Daniel 7: Using strange images common to the time, Daniel compares the rise of terrible kings to the rise of God's holy ones who are the true inheritors of the earth.

Ephesians I: The Ephesian Christians are warmly encouraged in their faith. For Paul this is a faith based on the life, death & resurrection of Christ.

Luke 6: Luke's great sermon of Jesus includes a form of the Beatitudes & the Golden Rule.

Sermon Notes

Today's Christian Priority: Fellowship

Today we celebrate the great Christian Feast of All Saint's (transferred from the 1st). All Saint's is the day after All Hallow's Eve (Halloween). All good feasts follow a great evening the night before. (Christmas follows Christmas Eve, Easter follows the Great Vigil of Holy Saturday.) The reason for this is that the Church calendar follows the old lunar calendar of the Hebrew peoples where each day begins at sunset rather than sunrise.

In the Feast of All Saints we are reminded of the incredible community of the Followers of Jesus. God has placed us in community. We are not pilgrims on a solitary journey. We are more like migrants walking together for a new land. We eat together, we pray together, we weep together, we rejoice together. We are in this together. And not just here at St. Dunstan's, but with every follower in every place in the world. On not just in this time, but in every age before of after us. We are the fellowship of God, the Community of faith that...

WEEKLY PRAYER

The following is a resource to help you connect with Sunday's theme & continue your prayers through the week. This can be done on your own or in the family group. This liturgy is based on Home Prayers found in the Book of Alternative Services (p. 687). If you do not have a prayer book, please take & keep one for your use.

The Christian Priority of **Fellowship** goes all the way back to the early church. In Acts we read that the Followers of Jesus "devoted themselves to the Apostles' teaching & fellowship, to the breaking of bread & the prayers" (2:42). Fellowship is translated into English from the Greek word, Koinonia. Koinonia can also be translated as Communion. Followers of Jesus have communion with God & with one another. This means that we participate in God's life & in the lives of one another knowing that what we do, we do not in isolation from our neighbour.

1. The Preparation

A candle is lit as someone prays,

O God, guard & direct your Church in the way of unity, service, & praise. **Amen.**

2. The Reading & Reflection

Read the passage from Scripture then reflect using the wonder questions as your guide. This guide uses the New Revised Standard Version.

Using the lens of Christian Communion or Fellowship we will read from the Gospel according to Matthew this week. Wherever Jesus went, he gathered a community with him. Sometimes this community of followers understood what Jesus was doing, but more often than not, they misunderstood. Whether the crowds got it or not, Jesus ministered to them with compassion. His self-giving, however, took a toll on him. He was rejected by his hometown, his mentor was assassinated & his own closest friends remained isolated in their fear. Still Jesus pressed on to build the fellowship of his followers.

COMMUNITY IS TOUGH - MATTHEW 13:53-58

Notes on the reading:

- The synagogue (v. 54) is the Jewish place of prayer & study. Jesus is a rabbi with amazing skills to make the Scripture come alive. This leaves some of his childhood friends jealous.
- o The phrase Took offence (v. 57) is the Greek word Scandalized. Jesus' hometown is scandalized by Jesus.
- O Jesus is unable to do many works of power in his hometown because of their disbelief. This means that when we are overcome by our own sense of being offended, we often cannot see the beauty around us. It is impossible to see the sunrise when we are focussed on our own jealousies or resentments.

I wonder what the most difficult thing about being in a church community is. I wonder how we can move from being offended to being open to God.

Monday

THERE ARE THREATS TO COMMUNITY – MATTEW 14:1-12

Notes on the reading:

- o Jesus' ministry of healing makes King Herod worried that Jesus is John the Baptist come back to life.
- John the Baptist spoke against Herod's affair with Herodias. Herodias was married to Herod's brother.
 Herod killed John the Baptist to silence him.
- o John's followers claim John's body & bury it then go & tell Jesus that his mentor has died.

I wonder if you have ever experienced a conflict in the church. I wonder why church conflicts are so difficult to heal.

COMMUNITY IS FED BY JESUS - MATTHEW 14:13-21

Notes on the reading:

- o After Jesus hears that John the Baptist had been killed he takes some time off.
- o Because of Jesus' fame, people find him & he ministers healing to them.
- As Jesus & the crowd are in a deserted place there is no way to buy food for everyone, so Jesus feeds the crowd with 5 loaves of bread & 2 fish.
- Everyone gets fed by Jesus.

I wonder what your favourite food is.
I wonder what your favourite spiritual food is.
I wonder how our community is fed by Jesus.

COMMUNITY IS CARED FOR BY JESUS - MATTHEW 14:22-33

Notes on the reading:

- o After the crowds leave, Jesus still wants to spend time alone. He sends his followers away on a boat.
- The early church used the image of a boat to describe what the Christian community is like. They take this image from the ancient story of Noah's Ark.
- O Water, in the imagination of the early church, stood for the chaos of the world.
- Jesus knows that he is sending his followers into a dangerous world of Herods & Hometowns that reject & kill, so he gives them the message of God for all time & places: Have courage, I AM, do not be afraid (v. 27).
- I AM is the ancient Hebrew name for God (Exodus 3:14).
- \circ Jesus invites his followers to have the same faith that Jesus has. But if his followers cannot walk on the water due to doubts \circ fears, they can always find rest in the boat.

I wonder what you are most afraid of.

I wonder who you talk to about your fears.

I wonder if it is encouraging for you to hear Jesus' words: I AM, do not be afraid.

I wonder how the church offers you comfort \circ safety in your doubts \circ fears.

THE COMMUNITY NEEDS HEALING – MATTHEW 14:34-36

⁻iday

Notes on the reading:

- o Everywhere Jesus goes he discovers people who are in need.
- o Jesus is recognized as a healer, someone people trust to help them.
- All people have to do in order to receive healing is to reach out to Jesus. The Greek word for Cured means to be brought to safety, to be saved. This refers back to the followers of Jesus in the boat. Jesus' ministry is to bring us into safety.

I wonder if you ever feel unsafe.

I wonder how Jesus creates a safe place for community at St. Dunstan's.

3. Prayers & the Lord's Prayer

Choose a litany from the Book of Alternative Services (beginning on page 110). The liturgy concludes with the Lord's Prayer.
