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

A Chat with MARION MCKERSIE

Marion Spinks was born at home in Brantford, near the present site of the Mohawk Church. Her Daddy, Harold, had immigrated to Canada from England at age 19. Her mother, Anne, was born in Canada, to parents who had also come from England. Both Anne's father and brother were killed in WW1, and Anne left school at age 13 when her mother became ill. She worked at the Brantford school for the blind, doing all manner of housekeeping chores.

Harold and Anne had 3 children; Marion, a sister 5 years older, and a brother 11 years younger. During the depression, Harold had to leave home to work for a farmer, where he earned \$10 a month, plus room and board. Most of his pay went home to support his family. While she raised the children, Anne worked from home, sewing baseballs for the Spalding Company. When Marion was 5 years old, they moved to Galt, where Marion attended Central School and Galt Collegiate.

Marion says her life was happy, especially with her best friend Joan McKellar and 3 other friends who chummed around together. They were an active bunch, with tobogganing in winter, biking, dances, hanging out at Mary's BBQ, and roller skating at the Galt Arena. She and Joan thought nothing of walking from Galt to the Preston Scout House. In winter, she and her Daddy were real hockey fans, cheering on the Galt Red Wings. For 2 weeks each summer, the Spinks family rented a cottage in Port Dover, and Marion's friend, Joan, was always a guest.

Eventually, an older fellow named George Lywood started to show up at the roller rink or at the high school, with his eye on Marion. They were married at Trinity Anglican Church when Marion was 17. Before their children were born, Marion worked at Preston Woodworking Machinery as a receptionist/typist, and then at the Gas company. They had 4 children: Bill, born in 1954; Tim, 1955; Denise, 1958; and Dan, 1965. Denise was born with hydrocephaly. She had many, many hospitalizations during her young life. Still, Marion says "When she was well, she was well," happy and always smiling. Marion spent a lot of time with Denise at Sick Kids Hospital in Toronto. At the same time, the family needed her income to help pay for all the medical bills and commutes to Toronto. She says that "The Lord gave us Mr. & Mrs. Greer", retired farmers who cared for the children while Marion was at work or at the hospital. Denise died in 1967, when she was just 9 years old. Marion's husband, George, died in 1977, when Bill was away at university, Tim was working, and Dan was just 12 years old.

Marion worked as a bookkeeper at Hespeler Furniture in Preston while raising Dan. It was there that she met Bruce McKersie. They were married at St. James Church, Hespeler, in 1982. Bruce had had to leave school in Grade 8, to run the family farm after his Dad became paraplegic. He became a boilermaker, and later a maintenance foreman. Bruce could fix anything. They bought a cottage near Wasaga Beach, where they spent their weekends while Marion enjoyed reading and knitting on the beach while Bruce enjoyed a large renovation project. When they purchased an old house, he renovated it himself. Together, they travelled Canada from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and in BC north to Prince Rupert and south through the state of Washington. They drove west 14 times by various routes, sometimes through the northern U.S. states. Marion says the most beautiful place she visited was Osoyoos, BC, and that she would have moved there if she thought Bruce could enjoy the quiet of that mountain-ringed desert community.

While living in Galt, Marion attended both Trinity and St. David's. When she and Bruce married, they went to St. James, but came to St. Tom's when they moved to Shep's subdivision and later to Woodstock. Since Bruce passed away in 2009, Marion's involvement at St. Tom's includes being treasurer of the ACW, Altar Guild mistress, and super-baker/coffee brewer for the weekly coffee hour. Today, she has 14 grandchildren and 11 great grands. In between her frequent trips driving friends for shopping and appointments, she loves knitting, baking, and reading.

Marion says there is no loss more devastating than the loss of a child, and her loss of Denise is always present. She says you should always "Be yourself; love people; and don't judge people for who they are, because the Lord didn't put us on the earth to judge others." Good advice.

Whole Wheat Banana Bread

(submitted by Pat Anderson)

3-4 very ripe bananas, mashed ← (I use 3 large bananas to total 1.5 cups mashed)

2 tablespoons melted butter

1/4 cup unsweetened applesauce 1/2 cup sugar

1 egg1 teaspoon vanilla1 teaspoon baking soda1/4 teaspoon salt

3/4 cup whole wheat flour 3/4 cup all-purpose flour

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Spray an 8.5-inch by 4.5-inch loaf pan with cooking spray and set aside.

Place mashed bananas, melted butter, and applesauce in a large bowl. Use a wooden spoon to mix together.

Add sugar, egg, and vanilla to banana mixture. Stir until well blended.

Sprinkle baking soda and salt over mixture and stir until well blended.

Add whole wheat flour and all-purpose flour last, stirring just until combined. Be careful not to over-mix or your bread will be tough.

Pour batter into prepared loaf pan. Bake for 35-55 minutes, or until brown and toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Be careful not to over-bake your loaf, so check it early on. Mine usually only takes about 45 minutes to cook.

Cool on a wire rack. Remove from pan and slice to serve.
