Retreat day, our October Board Meeting and from the Shared Ministry Conference that a team jointly from SUC and St. John's attended at the beginning of October.



Board of Trustees Report



this year.

An additional \$100,000 will be needed to cover off some unexpected soft costs related to the project. Unfortunately, this was brought to our

attention after the construction cost cutting budget review was completed so we were not able to reduce our project scope to accommodate it. That will leave us with an approximate balance of \$350,000 in our investment fund.

We must also budget approximately \$75,000 for furnishings, chairs and audiovisual/sound system etc. for the new sanctuary. We (congregation) must decide on

what all we would like to have in this regard. Unless we raise more funds in a fundraising drive, that expenditure will come in whole or in part from our investments.

With these deductions, it is estimated that on September 01 this year our investment account balance could be/will be approximately \$250,000 (note: I purposely use round dollar numbers. It might be slightly higher or lower).

As a congregation, we must then decide on the best use of our remaining funds. This past 3 years we have spent \$60,000 per year to support our operating account. This will likely continue and may well increase (as long as the money holds out). This will depend on whether we can increase our giving's. Potential rent revenue is another factor.

In conclusion, 2017 will be the year to decide on revised directives to your Board of Trustees on the future disbursement of our investment funds. The options will require your careful consideration. Indeed, some important decisions need to be made. We look forward to the discussion.

Ministry and Personnel Report

The M&P Committee had a relatively uneventful year in 2016. The committee met in February and discussed the possible need to alter Jody's work hours at such time as the sponsored Syrian families arrived in Squamish and the oversight role of the Refugee Sponsorship Sub-Committee began. In the end,

no such alteration was needed. However, after discussion with members of the committee Jody did take on the job of secretary to St. John's Anglican Church in addition to those of Squamish United when their secretary resigned.

The committee recognized that having 1.5 full-time ministers between the two congregations during the period of joint ministry provides an opportunity for creative innovation to energize our congregation. The committee supported Karen's desire to do adult ministry while recognizing that it is within her role as minister to ensure that Children's Church remains a vital part of our congregation.

There were few other issues identified during the year and those that were (such as approval of staff holiday times), committee members handled largely on an informal basis. A proposed review and possible revision of the Minister's job description and the annual staff performance reviews were deferred but will be conducted in 2017.

No conflicts or significant concerns were brought by the congregation to the M&P Committee during 2016.

Treasurer's Report



Summary: In aggregate, SUC's financial results for 2016 were slightly better than our beginning of year budget & expectations. Costs came in largely as forecast except for an unexpected municipal expense (taxes), while revenues from investments exceeded expectations, compensating for an unfortunate 10% drop in donations. Overall our net worth remains healthy, and our overall annual performance has been close to beginning-of-year predictions.

Synopsis of interim results:

Investment income 2016 totaled \$ 56,048, plus \$7071 in capital campaign funds. Investment expenses 2016 totaled \$1370 for fees, plus \$20,400 for the Minister's Housing Allowance.

Income from operations 2016 totaled \$ 53,437 while operating expenses totaled \$112,722.

Net Income for SUC YTD is minus \$21,987. SUC Net equity = \$2.32M.

For 2016, investments generated equivalent funds to donations and other revenues – both almost \$60K. The variance in operating loss is largely due to less than anticipated donations (\$7K) and the unexpected mid-year tax bill (\$7K). The result is that our actuals tracked remarkably close to our budget plan.

Capital funds expended towards Centrepoint as of end 2016 (construction draws) = \$1,044,397. Still to go to completion = \$846,141. The building fund was originally set up at \$1,782,000 - thus we will eventually need to draw \$106K (or less depending on contingency remaining) from our remaining investment account. The precise amount of that extra withdrawal will not be known till June.

Facilities Development Report



FINALLY!! All the work, the visioning, the planning, the reviewing of the plans, the revising of the plans and at long last, acceptance of the plans resulted in the welcome sight of Kindred's construction crew and trades starting site work in late April. Work continued in a very efficient manner throughout the remainder of the year so the shell of the project was completed by the end of the year.

You may recall that at the end of last year, we had redesigned the project in order to reduce costs. At the

start of 2016, we were awaiting the result of the revised tender process. This came within budget limitations so the contracts were signed and the arrangements were made to start construction.

Construction has gone according to plan. To be sure, there were some unexpected hiccups which is expected with any project (who knew about the buried fuel tank that used to supply our furnace oil back in the 1960's?? And don't get us started on invasive species!!) but overall things have gone according to the plan laid out by our construction contractor Kindred Construction Ltd.. They have advised they are still on track to essentially complete the construction by mid to late May following which there will be a month or so of inspections. While the Committee has not started move in discussions, current thinking is that we should have the legal arrangements dealt with and be in a position move in by early September.

This has been a complex and exciting undertaking for our Committee and it is great to see our new home develop. From here, the possibilities and the opportunities that we have dreamt about can take shape. Our thanks to everyone who have provided support both for the project and for us a Committee.

Mission and Service Report



The Mission and Service (M&S) Committee represents a part of the United Church of Canada which focusses on needs beyond the local church. Canada is a wealthy and fortunate country. The needs in parts of Canada and other countries are very great, and can be overwhelming. M&S funds organizations and projects in Canada and elsewhere. A wide range of initiatives and organizations are supported. In Canada, these include; families affected by the justice

system when a family member is jailed, local drop in centres in disadvantaged parts of communities, ministry for small churches, Christian camps, and chaplains at universities. In the broader world, M&S is involved with ecumenical organizations, a variety of social justice causes, and small groups in poor countries wrestling with unfair governments or companies. If there is a large-scale disaster, such as the Syrian refugee crisis, the United Church works collaboratively with other churches through an organization known as Action of Churches Together (ACT). This results in a more effective and immediate response to disasters. Often there is an appeal by M&S in such cases, and our local M&S committee informs the congregation about the appeal.

The M&S committee also regularly informs the congregation, through the weekly "Minute for Mission" talk, about an example project of M&S. The Committee members are Christine Tribe, Barbara Stover, Muriel Shephard, Pat Wilson and Hugh Kerr.

Besides regular M&S designated giving's by the congregation, funds also are raised by items taken for recycling to the local Bottle Depot, and donated to account # 205. In 2016 funds from recycling amounted to over \$125, and M&S designated funds through envelope giving's were \$12,656, which is almost the same as in 2015.

The Committee is very grateful for these donations. We ask that you continue to support M&S through regular giving's in 2017.

We would also welcome new members of the M&S Committee. No application forms, or experience, are needed. Only a desire to inform yourself and the congregation about M&S activities in Canada and around the world.

Newcomers Committee Report

The Refugee Committee was formed during the fall of 2015 as a result of the Syrian refugee crisis and the appeal to Canadians for sponsors. Four sponsoring groups were formed in Squamish to each support a Syrian family. They asked to work with Squamish United Church to help them in several ways. As a result, a Squamish United Refugee Committee was established. At present, it includes Vicki and Kevin Haberl, Nairn Stewart, Louise Martin, Elizabeth Kerr and Hugh Kerr. Ken Tanner, church treasurer, also has been instrumental in understanding and overcoming the many financial challenges associated with the sponsorships. Each sponsoring group includes at least one member of the Committee. Many family sponsorships are organized by a larger organization, such as the refugee office of the United Church of Canada. The local Refugee Committee has been a liaison between the local sponsoring group and the larger organization, and have been involved with planning budgets and tasks distributions of the groups. In addition, the budget, donations and expenditures of each group are monitored by the Committee. Two meetings of all the groups were also held, organized by the Church Refugee Committee, to discuss the many aspects of sponsorship.

There now are three Syrian families in Squamish. ("Newcomers", rather than "refugees" has been adopted as a more welcoming term.) One family with 2 children arrived in May, one with 6 children in October, and one with three children in December. Two of the families spoke very little English. A fourth family is still

awaited, (and has been for over a year). Their application is reported to be progressing recently, and we are hopeful they will arrive soon. Details about the

families have not been publicized locally, on purpose. Politics in Syria are very complex, and there are concerns that publicity about the newcomer families might be detrimental to their families still in Syria. Furthermore, they deserve the privacy which other Canadians enjoy.

The sponsoring groups organized housing, furniture, initial food supplies, clothing and other needed items. They also organized who would help with the many

required tasks. These arrangements have worked very well. The school age children in each family are enrolled in school, and are progressing well with English. The family which speaks English well has adapted to Canada very well, and the father has employment. The other two families arrived recently, but also are adapting well. They are enrolled in some special English classes as well as being tutored by members of the groups. All the families are enrolled in the government health plan, and family doctors have been arranged. Local dentists have donated examination services.

The tasks by the groups are ongoing, especially for the families with limited English. The District has donated bus passes for the families for the year, which is very helpful. But with the low frequency of bus service, and the need for coordination with school, doctor and other needs, transport by group members is often needed. The groups also have organized various outings for the families, as well as dinners.

The congregation has been very generous with donations for the families. A total of \$13,035.26 has been received, in addition to the funds which the sponsorship groups have raised. The families are very grateful for this help. Some of these funds were used as bridging funds between when rental space became available for the large family and their actual arrival. Other significant costs are expected, such as extensive dental care, and airfare repayment to the government.

During this transitional year of 2016, the Squamish United Church Women (UCW) continued to share fellowship, and to offer programs and activities to support the church. Many changes were made to our organization.

UCW is a regular monthly contributor to hosting coffee hour after church, providing treats to enjoy during our combined fellowship

with the Anglicans. Special catering events included a 100th birthday celebration for L. Ingraham, and a 90th birthday celebration for Moneta.

UCW hosted a Family Snow Day at the Whistler Olympic Park on January 24 with approximately 15 members of the congregation coming out to ski or snowshoe.

World Day of Prayer was on March 4, 2016 with a theme of "Receive Children, Receive Me." Many thanks to Grace Halvorson who led the organization of the event, with the help of other members. There were 53 participants from 5 different church communities in Squamish.

UCW raised funds through its chicken sales, with one in the spring and one in the fall. Total profits from both sales was more than \$1000.

The annual "Let's Talk Turkey" luncheon was held on the Sunday before Advent. This luncheon raises money to purchase several turkeys for the annual Christmas dinner hosted by First United Church in downtown Vancouver. This year's donations of \$520 exceeded the cost of the turkeys, enabling us to also donate to the Women's Centre and Helping Hands.

A significant change in 2016 was the merging of the MacKenzie Unit and Bethany Unit. There was broad support to enhance the efficiency of the work of these two units by working together. The combined "Macbeth" unit eliminates the duplication of effort to organize and manage two separate groups, meetings, activities, etc. Soon thereafter it was also determined that UCW Executive was also a duplication of effort. The role of executive had once been to coordinate the various units of UCW, and to be the direct link to the board as a representative of all units. UCW

representation on the board will now be a position that is included in the Macbeth elections each year.

Harmony Unit continued meeting on alternate months during most of 2016, attending the Hilltop House birthday tea every other month, bringing friendship and comfort to the residents there. By the end of 2016, the Harmony unit transitioned to meeting on an as-and-when-required basis. The fellowship and support these members offer one another is not to be scheduled into weekly agendas, but to ebb and flow with the needs of its members.
