

[Pilate] took Jesus and had him flogged. And the soldiers wove a crown of thorns and put it on his head, and they dressed him in a purple robe. They kept coming up to him, saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" and striking him on the face. Pilate went out again and said to them, "Look, I am bringing him out to you to let you know that I find no case against him." So Jesus came out, wearing the crown of thorns and the purple robe. Pilate said to them, "Here is the man!" When the chief priests and the police saw him, they shouted, "Crucify him! Crucify him!" Pilate said to them, "Take him yourselves and crucify him; I find no case against him." The [authorities] answered him, "We have a law, and according to that law he ought to die because he has claimed to be the Son of God."

Reader 2

Now when Pilate heard this, he was more afraid than ever. He entered his headquarters again and asked Jesus, "Where are you from?" But Jesus gave him no answer. Pilate therefore said to him, "Do you refuse to speak to me? Do you not know that I have power to release you, and power to crucify you?" Jesus answered him, "You would have no power over me unless it had been given you from above; therefore the one who handed me over to you is guilty of a greater sin." From then on Pilate tried to release him, but the [authorities] cried out, "If you release this man, you are no friend of the emperor. Everyone who claims to be a king sets himself against the emperor."

Reader 3

When Pilate heard these words, he brought Jesus outside and sat on the judge's bench at a place called The Stone Pavement, or in Hebrew Gabbatha. Now it was the day of Preparation for the Passover; and it was about noon. He said to the [crowd], "Here is your King!" They cried out, "Away with him! Away with him! Crucify him!" Pilate asked them, "Shall I crucify your King?" The chief priests answered, "We have no king but the emperor." Then he handed him over to them to be crucified.

Reader 1

So they took Jesus; and carrying the cross by himself, he went out to what is called The Place of the Skull, which in Hebrew is called Golgotha. There they crucified him, and with him two others, one on either side, with Jesus between them. Pilate also had an inscription written and put on the cross. It read, "Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews." [Many of the onlookers] read this inscription, because the place where Jesus was crucified was near the city; and it was written in Hebrew, in Latin, and in Greek. Then [the chief priests] said to Pilate, "Do not write, 'The King of the Jews,' but, 'This man said, I am King of the Jews.'" Pilate answered, "What I have written I have written." When the soldiers had crucified Jesus, they took his clothes and divided them into four parts, one for each soldier. T hey also took his tunic; now the tunic was seamless, woven in one piece from the top.

Reader 2

So they said to one another, "Let us not tear it, but cast lots for it to see who will get it." This was to fulfill what the scripture says, "They divided my clothes among themselves, and for my clothing they cast lots." And that is what the soldiers did.

Reader 3

Meanwhile, standing near the cross of Jesus were his mother, and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene. When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple whom he loved standing beside her, he said to his mother, "Woman, here is your son." Then he said to the disciple, "Here is your mother." And from that hour the disciple took her into his own home.

Reader 1

After this, when Jesus knew that all was now finished, he said (in order to fulfill the scripture), "I am thirsty." A jar full of sour wine was standing there. So they put a sponge full of the wine on a branch of hyssop and held it to his mouth. When Jesus had received the wine, he said, "It is finished." Then he bowed his head and gave up his spirit.

Silence

Reader 2

Since it was the day of Preparation, the Jews did not want the bodies left on the cross during the sabbath, especially because that sabbath was a day of great so-lemnity. So they asked Pilate to have the legs of the crucified men broken and the bodies removed. Then the soldiers came and broke the legs of the first and of the other who had been crucified with him. But when they came to Jesus and saw that he was already dead, they did not break his legs. Instead, one of the soldiers pierced his side with a spear, and at once blood and water came out. (He who saw this has testified so that you also may believe. His testimony is true, and he knows that he tells the truth.) These things occurred so that the scripture might be fulfilled, "None of his bones shall be broken." And again another passage of scripture says, "They will look on the one whom they have pierced."

Reader 3

After these things, Joseph of Arimathea, who was a disciple of Jesus, though a secret one because of his fear of the Jews, asked Pilate to let him take away the body of Jesus. Pilate gave him permission; so he came and removed his body. Nicodemus, who had at first come to Jesus by night, also came, bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes, weighing about a hundred pounds. They took the body of Jesus and wrapped it with the spices in linen cloths, according to the burial custom of the Jews. Now there was a garden in the place where he was crucified, and in the garden there was a new tomb in which no one had ever been laid. And so, because it was the Jewish day of Preparation, and the tomb was nearby, they laid Jesus there.
