

Minister's Message

Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni!" (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.'"

When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you."

- John 20:16-17, 19.

Siblings in Christ,

This month I was going to write a theological reflection on certain social issues. But I decided that, I and perhaps you, needed a message closer to the core of our faith.

A week ago I had an appointment for an MRI. As is common for outpatient use of these machines, the appointment was early in the morning: 4 AM to be precise. As I sat in the empty waiting room, I think I came close to a panic attack. I am slightly claustrophobic, and as you may know those machines are like a torpedo tube, or more morbidly, a coffin. For some reason, I also couldn't stop thinking about the possibility of something going wrong. What if I or the techs had forgotten to account for some piece of metal in my body or clothing? What if the powerful waves of magnetic energy did something else unexpected?

I had heard about various coping techniques: count all the chairs in the room. Find all the blue things. Et cetera. This wasn't really helping. What if I had a heart attack? Yes, I was being a bit melodramatic.

Then I said to myself, aren't you a minister? Aren't you a Christian? Pray, already!

What should I pray?

I ended up just envisioning Jesus kneeling in front of me, holding my hand, looking into my eyes. The message was, "I'm here. I'm with you. You're not alone." Almost embarrassingly simple for us sophisticated, educated Christians. But in the end, that's what all of our complicated liturgies and theologies mean. You are not alone.

What made Mary realize she was in Jesus' presence? The familiar sound of his voice.

What reassured the disciples in their fear and grief? Jesus' simple presence.

So that's what I would like to suggest to you today:

COVID is scary. The debates around it are frustrating. And you are not alone.

Returning to our own worship services is complicated and perhaps frightening. And you are not alone.

You or your children or your grandchildren are going back to school. Who knows what the new school year may bring? And you are not alone.

I think it's going to a tough month for many of us. But we'll get through it together. Peace be with you, my friends: you are not alone.
