At the Parish Council meeting on October 17, a discussion was had on holding the Ministry Fair on All Saints Sunday, Nov. 7, 2021. It was determined that not enough people are coming to church on Sundays yet to make such a venture worthwhile and the people using Zoom would not be able to see the displays. However, an alternative was proposed. The Newsletter was seen as a better vehicle for reaching people, given the COVID situation. Parish Council thought the Newsletter would reach more people than displays in the Hall this year.



Each Newsletter will feature short write-ups on 2 or 3 Ministries with a contact person for each one. In this Newsletter you will find write-ups for Coffee Hour, Readers, and Intercessors.

Please consider joining a ministry to really get to know your church family and to make serving the Lord a bigger part of your everyday life. Or maybe you would just like more information on what is going on at All Saints. During these times of COVID we never know from week to week what the Provincial Health Orders will be. At this time we are especially in need of Coffee Helpers, Readers, Intercessors, and Office Volunteers. God is calling you to share your treasure, time and talents.

We often use the word ‘stewardship,’ in regards to money. While stewardship does include our use of money, the word is more general. In the dictionary, stewardship is defined partly as: “the responsible overseeing and protecting of something considered worth caring for and preserving.”

Our Lord owns everything. Jesus calls Christians to be stewards of what is His, and we are responsible for how we manage it. In the beginning, God created everything and put man in the garden to “work it and keep it.” There is much in our lives the Lord calls us to steward. It doesn’t matter how much money you have, where you are from or what your job is, we all have the same amount of time each day. You can’t buy or borrow more time from others, there’s absolutely nothing you can do to change how much time you have in a day.

So, if we’ve been given a specific amount of time, then we must be intentional and wise with how we use the time God gives us. Just like everything else in our life, we will give an account for how we spend our time.

Jesus says something in [Matthew 6:21](#): “For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.” It might seem like our use of money has little bearing on our spiritual life, but Jesus teaches that the way we spend our money is actually a window into our heart. We can look at our spending and see what we truly value. We can say we love God and his church, but at the end of the day, the way we spend our money will show us what we truly value.

Scripture teaches that “God loves a cheerful giver” ([2 Cor. 9:7](#)). God doesn’t just ask us to give; he desires that we would do so willfully.

All of our time and money belong to the Lord. We shouldn’t think that God simply wants a small portion of our time on Sunday or a small percentage of our money. Rather, we are to prayerfully consider how we spend each minute and every dollar that the Lord entrusts to us.

At All Saints we have many opportunities to live out our faith as stewards of God's many blessings. You may be surprised where God is calling you to serve in our church community. May we be good stewards of our time and money for the glory of God!





Coffee Ministry

This ministry is a joint sharing between All Saints and St Andrews to enable fellowship between our churches and our fellow parishioners. Covid protocols are observed. Masks are worn while preparing or serving food or moving about the hall, gloves or tongs are used while serving food.

All Saints sets up, serves, and cleans up the first Sunday of the month. All other Sundays St Andrews sets up and serves coffee. All Saints does the clean-up. One person shops providing coffee, tea, milk, cream, sugar and juice. The bill and receipts are submitted to All Saints Treasurer for reimbursement. Each team provides a snack and the clean-up team stores leftovers in the fridge or freezer, labelling same with the date.

This is a very important ministry to our Worship Service.

Prayers of the People



Intercessor

Every worship service includes the Prayers of the People. These are presented by an Intercessor. The prayers are on behalf of the people, not a personal prayer of the Intercessor. There are suggested formats including the Book of Alternative Services. All intercessors receive

the weekly Cycle of Prayer in advance. It is useful if one reads the scriptures for the Sunday found on the schedule. The Intercessor does not make up the prayers; they assemble the prayers. You will receive a lot of assistance if it is your first time; in fact you will receive assistance for the first 2 or 3 months that you are Intercessor. We need more volunteers as there are only a few active Intercessors. There are many ways to love one's neighbour, but intercessory prayer—praying on behalf of other people—has got to be one of the most powerful.

National Day of Truth & Reconciliation



Truth and Reconciliation Sunday

On the Sunday October 3rd, following Truth and Reconciliation Day September 30, All Saints held their first ever church commemoration to reflect on, and lament the white colonial culture's treatment of Indigenous peoples. Before the service, Rene Inkster helped by smudging the church and any of the congregation who wanted to participate.

The congregation was encouraged to wear orange shirts, and bring drums, which many did. Floral arrangements consisted fall flowers and cuttings of native shrubs with fall colours.

Hymns were chosen appropriate to the occasion, and accompanied by drumming. As our special guest was unable to attend, Allison Derksen provided the taped recording of the Secwepemc Honour Song, written to be performed for Truth and Reconciliation ceremonies. Our choir sang a beautiful anthem, 'You are Our Centre' following communion.

Prayers of the People were offered by two of the Truth and Reconciliation committee members, Sam Green and Susan Truman. A heartfelt sermon was delivered by our Rector Paul Bowie.

Bannock was provided by Sam Green for our fellowship time after the service.

The following is our Metis Cree Elder Sam Green's witness to the Truth and Reconciliation Day Event on September 30 at Heritage Park, site of St. Mary's Indian Residential School. Sam gave her witness at church on Sunday, October 10th.

Orange Shirt Indigenous Honouring

Thank you, Rev. Paul, All Saints Church and family for acknowledging and honouring Indigenous lost children. On Sept. 30, many, many people gathered at Heritage Park to honour Indigenous children and Orange Shirt Day. It was raining off and on and also windy at times. The smell of sweet grass and sage was sooo comforting. I felt like I was home.

Several Elders – leaders and Chiefs spoke. As to one chief, he emphasized that Indigenous people are sick of promises, apologies, empty words. They seek action.

Phyliss Webstad, Northern Secwepemc (Shushwap) was the speaker. She received an orange shirt from her Granny to wear to residential school, but it was taken away. Thrown away. She talked about the love her granny gave her and support. Phyliss also mentioned Orange Shirt Day/Indigenous Day is not a HOLIDAY, but a day of honouring stolen children.

It was wonderful to watch two Elder ladies dance the Rabbit Dance.

September is crying month, when kids left. Children were not lost; they were STOLEN.

I gave my drum to my friend. She can sing so well and I can't.

I spoke with several elders. One lost 2 nieces and one a granddaughter. I listened and I learned from them.

Vivian Searwar, the school district's Indigenous leader, did a wonderful job hosting this Honouring.

The Elders ladies were given huge sunflowers.

The smell of bannock was wonderful. Chief Johnny Williams' wife Crystal is a master. She made it on site in frying pans with the kids.

It was a powerful gathering.

The Truth and Reconciliation Library at All Saints

Did you know that we have a library of books related to Indigenous history, geography and truth and reconciliation? It's under the mailboxes in the Narthex and contains many books on these topics, including some children's books. Our priest, Paul, has been collecting these books for our use in his travels to used bookstores. There are some real finds and some multiple copies. I can recommend the following:

A Stó:lō-Coast Salish Historical Atlas – this large format book gives an in-depth and wide-ranging view of the cultural region inhabited by the Stó:ló people. There's Indigenous history and the role of non-native people in that history all told in very readable text, historic maps, charts, photographs and artwork. (The size of Sumas Lake before it was drained!) The atlas was produced by the Stó:lō Nation and is full of scholarship that is presented in a way that's accessible to a general audience. An amazing book.

Seven Fallen Feathers: Racism, Death and Hard Truths in a Northern City. An award-winning book written by Ojibway journalist Tanya Talaga, it tells the story of seven Indigenous students who died while attending high school in Thunder Bay, Ontario from 2000 to 2011. A quote from RBC Taylor Prize Jury Citation: *"Talaga describes gaps in the system large enough for beloved children and adults to fall through, endemic indifference, casual racism, and a persistent lack of resources. It is impossible to read this book and come away unchanged."* If you've ever wondered exactly what Indigenous people mean when they talk about how the justice system has failed them, then this is the book to read. It's heartbreaking, but we owe it to our Indigenous brothers and sisters to learn these hard truths so we can do better.




The Inconvenient Indian: A Curious Account of Native People in North America by Thomas King.

King is a US-born Canadian writer, academic and broadcaster of Cherokee, Greek and German heritage. He has written a funny, heart-rending book full of irony and truth about native and non-native relationships over the centuries since first contact. King refashions old stories about historical events and figures, takes a sideways look at movies and pop culture, relates his own complex experiences with activism, and expresses a deep understanding of the effects of ever shifting laws and treaties on native peoples and lands. Another book of hard truths but tempered somewhat by King's wonderful sense of humour.

Thank you, Paul for these great book finds. Everyone is welcome to borrow what interests them.



- Order list and Forms sent out November 13th. Due by November 28th.
- Bakers start baking December 1 to December 9th.
- Gathering Orders December 10th. Sorting Orders December 10th
- Distribution December 11 Saturday

We are having an on-line Bake Sale. Instead of a table full of baked goods and preserves, we will send out a list of what will be offered. People will select items from the list and submit their orders. As the Order is received, the items will be noted. Orders will be recorded immediately as they are received. At the End of the Order period, all of the Volunteer Bakers will be told how many of their items were ordered - so they know how many to actually prepare. A day before distribution, all of the items will be delivered to the church hall and each Order will be assembled.

Example: Nancy volunteers to bake 3 dozen mincemeat tarts. Sarah orders 1.5 dozen, Imogene orders 1 dozen. After orders are received Nancy is asked to bake 2 1/2 dozen.

Based on what happened in our 1st Bake Sale in Nov 2020, there was a demand for shortbread, so some Bakers were asked if they could bake an extra dozen. Otherwise people ordering were told their chosen item was Sold Out.

Suggested items: cookies, a square (could be in a foil pan), cake/loaf, tarts, preserves: jam, jelly, pickle
