
The 11th Sunday after Pentecost


Gathering


The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit, be with you all.

The First Reading

Ephesians 4:25-5:2

So then, putting away falsehood, let all of us speak the truth to our neighbours, for we are members of one another. Be angry but do not sin; do not let the sun go down on your anger, and do not make room for the devil. Thieves must give up stealing; rather let them labour and work honestly with their own hands, so as to have something to share with the needy. Let no evil talk come out of your mouths, but only what is useful for building up, as there is need, so that your words may give grace to those who hear. And do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God, with which

you were marked with a seal for the day of redemption. Put away from you all bitterness and wrath and anger and wrangling and slander, together with all malice, and be kind to one another, tender-hearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ has forgiven you. Therefore be imitators of God, as beloved children, and live in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us, a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God.



Send your Holy Spirit upon us and upon these gifts,


that all who eat and drink at this table may be one body and one holy people, a living sacrifice in Jesus Christ, our Lord.

Readings for August 15th – The 12th Sunday after Pentecost

Isaiah 7:10-15 A prophecy is given to the King of Judah against a background of political intrigue, even as the king expresses his unwillingness to receive a sign. The prophet expresses God's exasperation with the people and says a child will be born, Immanuel – God-with-us, who will be a sign that challenges Ahaz's political games. Though very much a statement for the time, it was later adopted by the Church to refer to Jesus.

Psalm 132:6-10, 13-14

Galatians 4:4-7 This most passionate letter of St. Paul contains within it a promise of deep intimacy between God and all humanity as all are welcomed into the embrace of our Divine parent – one who we can address in deeply affectionate terms as 'abba, father' or indeed we might use any terms of intimate relationship.

Luke 1:46-55 This sassy, powerful, prophetic Song of Mary (aka Magnificat) declares that in the divine economy, the poor are lifted up and the mighty brought down from their thrones. Using language and imagery firmly rooted in the Hebrew prophetic tradition, this passage proclaims God as one who whose entire being is founded on fierce love and justice, and the coming Messiah as one who will live out those values fully.

EVENSONG

Every Sunday – sung by a small ensemble of Choral Scholars

Evensong is a contemplative, musical and prayerful liturgy, ideally suited to the end of the week and the close of day, and to this current time when we have been asked to avoid congregational singing, but still long for the depth and beauty of a choral liturgy.
