EXODUS

CHAPTER 1

ISRAEL OPPRESSED IN EGYPT

These are the names of the sons of Israel who came to Egypt with Jacob; each came with his family:

- 2 Reuben, Simeon, Levi, and Judah;
- 3 Issachar, Zebulun, and Benjamin;
- 4 Dan and Naphtali; Gad and Asher.
- 5 The total number of Jacob's descendants was seventy; Joseph was already in Egypt.
- 6 Joseph and all his brothers and all that generation eventually died. 7 But the Israelites were fruitful, increased rapidly, multiplied, and became extremely numerous so that the land was filled with them.
- 8 A new king, who did not know about Joseph, came to power in Egypt. 9 He said to his people, "Look, the Israelite people are more numerous and powerful than we are. 10 Come, let's deal shrewdly with them; otherwise they will multiply further, and when war breaks out, they will join our enemies, fight against us, and leave the country." 11 So the Egyptians assigned taskmasters over the

CHAPTER 2

2 The woman became pregnant and gave birth to a son; when she saw that he was beautiful, she hid him for three months. 3 But when she could no longer hide him, she got a papyrus basket for him and coated it with asphalt and pitch. She placed the child in it and set it among the reeds by the bank of the Nile. 4 Then his sister stood at a distance in order to see what would happen to him.

5 Pharaoh's daughter went down to bathe at the Nile while her servant girls walked along the riverbank. She saw the basket among the reeds, sent her slave girl, took it, 6 opened it, and saw him, the child — and there he was, a little boy, crying. She felt sorry for him and said, "This is one of the Hebrew boys." 7 Then his sister said to Pharaoh's daughter, "Should I go and call a Hebrew woman who is nursing to nurse the boy for you?"

8 "Go," Pharaoh's daughter told her. So the girl went and called the boy's mother. 9 Then Pharaoh's daughter said to her, "Take this child and nurse him for me, and I will pay your wages." So the woman took the boy and nursed him. 10 When the child grew older, she brought him to Pharaoh's daughter, and he became her son. She named him Moses, "Because," she said, "I drew him out of the water." -- Exodus 1:1-2:10 (CSB)

BUDGET UPDATE

Funds in: March was a better month in terms of offerings and funds received into our church bank account.

Expenses: Payments for the month were much higher than budget, primarily due to some arrears CRC Australia ministry share contributions that were brought up to date. The year-to-date expenses as reported is now reasonably accurate and mostly in line with budget.

Shortfall: Our year-to-date cash shortfall is about \$25k, marginally better than budget. This means y.t.d. we have drawn down on or depleted our cash resources to the amount of about \$25,000.

We are seeking to appoint two new elders, replacing Jack Organtzoglou and also Lourens Geldenhuys who will finish up at the end of the year. An excellent outline of the Bible requirements for eldership appears below. If you are considering nominating someone or yourself, we commend the article to you. If you wish to explore aspects of eldership before nominating, please feel very welcome to discuss with Chris or any of the current elders.

Nominations have now closed.

Session will liaise with the nominees, then after the October Session meeting it's planned that the nominations will be announced on Sundays 17 and 24 October, with the election conducted on Sunday 31 October, in person if possible or otherwise online.

Biblical requirements for Eldership

God really cares about eldership, and in particular God cares a lot about the qualifications for Eldership. The new testament gives more detailed instructions on elder's qualifications than on any other aspect of eldership. The character of the people who make up elders matters a great deal to the Lord. How elders go about doing the work of eldership seems to matter less than the character of the elders. When God looks at elders, the character is far more important than the qualifications or skills of leadership.

Having elders that meet the biblical qualifications for eldership is important for a number of reasons. It protects the church and keeps the church doctrinally pure. It helps congregations stay true to God's mission on earth. It helps the people in the church to grow and it helps elders spur one another on in the Gospel, and as shepherds of the flock.

So what are the qualifications for elders?

There are three key passages that talk about these: 1 Timothy 3:1-7, Titus 1:5-9 and 1 Peter 5:1-4.

1 Timothy 3:1–7 (CSB)

1 This saying is trustworthy: "If anyone aspires to be an overseer, he desires a noble work." 2 An overseer, therefore, must be above reproach, the husband of one wife, self-controlled, sensible, respectable, hospitable, able to teach, 3 not an excessive drinker, not a bully but gentle, not quarrelsome, not greedy. 4 He must manage his own household competently and have his children under control with all dignity. 5 (If anyone does not know how to manage his own household, how will he take care of God's church?) 6 He must not be a new convert, or he might become conceited and incur the same condemnation as the devil. 7 Furthermore, he must have a good reputation among outsiders, so that he does not fall into disgrace and the devil's trap.

Titus 1:5-9 (CSB)

5 The reason I left you in Crete was to set right what was left undone and, as I directed you, to appoint elders in every town. **6** An elder must be blameless, the husband of one wife, with faithful children who are not accused of wildness or rebellion. **7** As an overseer of God's household, he must be blameless, not arrogant, not hot-tempered, not an excessive drinker, not a bully, not greedy for money, **8** but hospitable, loving what is good, sensible, righteous, holy, self-controlled, **9** holding to the faithful message as taught, so that he will be able both to encourage with sound teaching and to refute those who contradict it.

1 Peter 5:1-5 (CSB)

1 I exhort the elders among you as a fellow elder and witness to the sufferings of Christ, as well as one who shares in the glory about to be revealed: 2 Shepherd God's flock among you, not overseeing out of compulsion but willingly, as God would have you; not out of greed for money but eagerly; 3 not lording it over those entrusted to you, but being examples to the flock. 4 And when the chief Shepherd appears, you will receive the unfading crown of glory. 5 In the same way, you who are younger, be subject to the elders. All of you clothe

yourselves with humility toward one another, because God resists the proud but gives grace to the humble.

Grouping the themes together, to be an elder a man should meet the following requirements:

1 - Have a desire to serve as an elder, motivated by the Holy Spirit.

In Acts 20:28, we see that it is the Holy Spirit that calls elders, and that that should drive a person to serve eagerly and willingly (as in 1 Tim 3:1, and 1 Peter 5:2). So we should not elect people who are unwilling to serve.

2 - Meet the moral and spiritual character requirements.

Desire and willingness to serve is clearly not enough. So God has given us practical, objective qualifications to test the desire of elder candidates.

The person must have a good reputation.

They are to be "above reproach", "blameless", "have a good reputation with outsiders". We should not elect elders where a person has suspicions hanging over them. An elder should also have a good reputation in the world, since the Gospel should not be brought into disrepute because of an elder's life outside the church. They should be above reproach in terms of sexual purity.

Both Timothy and Titus list that elders are to be the husband of one wife. Or more recent translations have this as being a "one-woman man". He is to be an example as a faithful husband to his wife, and this is particularly important in the world today, where sexuality is so corrupted.

They should show personal self-control.

"Self-controlled" (Titus 1:8)

"Sober-minded" (1 Tim 3:2)

"Not greedy for gain" (Titus 1:7)

"Not quick tempered" (Titus 1:7)

"Not quarrelsome" (1 Tim 3:3)

"Not a drunkard" (1 Tim 3:3)

"Disciplined" (Titus 1:8)

Self-Control is a fruit of the spirit which affects so many areas of life. Elders need to be self-controlled if they are to look after the flock well. This obviously excludes men who have issues with drink, with greed and who cannot control their temper — since these problems can do much damage to the flock. But they also exclude men who are not "sober minded", that is those cannot see another point of view and think only their opinion is the correct one. When a man is unwilling to submit himself to the authority of his fellow elders, he should not be an elder.

They should have relationship skills with people.

Elders are to be gentle, not quick tempered, not arrogant, not quarrelsome, and hospitable. Elders who cannot work with people cannot be shepherds. The heart behind these qualifications is that elders should want what is best for others, they need to see the congregation as the sheep for whom they will lay down their lives. If an elder wants to serve his own agenda, he will manipulate people, or participate in powerplays to get his own way. Such men should not be put forward for eldership.

They should be hospitable.

Interestingly both in both Timothy and Titus, hospitality is mentioned. We don't often think of this as a qualification for eldership. When congregation members see an elder in his home environment, share a meal with him and participate in his hospitality, they are much more likely to follow where that person leads.

They should have spiritual maturity.

An elder should not be a recent convert (1 Tim 3:6). This does not mean that an elder must be old! It simply means they should have spiritual maturity. How do you measure spiritual maturity? There are two ways that spring to mind – does this person's life bear gospel fruit? And in their personal life do they show the fruit of the spirit? (Peace, joy, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness and self-control).

3 – They should have the following skills

While it is true that God cares much more about character than about skill or ability, he does include a few skills that elders should have.

They should manage their own homes well (1 Tim 3:4, Titus 1:6)

We see this in 1 Timothy 3:4, and in Titus 1:6. An elder must be above reproach in family life – he is to shepherd his family well spiritually. That means that if an elder has a family, how an elder teaches his children about God matters. Does he let spiritual problems linger? Does he tackle spiritual issues within the home? If he cannot teach his own children through word and deed, he will not be able to teach the church family. Of course no child is perfect, and no father is perfect and we need to be gracious in allowing for the normal individual family issues. However, if an elder does not have a general pattern of leading his family well spiritually, then he should not be an elder.

They should be examples to the flock (1 Peter 5:3)

Think of the perfect Christian congregation member. What kinds of things do they do, what kinds of activities do they partake in, and what kinds of attitudes or behaviours do they show? The body of elders should model this kind of life. If you think congregation members should come to church, then the elders should come to church. If you think congregation members should read scripture regularly, then the elders should lead by regularly themselves. If you want congregation members to be generous in giving financially, then the elders need to do that too. If we cannot say "well this is how I do it", then we shouldn't expect others to do the same.

They should defend the faith (Titus 1:9)

'holding to the faithful message as taught, so that he will be able both to encourage with sound teaching and to refute those who contradict it'.

You cannot be an elder if you do not have a solid grasp on the basics of the faith. This does not mean that every elder needs to have a degree in biblical interpretation before they become elders. They do however need to have a solid grasp on the basics of the faith, and be continually growing in their own understanding of the faith. Does the elder candidate have a solid scriptural understanding, and where they are lacking are they open to learning more?

They should be able to teach" (Titus 1:9, 1 Tim 3:3)

Each elder must be able to teach. This does not mean they need to all be preachers, but they must be able to explain scripture one on one, or in a small group setting. This is why small group leaders often make good elders — they have practiced teaching people in smaller settings and one on one. They are also in regular habit of bringing God's word to bear on the lives of those around them. If an elder candidate is unable to teach (either through no one being willing to listen to them, or simply because they don't have solid biblical knowledge), then they should not be an elder.

Conclusion

So as we consider people for eldership, let's use these biblical qualifications as we evaluate them.

THINK IT OVER

My Mother's father worked as a carpenter. On this particular day, he was building some crates for the clothes his church was sending to orphanages in China. On his way home, he reached into his shirt pocket to find his glasses, but they were gone. When he mentally replayed his earlier actions, he realised what had happened; the glasses had slipped out of his pocket unnoticed and fallen into one the crates, which he had nailed shut. His brand new glasses were heading for China!

The Great Depression was at its height and Grandpa had six children. He had spent \$20 for those glasses that very morning. He was upset by the thought of having to buy another pair. "It's not fair," he told God as he drove home in frustration. "I've been very faithful in giving of my

time and money to your work, and now this."

Months later, the director of the orphanage was on furlough in the United States. He wanted to visit all the churches that supported him in China, so he came to speak one Sunday at my grandfather's small church in Chicago. The missionary began by thanking the people for their faithfulness in supporting the orphanage. "But most of all," he said, "I must thank you for the glasses you sent last year. You see the Communists had just swept through the orphanage, destroying everything, including my glasses. I was desperate. Even if I had the money, there was simply no way of replacing those glasses. Along with not being able to see well, I experienced headaches every day, so my coworkers and I were much in prayer about this. Then your crates arrived. When my staff removed the covers, they found a pair of glasses lying on top. The missionary paused long enough to let his words sink in, then still gripped with the wonder of it all, he continued; "Folks, when I tried on the glasses, it was as though they had been custom made just for me! I want to thank you for being a part of that."



The people listened, happy for the miraculous glasses. But the missionary surely must have confused their church with another they thought. There were no glasses on their list of items to be sent overseas. But sitting quietly in the back, with tears streaming down his face, an ordinary carpenter realised the Master Carpenter had used him in an extraordinary way. There are times when we want to blame God...instead, we ought to try more often to thank him! (Author unknown)



Prison Fellowship Angel Tree

Prison fellowship brings together volunteer criminal, victim and donor, family and church member, sinner and saint all under the one tent.

Prison fellowship has been running the Angel Tree program for over 30 years. This program offers parents in prison a gift to be sent to their child, on their behalf at Christmas time.

Last week we received this letter from a person in prison here in Victoria.

I have been informed about a program that your organisation runs called 'Angel Tree' whereby you can help the children of prisoners receive a present at Christmas time. Having experienced my first Christmas in prison last year I found it the most difficult, upsetting and challenging time of my life as I couldn't be there with my children or even provide them a gift to celebrate this time of the year. I was raised in a home where Christmas was valued as the most special and magical time of the year. To be absent from my family and unable to even send my children a Christmas gift last year ripped my heart out. When I heard about this program that you provide, I thought that I would write and see if you could include me so I may be able to give something to my kids this Christmas. I love and miss my family so much that it hurts and it broke my heart to see the sadness in their eyes during the video visit and hear the disappointment in their voices on the telephone calls, when I couldn't share Christmas with them last year. I think that being part of this program would go some way towards alleviating a little of that.

I thank you and your organisation for the support that you provide to prisoners and their families.

35 new believers have accepted Jesus Christ as their personal Saviour in just the Dahod cluster. Two new congregations started there too. In the Udaipur cluster, another 6 "new" families are attending from the community. Please pray for the new believers to be nurtured and the new attenders to become committed to Christ.

In the southern fields, God has added 120 new believers to the congregations during the month of September.

Please do pray for the upcoming Womens' meetings planned in October in our southern G.O.S.P.E.L. mission fields.

One GOSPEL worker Makla, has requested our prayers for his wife Chimani, who is suffering from ill health for the past three years. Recently, she suffered a stroke and her left limb was paralyzed. Pray that she may be healed.

Please pray for God's people in Haiti. A group of 17 Christian missionaries, including five children, were abducted by an armed gang in Haiti on 16 October while returning from a visit to build an orphanage. The missionaries, who travelled to the country with the US-based Christian Aid Ministries, were seized when the gang set up roadblocks in Ganthier, east of the island capital, Port-au-Prince. An informal settlement in Port-Au-Prince, Haiti. The island has the worst global record for kidnapping, with gangs active across Port-Au-Prince and the surrounding areas. The notorious 400 Mawozo gang, known for carrying out kidnappings and killings in the region, abducted the group, comprising 16 Americans and one Canadian, as they travelled to the airport where some were due to fly home. One of the abducted Americans sent a WhatsApp message calling for help as the kidnapping took place. It read, "Please pray for us! We are being held hostage, they kidnapped our driver. Pray pray pray. We don't know where they are taking us."

Haiti has the worst global record for kidnapping. At least 328 people were reported kidnapped in the first eight months of 2021, compared with a total of 234 for all of the previous year, according to figures from the United Nations Integrated Office in Haiti.


