Next Sunday is "Christ is King"



The newest feast in the Church (created in 1925 by the Pope), this day marks the end of the liturgical year. The Christian "year" begins on the first Sunday in Advent, when our first great feast cycle (Advent-Christmas-Epiphany) begins. Sometimes called Judgment Sunday or Return of Christ (think of the Lord of the Rings: The Return of the King), this Sunday celebrates the eternal reign of Christ.

This Sunday was instituted during a time of rising nationalism (both the Nazi movement and fear around the world including in America after WWI of not seeming patriotic enough or being persecuted for being perceived as not putting national interests first) to remind us that our first and primary allegiance is to Jesus and the Gospel, the work of salvation and the ministry of reconciliation. Our primary identity is not American, female, Libertarian, Hispanic, left-handed, transgender, wealthy, addict, Trekkie, Packer, or millennial. Our primary identity is Child of God and the joy and work of the Kingdom of Heaven comes first in our lives.

Next Sunday is a reminder: Don't let anyone ever tell you that anything is more important than your allegiance to Christ, your faith in God's promises, and your commitment to the Gospel.

As you'll see next week in the description of Advent, Christ is King Sunday anticipates the themes of Advent (as have the Sundays leading up to Advent), when we prepare and expectantly hope for the return of Christ, Our King.



Hope for renewal of the earth

Honduras

Carlos and Anita live in the Santa Ana community of Honduras, a region that is part of the "dry corridor." In this area, farmers face difficult challenges accessing water for their households and farms. Rain comes in only four months of the year, and residents face long periods of drought, which puts them at heightened risk of hunger.

"This problem forces women to work even harder in order to collect we'er," Anita said. "Here, we do not sleep during the summer months, in order to grab a little water; we need to wait several hours by the well."

The lack of water is especially challenging for farmers, who depend on water for crops and animals. With support from ELCA World Hunger and the Lutheran World Federation's World Service/Central America program, local organization Red COMAL (the Alternative Community Markets Network, in English) is helping farmers such as Carlos and Anita learn new techniques and strategies that will help reduce their vulnerability to food insecurity while protecting the land on which they rely.

Through a project implemented by Red COMAL, Carlos was trained in agroecology,

an approach that focuses on food production and sustainable management of resources. Carlos has learned to diversify his crops and helped establish a system of stockpiling corn for times of scarcity and emergency. He also learned how to select, rescue, reproduce and store native seeds, which has helped him plant new crops for his family and help other farmers in his community.

In addition to planting fruit trees, sweet potatoes and squash, Carlos has also reforested his plot of land with trees such as laurel, cedar and mahogany. The wood can be used to build houses and generate income for his family. Native hens provide meat and eggs, while cows provide milk, all of which help Carlos and Anita earn income from their farm.

The dry corridor of the Santa Ana community still presents challenges for residents like Carlos and Anita. But with the support of ELCA World Hunger, LWF and Red COMAL, they are able to learn new approaches that will help their farms be profitable and sustainable for years to come.



Science Tidbits

Fertility Crash

Throughout the world, human birth rates have been progressively dropping. Actually, it is being referred to as a global crash. Every country could well have shrinking populations by the end of the century, and some, like Spain and Japan, are likely to see their populations halved by 2100. As many people will be turning 80 as there are new births.

Fertility rate is defined as the number of livebirths per woman. In 1950, women worldwide were having an average of 4.7 children in their lifetime. In 2017 this was down to 2.4 and a recent study suggests it will 1.7 by 2100. There are a number of reasons for its decline. First, fertility, or the actual ability of a couple to produce a child, may be compromised. Other important factors are the increased education of women worldwide, their working outside the home in greater numbers and greater access to effective contraception.

The necessary fertility rate to maintain most countries' population is 2.1, not 2.0. The added 0.1 is necessary because even in countries with excellent health care, not all babies survive to adulthood, and, interestingly, slightly more offspring are likely to be male. And in developing countries where infant mortality rates are high, the fertility rate needs to be even higher.

The fertility rate in the U.S. is 1.87, 0.24 points below what it needs to be to maintain the population. The consistent trend is that developed countries have a low fertility rate, while in developing countries it is high. The highest rates are found in countries such as Niger (6.49) Angola (6.19) and Mali (6.01) and Burundi (5.9), all in Africa, although they also have the highest rates of infant mortality. Some European countries are getting dangerously low (for example, Spain, 1.5; Germany, 1.45; Italy, 1.44; Slovenia, 1.36). In countries such as South Korea (1.26), Puerto Rico (1.22) and Singapore (0.83), the rates are even lower.

The outlook for the world is dour. There will be significant social change as a result. Looming questions include: Who will take care of the elderly? Who will pay the taxes necessary to run the country? How can we pay for healthcare? Will people be able to retire?

Already, countries such as Japan are importing people to tend to their rapidly aging population and the UK is increasingly dependent on migration to deal with plunging fertility rates. However, this cannot be the answer if every country suffers population loss. The question of whether to have open borders may become moot as nearly every country competes for migrants. And because of the positive fertility rates in African countries, there will be many more people of African descent in many more countries, thereby underscoring the importance of global recognition of the challenges to racism.
