The reality is that while there are many good things to remember, we also know that some things need to change for good reasons, and if there is no change, then there is the danger of becoming stagnant. The challenge is to balance what we know and remember

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about our history with how we are experiencing life now, and then ask ourselves what this journey has taught us about where God is leading us into the future. Perhaps what nostalgia offers is the reminder that when we are struggling and unsure of the way forward, we can look back to those times when God was faithful to us, reminding us that God will continue to be faithful now and into the future yet to be revealed.

DIACONAL COVENANT

At the 10:30 Livestreamed Service on Sunday May 9th, our Deacon the Rev. Lynn Cawthra joined our Rector, Archdeacon Clara for the service. It was the occasion where our parish and Deacon Lynn renewed their relationship with each other. It was a significant event for Deacon Lynn as she has spent the past nearly 2 years discerning her vocation while continuing her diaconal ministry to seniors in their homes. She describes her ministry as life-giving and meaningful, and that it has evolved over the past few years with an increasing desire to focus on endof-life care. Her covenant reflects that focus on her ministry and hopes that her end-of-life care to seniors in the community and on the fringes of our churches will grow and develop over time. She is currently taking a registered training program for endof-life caregiver and will use these skills in her work in the Nanaimo/ Parksville area. The hope is that her diaconal work will become more of a regional role that would allow her to work collaboratively and be a resource person for parishes in the Nanaimo area, with their clergy and pastoral care teams.

PREPARING TO SLOWLY RETURN

Questions are occasionally being raised about when and how will we be able to return to some of the activities that we have missed over this past year. As more and more of us are vaccinated, the sense of hope and renewed energy is motivating us to think to the future even though we really don't know yet what that will look like. That is the challenge we face: we don't know how things will unfold over the next few months.

Will we be able to return to inperson worship this summer? Will we be able to welcome some of our user groups back into our facility, and when? Will we be able to meet in smaller groups in the building or in the garden? What will communion look like and will we be able to have social time together after the services? Others are saying, let's not rush things; let's wait and see how things go. Some are still concerned and uncomfortable in public settings and may need more time before they are ready to gather in-person.

We are committed to a thoughtful and careful planning for a slow return to in-person worship and activities when we are able. At the writing of this article, no clear indications have been made about possible timelines. We have learned over this past year that the best laid plans can change on a dime, and in fact we have had to do that several times. We continue to work on our online presence and the capacity to continue to provide livestream services that will help us and the wider community to connect with our parish in

ways that we never dreamed possible before this pandemic. We have COVID protocols from our Fall opening season from last year, and we will be reviewing and updating those guidelines based on any new restrictions or changes since the last time we were able to be in-person.

We are hopeful that in-person gatherings will be possible sometime in the summer, but we simply do not know that for certain. Our leadership team including the Rector, Wardens and Parish Council have decided that even IF the restrictions allow for re-opening in June or July, we will wait to begin our process of reopening until some time after the August long weekend. (Note: at the writing of this article, no timelines for re-opening have yet to be determined). Waiting until August will allow our rector and staff to take some much-needed rest and vacation time before the hard work of preparing for a re-opening. The leadership team will continue to provide updates as more information is made available.

TREASURER REPORT

The Financial Statement to the end of April 2021.

Income for 4 months \$92,562.82

Expenses for 4 months \$110,108.54

Subtotal (\$17,545.72)

Balance from Dec 31, 2020 (\$13,527.88)

Current deficit balance (\$31,074.60)

INCOME: Open & Envelope, Lent & Easter offerings plus the other income are above the expected year-to-date budget by \$11,735.

EXPENSES: were much higher than the expected year-to-date budget by \$24,325.

 The main factor driving the expenses up was the \$16,094 of insurance costs which were paid out in March. Our insurance premiums jumped by about 36.4% since March of 2020.

Hopefully, going forward, the difference between the income & expenses should be reduced as the year progresses, unless we get hit with an unexpected large bill.

The good news is that the Diocese has forgiven our loan on the Centre for Ministry. This will allow us to concentrate our giving toward the operating costs of running the church and the hall.

GARDENING REPORT


