I've always described the Youth Unlimited™ organization to be like 'no man's land', a middle ground. Spaces provided by local YFC chapters are areas for students to just be. I often find a separation between students caused by what youth group or school they attend; they find a group and stay with that group, rarely meeting kids from other churches, youth groups or schools, and I feel as though this is keeping them from making so many friendships and seeing other kids from around town in a more personal context. A personal goal I have for our YFC chapter is to lessen this occurrence. I love creating spaces where the most unlikely of people show up and begin to converse and build friendships.

I oversee a program that runs every Friday evening called 'Friday Nights', and am continuing it throughout the summer, calling it 'Game On'. This program creates an open space for students to intermingle with teens they have never met before from other schools and youth groups. So many friendships and relationships have already been built since this program has started and I know that it will only continue to grow, God willing! We're redefining this 'no man's land' to be a safe space, a space to just be, a space to grow in friendship, to laugh, and to know that you are seen and loved.


