Church Family,

I took to Facebook this week to ask what the difference was between preaching and teaching. I received several excellent replies. I've often been described as more of a "teachy" kind of preacher. Some have meant that as a compliment, while others have indicated that they were looking for something more on the "preachy" side.

One dear sister called me in response to my post. She said she was struggling to craft a reply because she couldn't get the words out quite like she wanted. She resolved that preaching and teaching should be "rolled up into one," explaining that good preaching was "a combination of the two." I agree entirely. As a matter of fact, most of the replies I received on Facebook called for something of a balance between preaching and teaching in the pulpit.

In 2 Timothy 4:2 we read, "*Preach* the word; be ready in season and out of season; reprove, rebuke, and exhort, with complete patience and *teaching*." Notice the first and last words of that verse are "preach" and "teaching." Similarly, 1 Timothy 5:17 tells churches to honor their leaders, "especially those who labor in *preaching* and *teaching*." God's Word emphasizes that pastors are to engage in both preaching and teaching. Admittedly, there is some overlap here. Oftentimes it might even be hard to distinguish within a sermon where preaching ends and teaching begins and vice versa. I would argue that all truly biblical preaching must include good teaching, though not all teaching (even very good teaching) qualifies as biblical preaching.

Preaching and teaching both seek to communicate the truth of God's Word. The difference is that preaching makes a declaration while teaching offers an explanation. Preaching says, "This is true! Believe it!" Teaching says, "This is true! Here are a few reasons why, an illustration to drive it home, and several personal applications to show you what it looks like to believe." Preaching appeals more to the heart, while teaching serves the mind. Both are essential. When your pastor preaches a sermon on Sunday morning you should feel something—that's preaching. You should also learn something—that's teaching. Both elements are important and necessary.

One last thing—the Bible lists umpteen different qualifications for pastors. All but one of them are tests of character. There is only one skill pastors are required to have and that is the ability to teach (1 Tim. 3:2; 2 Tim. 2:24; Titus 1:9). That is significant. The only time the word "pastor" is used in the New Testament (at least as a noun) is in Eph. 4:11 where it is immediately joined with the word "teacher." Pastors preach (yes and of course!), but they must be teachers, too.
