FEBRUARY 24, 2019
MINUTES**

The 2019 Annual Meeting was called to order at 11:47 A.M. by the Ven. Dr. Richard Leggett. He welcomed all who were present, which was at least 47, and said the opening prayer. Richard reminded all that Vestries provide guidance and are about common goals.

Motion: Approval of 2018 Minutes

A motion to approve the Minutes of the 2018 Vestry Meeting as previously circulated was made by Fiona Barnard and seconded by Kate Abel at 11:50. It was carried with no corrections being noted on the Minutes and with no opposition.

Motion: Approve Receipt of Annual Reports

A motion to approve receipt of the Annual Reports which were made available at the front to all, and in advance of this Vestry meeting, was made by Morgan Montgomery and seconded by Bob Merrison at 11:52 AM. It was carried after noting that there was a typographical error in the breakfast club report and an error in the financial report. There was no opposition.

Motion: Thank those who prepare the reports and those that engage in the various ministries and work of Holy Trinity Cathedral.

Dr. Leggett invited the above motion from the floor which was made by Brian Dobbin and seconded by Geoff Clements. It was carried with no opposition.

Report of the Nominating Committee for the 2019/2020 Church Council:

Birgit Petersen presented the names for Church Council which was distributed in advance and over on the backside of the Agenda. Birgit solicited for those who are interested in joining council and helping out to approach her. This year we have one new member on council: Fiona Barnard and she will also be involved with coffee duty. Carla Jones's position needed to be amended to reflect that she is the Archbishop's warden.

Dr. Leggett advised that there is likely to be a special synod in January 2020 to vote on revised canons and constitution – that work will begin in May 2019. Vestry was further advised that the Archbishop is required to retire in March 2021 when she will turn 70 and the synod delegates we elect today will vote on the new Bishop. There is the possibility of voting in a concurrent succeeding bishop.

Brian Dobbin posed two questions regarding the above which were answered by Dr. Leggett.

Birgit Petersen invited nominations from the floor thrice.

It was moved by Birgit and seconded by Carla Jones at 12:00 PM that the following nominees be approved for church council and as lay administrators. The motion was carried with no opposition – however Karen Crew advised that both Alysia MacGrotty and Meghan Grove (nee Hafting) have not been present for a while and may be attending other congregations. Dr. Leggett advised that he would look into it.

Report of the Treasurer:

Betty Macdonald presented the Annual Treasurer’s Report and took us through the various financial documents with patience and answered several questions. Betty pointed out the deficit from the previous year (\$47,xxx) as well as the projected deficit for this year (\$54,xxx). We will be using money from our reserves – namely prior years’ interest income, the memorial fund and capital fund [emphasis added for importance] - until we are out of this building arising from the building project construction. It was noted that envelope offerings were down.

Rob Sider asked about the salary for the curate. A discussion ensued about the split of her time between the diocesan office (50/80 time) and ourselves (30/80 time) and how we are

receiving a healthy subsidy / grant for having her, and her role in our church to help it grow, as well as to keep connected during the transition years.

Karen Crew asked about the number of active envelopes. We have approximately 100 people that have numbers.

Rob Sider asked about youth participation and how Tasha can help us with that. Tasha will in part focus on bringing parents of young children that are in the 2nd or 3rd circle of commitment closer in.

It was further noted that Tasha will cover as a relief / supply clergy when Richard is away and will reduce some costs. She will be ordained in July 2019.

A suggestion was made to bring back children's time during service.

Betty Macdonald made it very clear that we are going to transfer money from the memorial and capital funds as required for operating purposes as we don't have enough funds in our general accounts to continue to run. She reminded us the diocese has committed themselves to this journey with us. The rectory fund will be collapsed if required.

A discussion was had about the grant from BC Museum regarding the stained glass windows and how we received \$50,000 for that project. Dr. Leggett talked about the new lights being installed to assist us being visible from Columbia St.

Signing authority was confirmed to be any two of the following set: {the wardens, Bruce Macdonald, Glenn Crew, Don Nielsen, and Betty Macdonald}. Deposit box signatories are the same as above but in the singular. Betty confirmed she does not sign cheques because of her position as treasurer.

Motion to Receive Financial Reports

It was moved by Betty Macdonald and seconded by Carla Jones at 12:08 PM to receive the financial reports presented. It was carried with no opposition.

Motion to accept Operating Budget for 2019

It was moved by Betty Macdonald and seconded by Bruce Macdonald to accept the operating budget as presented at 12:23 PM. It was carried with no opposition.

N.B. Dr. Leggett and Betty Macdonald all made explicit that the operating and capital budget both state that money will be withdrawn from the Memorial and Capital Fund.

Motion to accept Capital Budget for 2019

It was moved by Brian Dobbin and seconded by Star Allaby to accept the operating budget as presented at 12:28 PM. It was carried with no opposition.

Motion for Appropriate Signatories

It was moved by Geoff Clements and seconded by Fiona Barnard at 12:30 PM that the following individuals have both signing authority and are signatories to the deposit box: Carla Jones, Sybil Collett, Birgit Petersen, Mikhael Magaril, Bruce Macdonald, Glenn Crew, Don Nielsen, and Betty Macdonald. It was carried with no opposition.

Motion to Waive Audit

It was moved by Betty Macdonald and seconded by Mikhael Magaril at 12:31 PM that the required of an audit be waived for the 2019 year. It was carried with no opposition.

Motion to Review Financial Statements

It was moved by Betty and seconded by Anne Haywood that the financial statements for the 2019 year be reviewed by the CPA firm of Kaushal and Co. at 12:32 PM. It was carried with no opposition.

Other Business:

1. Dr. Leggett reminded us that under the terms of a Diocesan canon that he has reached the age of retirement and Parish Council needs to be petition the Diocese to continue to have him as our Vicar – this serves as a vital check.
2. Dr. Leggett provided a small update on the building project. Things are happening and there are lots of moving parts. The exact details can't be shared because the final configuration of rental and market units aren't public but our project exceeds the City's new inclusive housing policy which was put into effect after we made our submission. A brief discussion was had about the heritage revitalization project.

Moment of Remembrance:

The Reverend Carole Neilson read the names of those who died in 2018, followed by a moment of silence at 12:40 PM. There was a typographical error and only one person had died: Nadine Wilkes-Smith.

Motion of Thanks:

The Reverend Carole Neilson gave the motion of thanks to the members of the many groups and everyone in our congregation for their dedicated service to the life and vitality of Holy Trinity Cathedral. The motion was seconded by Anne Haywood. Carried. A standing round of applause followed. Betty Macdonald subsequently motioned to thank Carole Neilson who was inadvertently omitted from her own motion – that was carried.

Motion to Adjourn:

A motion to adjourn was made at 12:43 PM by Morgan Montgomery and Carla Jones. Carried.

Closing Prayer: Dr. Leggett closed the meeting with everyone saying the Grace.

Giving Thanks Always and Everywhere

Some Thoughts from the Vicar

Vestry 2020

About thirty years after the death and resurrection of Jesus, the apostle Paul found himself arrested and on his way to Rome for trial. He took the time to write to the Christian community in Philippi, which he had established on one of his missionary journeys.

It was a time of stress both for Paul and for the Christians in Philippi. Despite his upbeat description of his situation, Paul was well aware that he could be condemned and executed. Nevertheless, he writes to a community whom he loves to try to support them during their own struggles with external persecution and internal conflict.

What I love about Paul's letter is its deep sense of gratitude and joy, even in the midst of all that is going on for him and for the community. At the very beginning he writes, "I thank my God every time I remember you, constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you, because of your sharing in the gospel from the first day until now. I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ." (Philippians 1.3-5).

Then, towards the very end of the letter, after he has written about the things that are troubling the community, Paul dares to encourage them in words that have been often repeated. "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not worry about anything but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God." (Philippians 4.4-6)

Paul is not naïve about the realities of his own life and the life of the Christian community in Philippi. But those realities do not blind him to the concrete signs of God's love for him and for the Philippians. These concrete signs generate joy and thanksgiving. I also have many concrete reasons to be joyful and thankful to be the Vicar of Holy Trinity Cathedral.

- We are a community that serves. Whether that service takes the form of our Breakfast Club or our participation in the activities of the New Westminster Homelessness Action Coalition or our commitment to provide

a place where non-profit organizations can meet to build community, we serve.

- We are a community that worships. Sunday after Sunday, Wednesday after Wednesday, holy day after holy day, God's Word is proclaimed, the Bread is broken and the Cup is poured.
- We are a community that evangelizes. We proclaim the good news of God in Christ through our words and our deeds. We share our faith with others, some of whom now find themselves participating in the life of this community.
- We are a community that educates. Our children have dedicated volunteers who help them encounter the love of God and learn more about who they are as children of God and who they are meant to become. We have an active adult education program where we share food and insight.
- We are a community that offers pastoral care. We care for the sick, whether in body, mind or spirit. We care for the dying, the dead and those who mourn. We listen to one another. We look out for one another. We tend the heart of the city as best as we can.

Do we face challenges? Yes. Our property development is moving more slowly than we expected --- but it is moving. Are we using our resources? Yes. After two annual pledge campaigns we have a solid base of pledged givers and we continue to work towards growing that base. Are our volunteers hard at work? Yes. It would be great to have a few more.

Yet I cannot help but be joyful and thankful. Thank you for being a community willing to take the risk to envision a renewed Cathedral property. Thank you for being a community that elects such dedicated Wardens as well as an able Parish Council. Thank you for being a community that allows me to exercise my ministry with colleagues such as Carole Neilson and Tasha Carrothers. Thank you for being a community that welcomes someone like Leah Skuro who is exploring her vocation to the diaconate. Thank you for being a community that has such dedicated volunteers who give of their time in service, in worship, in evangelism, in education and in pastoral care.

I thank my God whenever I think of you and prayers for you are always filled with joy. God has begun a good work in you and God knows that we have a glorious future.

DEACON'S REPORT

BREAKFAST PROGRAM REPORT

Bruce Macdonald, Jeff Yip, and I coordinate the Breakfast Club but it is the many volunteers who provide the dedicated hospitality every Thursday. Without the shoppers, sock and clothing workers, the cooks, servers and clean-up crew, we would not be the enthusiastic hosts to an average of 85 guests each week.

The beauty of the volunteers is no task goes undone. Everyone helps in every area. Some folks prefer cooking, while others help with serving or the socks and clothing. But if we are short in one area, volunteers fill in. Our members come from HTC, St. Alban's Burnaby, St. Peter's Roman Catholic Church, St. Thomas More Collegiate, and from the community in New Westminster.

We serve homeless and at-risk persons as well as folks who come on their way to work. There are no questions asked of our guests: if you come, you are served. Our hearty breakfasts include scrambled eggs and ham, hash brown potatoes, orange juice, toast, banana and orange slices, and donated bread and bakery goods for taking away.

Breakfast is served from 8:00 – 9:00 am. When the weather is cold and wet, we open the doors early. Not everyone wants to come in, but it is an option.

Telus sponsors a breakfast twice a year – June and December. Their generosity with toiletries keeps us supplied for most of the year. Rotaract (Rotary) donate blankets in December. There are enough blankets to give out in January and February.

HTC is a member of the New Westminster Homelessness Coalition Society. We hosted Connect Day during Homelessness Action Week in October. At the fund-raising dinner later that week we were well-represented.

Our parishioners are generous sponsors of this outreach program. Their financial support and generous donations of clothing and toiletries throughout the year are appreciated by the volunteers and the guests alike.

We are a blessed community to have and support such a ministry. May we continue as long as there is a need to reach out in this way.

The Friday, May 24th morning session dealt primarily with the receipt of reports from various Diocesan committees and groups including, among others, the Ecumenical and Multi-faith Unit, the Camp Artaban Society, the Education for Ministry program, and the Primate's World Relief and Development Fund Unit. The afternoon session included the initial presentations on the Revision of the Constitution and Canons followed by the Audited Financial Statements, reports of programs, and the first session of Resolutions submitted for consideration by Synod.

Saturday began with Morning Prayer with the Primate, Archbishop Fred Hiltz preaching, followed by a presentation regarding a Self-Determining Indigenous Church, a discussion panel with the Primate, more Program Reports, continuation of the discussion on the Constitution and Canons Revision, and discussions regarding Property Development, the 2019 Budget, the 2020 and 2021 Vision Budgets, and further resolutions.
