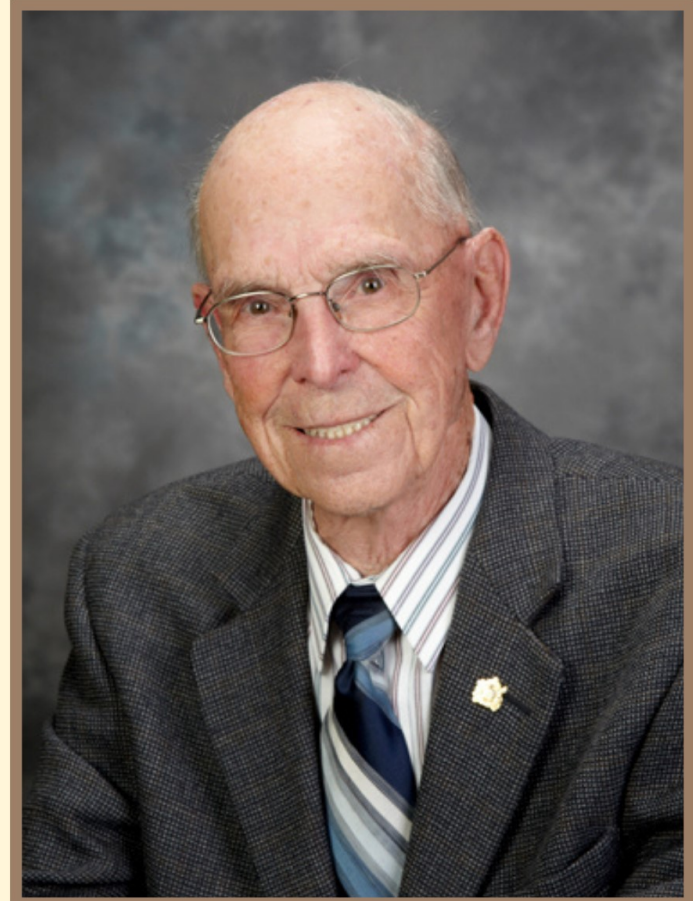
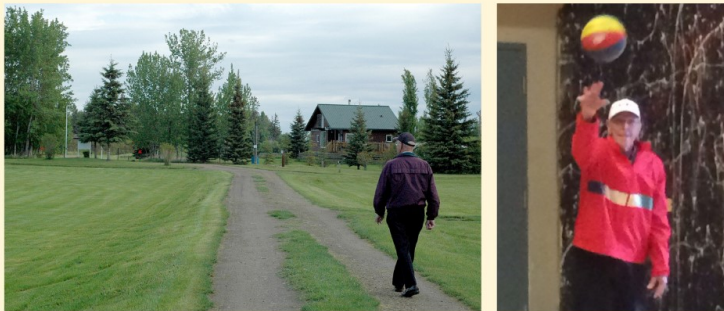

George (Geordie) Eber Kaiser

NOVEMBER 12, 1919 - SEPTEMBER 2, 2021

George Kaiser was born to Nelson and Mildred Kaiser on November 12, 1919, on a farm in Beddington, Alberta. He was the youngest brother of Ralph, Elmer, Roy, and Willie. George's oldest brother Ralph died in 1920. The family moved to Calgary in early 1920 and lived in the NE and the NW before settling at 612 - 19th Avenue NW.

All of the boys attended King George School. George's father Nelson was a carpenter/contractor so all of the boys helped on the construction projects and Elmer went in full time with his dad.

George delivered groceries for a small store on 16th Avenue and 7th Street with his bike. This same bike he rode in the Cochrane to Calgary race, wearing number 9 in the 1930s.

The family was always involved in the church and went to several including Victory Church near the Stampede grounds. George's father Nelson had supervised the construction of Crescent Heights Baptist Church, circa 1912 and it became the lifelong church for the family.

Before the war, George worked at Smithbuilt Hats for a short period. It was around this time through the young people's group that he met the girl who would become his wife for 48 years. Her name was Hazel Turtle.

War came and George joined the R.C.A.F. George and Hazel were married during the war and lived in Davidson, SK in the PMQ's.

1948 heralded the arrival of a son, Dennis. George was busy building his house at 2306-1st Street NW. In 1950, another baby, Brian was born to celebrate moving into the new house. Daughter Janice was born in 1956.

At that time, George was working for Robinson Machine Company and would continue through ownership changes to Nodwell. Then various moves followed, ending his working career with Rockwell Tools in the designing of propane haulers. He retired in 1984.

The church and caring for Hazel during her illness kept George active. Hazel passed away in 1993. George continued to drive his cars until he was 97. He then told Dennis and Brian that it was time to move to Prince of Peace Manor. He enjoyed his time there and celebrated his 100th birthday in 2019, still up and moving. One month later he fell and broke his hip, which resulted in his moving to a long-term care facility at Carewest Colonel Belcher early in 2020.

George lived a long life full of love and happiness. He passed away in his sleep two months short of his 102nd birthday. God's reward for a life well-lived.

He is survived by 3 children, Brian, Dennis, and Janice; 8 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren. He will be missed but dearly remembered by many family and friends.

George was laid to rest with his wife Hazel at Rocky View Garden of Peace Cemetery on Tuesday, September 7th. A Celebration of George's Life will be held at Crescent Heights Baptist Church (1212-1st Street NW) on Tuesday, September 28, 2021, at 11:00 am.
