Candle Lighting

We light the Christ Candle, aware of God around, among, & within us. In a moment of silence, we prepare ourselves to celebrate God's presence in our community.

Coming into Worship

In the faith stories shared through the ages, and in our current life experiences we are encouraged to listen for God's voice and to respond to it.

We are now living into the Easter season of the church. One of the root meanings of the word Easter comes from the old English Eostre, meaning "'dawn". The dawning of a new day brings with it so many new possibilities.

Our liturgical colours are now White and Gold. White, which is all colours of light combined, represents goodness, innocence and God's faithfulness. While gold has been used as reflections of glory, triumph, wealth, richness and extravagance, it is also associated with illumination, love, compassion, courage and wisdom.

White and gold combined are colours of celebration.

The stories of Eastertide, speak to us of Jesus return in those first days, but also how the community responded to God's call and Jesus admonition to Love each other and to work together.

In this time when we hear stories of God's dawning... of God's goodness... of God's faithfulness May our hearts be drawn toward places that challenge us to find and follow the Holy in all our days and actions. Come, let us worship and learn together

Scripture Reading:

John 20:19-31 New International Version Jesus Appears to His Disciples

19 On the evening of that first day of the week, when the disciples were together, with the doors locked for fear of the Jewish leaders, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you!" 20 After he said this, he showed them his hands and side. The disciples were overjoyed when they saw the Lord.

21 Again Jesus said, "Peace be with you! As the Father has sent me, I am sending you." 22 And with that he breathed on them and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. 23 If you forgive anyone's sins, their sins are forgiven; if you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven."

Jesus Appears to Thomas

24 Now Thomas (also known as Didymus), one of the Twelve, was not with the disciples when Jesus came. 25 So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord!"

But he said to them, "Unless I see the nail marks in his hands and put my finger where the nails were, and put my hand into his side, I will not believe."

26 A week later his disciples were in the house again, and Thomas was with them. Though the doors were locked, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you!" 27 Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here; see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it into my side. Stop doubting and believe."

28 Thomas said to him, "My Lord and my God!"

29 Then Jesus told him, "Because you have seen me, you have believed; blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed."

The Purpose of John's Gospel

30 Jesus performed many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not recorded in this book. 31 But these are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name.

Scripture Reading:

Acts 4:32-35 New International Version

The Believers Share Their Possessions

32 All the believers were one in heart and mind. No one claimed that any of their possessions was their own, but they shared everything they had. 33 With great power the apostles continued to testify to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus. And God's grace was so powerfully at work in them all 34 that there were no needy persons among them. For from time to time those who owned land or houses sold them, brought the money from the sales 35 and put it at the apostles' feet, and it was distributed to anyone who had need.

Scripture is our song for the journey, the living word passed on from generation to generation to guide and inspire.

God calls us to be doers of the word and not hearers only.

Reflection:

Easter Sunday is celebrated as a day of light and love and the gift of new life: Jesus rose from the dead, giving a glimpse of the power of God.

We rejoice. We should and we need to.

This story teaches us that God can and will lift us from terror, horror, hurt and a cruel world, into a place of calm, healing and love that we can only imagine. This story invites us to stand up for truth and justice, the weak and the vulnerable, to know that God will be right beside us every step of the way.

But this Easter thing we celebrate is, a momentary flash in the pan. The brightness of the light and the love of that day and time were quickly dimmed by the human realness of fear, of worry, of stubbornness.

In our first reading, we encounter those disciples again... the ones who often questioned, the ones who weren't quite sure, the ones who sometimes didn't have the courage to stand up for what they believed in. We meet them as they hid.

They recognized that, because of the events of the previous days, they could be targets for the Roman Empire. They had probably spent their Passover Sabbath worrying about what had happened.

Then they heard reports of Jesus rising from the dead – what was with that? Who believed that could happen? And if it had what were they supposed to do about it?

Into these terrified hearts and troubled souls, Jesus appeared to them through locked doors and windows. As happens in these COVID times when we, too, find ourselves huddling in small groups of family to be safe, Jesus came to them in their fear and said "Peace be with you."

Knowing their frustration, their problems with being locked down, locked in, Jesus basically said "Calm yourselves, it will be alright"

He told them what they needed to know. Not everything that had happened to him, but enough that they would be assured that there was hope to live forward into.

Then we meet Thomas. Thomas wasn't there when they got the first Jesus news. We don't know why he wasn't there. Perhaps he was looking for food for the group, perhaps he was trying to find out more information about the Roman plans, perhaps he was looking after other Jewish families who were afraid. We don't know.

What we do know is that, in this atmosphere of fear and terror, Thomas, a loyal disciple, needed to see for himself the glimpse of Jesus, the glimpse of hope, that others had seen.

It was not enough to be told: he needed to see.

Jesus didn't come back that very same day. Thomas had to wait a week before he received the answer he was asking for? I think that Jesus gave a gentle reminder that if others share information with you, and you consider them credible resources, you should act on that information.

As I look at this particular scripture in our COVID context, I see some parallels to our living today: we are threatened by something that is unpredictable; we are finding ourselves feeling trapped together and helpless to make good decisions; we don't trust the people around us when they share information; and we want answers quicker than they may be available or even if it is wise for us to have them.

Jesus' advice to those disciples was to be calm, to be at peace with where they were and to trust that God would be with them.

I wonder if that is the advice God is offering us today? To be calm, to trust those we know have the skills to offer us information – even if we haven't seen it for ourselves. Thomas reminds me of the folk who refuse to believe what everyone else knows until they see it with his own eyes. But in our context, this means that someone we know and love must be made ill or die from COVID for us to it exists. Jesus said, you are more blessed if you believe without seeing.

Our second reading is a jump ahead from those first days of Easter fear. We begin our journey through the book of Acts where we see how the community that followed Jesus tried to change their behaviour to fit their faith. They banded together for the good of all. They put everything they had together and then shared it out equally between all of the community members. Some put in more than others, but they all received the same out.

As they travelled into life from Easter morning, that time of fear and disbelief, the community realized that they couldn't stay hiding in a room, that there was other work to be done. So, when the time was right, they began to address other concerns.

In comparing ourselves to the disciples, we see that we still need to heed the advice and information about trusting the right people and following their advice, but that we must now be aware of others who need support and advocacy.

On Thursday this week, April 8, United Churches were invited to join our Moderator, Richard Bott, in advocating for Basic Guaranteed Income. Richard's voice was accompanied by other former Moderators and other church leaders from other denominations as they asked us to ensure that all receive the opportunity to have a certain, basic, dignified quality of life.

Let us hear the lessons of our faith: calm ourselves down; exercise the patience that is needed to wait for answers; look for opportunities to live the love that God gives us; be aware that there are many others worse off than we are who need us to bring Easter light in their life.

Let us be unafraid to ask our questions, but also courageous enough to live care in the world before we have all of the answers.

Let Peace be with us, and come from us into this hurting world.
