The Rector's Corner



The Offertory Hymn this morning, Deck Thyself, My Soul With Gladness (#240), was translated from German into English by Catherine Winkworth in 1863. Although her name is unknown to many today, Catherine was the foremost 19th century translator of German hymns into English.

She was born in Holborn, London, England, on September 13, 1827. In 1829, her parents moved to Manchester while she was two, as her father had a silk mill.

In 1841, a series of events began in her life which ultimately, by God's Providence, impacted the Church Universal. When Catherine was 14 years old, her mother died; four years later, her father remarried. That year, as an 18 year old, Catherine traveled to Dresden, Germany, to live with an aunt and act as a governess (nanny) to her cousins. While there, she acquired her knowledge of the German language and an interest in German hymnody.

Not long after returning to Manchester, Catherine experienced a long period of ill health: for nearly two years, from January, 1848. It seems that it may have been during this time (or shortly afterwards) that she came to know Chevalier Bunsen (Christian Karl Josias Bunsen, 1791-1860).

Bunsen, the German ambassador to England, presented her with a copy of *Andachtsbuch*, a German devotional book with German hymns, which opened the treasures of German hymnody to Catherine. She went on to publish two series of *Lyra Germanica*, (Hymns for the Sundays and Chief Festivals of the Christian Year) in 1855 and 1858. The first series contained 103 hymn translations and was dedicated to Bunsen. It was a huge hit and went on to have 23 editions. The second series contained 121 more hymn translations and was published in 12 editions.

In 1852, Catherine undertook active work among the poor in the newly-established Sunday School and District Visiting Society. She was regarded with extreme affection by the poor, and long after she left the neighborhood, she used to receive occasional letters from them.

In February 1861, their father was taken ill; this was the beginning of his complete breakdown in health, which obliged him to give up his business, and ultimately led to the family moving to Clifton, a suburb of Bristol, in October 1862. In Bristol, Catherine became active in promoting higher education for women. She organized lectures and classes to prepare women to take the Cambridge examinations. She helped found Bristol University College, later Bristol University, and acted as a Cheltenham Ladies College council member. She also served as a governor for Red Maid's School in Bristol and promoted the creation of Clifton High School for Girls. In 1868, she joined the Committee on Higher Education for Women, becoming its secretary in 1870. With her older sister Susanna, she served as a delegate to the German Conference on Women's Work in 1872.

Coupled with all of that, Catherine translated the biographies of two founders of German sisterhoods for the poor and the sick: *Life of Pastor Fliedner*, 1861, and *Life of Amelia Sieveking*, 1863. But that was not all! In 1863, she came out with *The Chorale Book for England*, which contained some of the earlier translations with their proper chorale tunes. In 1869, she published *Christian Singers of Germany*, which contained the biographies of German hymn writers, together with numerous hymns.

Through these efforts, Catherine helped bring the German chorale tradition to the English speaking world, more than any other person. By faith, we can see how the Lord used her mother's untimely death; her 'nanny' year in Dresden; and her own long illness in 1848-1849 for a greater good.

In 1878, Catherine went to Mornix near Geneva to help care for her nephew, Frank, then an invalid. She arrived on June 17th, and on the 21st they proceeded to Savoy, France. On the morning of the 1st of July she was suddenly attacked by a pain at the heart, and in half-an-hour all was over. In her memory her friends raised a sum sufficient to endow two "Catherine Winkworth" scholarships for women at the Bristol University College, and also to erect a memorial tablet to her in Bristol Cathedral.

From this morning's Offertory hymn:

Now I sink before Thee lowly/ Filled with joy most deep and holy/ As with trembling awe and wonder/ On thy mighty works I ponder/ How, by mystery surrounded/ Depths no man hath ever sounded.
