I feel like most parents and grandparents (including myself) are in a constant state of worry for our kids and the effects that current state of the world is having on them. But I also see that a lot of the times we try to correct and protect through our own past experiences. It's like we are trying to turn a clock back to our own childhoods and then insert our kids into a reality that doesn't exist anymore. It's a lot like what Jesus was talking about in Luke 5:37 where he talks about not putting new wine into old wine skins because the old skins will break, and the wine will spill out all over the place basically ruining both.

So how do we fix it? How do we put ourselves in the best position possible to raise our children in the way they should go while at the same time trying to protect them for as long as possible from the depravity of our current age? Well first and foremost I think we need to redefine our concept of home.

There is an old saying that "home is where the heart is." I've always enjoyed this saying because of its insinuation that if you're with people you love and who love you back you will always be at home. The ones dedicated to seeking first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness. And then from this position of newness we need to pour into our kids the Truth of the words of God. Not the truth as we think it should be or as we think it was back in our day. We need to pour the eternal and unerring truth of the word of God into them because as we know and as Isaiah tells us, "The grass withers and the flowers fade but the word of our God will stand forever."

So, let's show our kids the *real* home. Let's show them the Kingdom of Heaven is real by showing them through our relationship with Christ and pouring the truth of the Word of God into them. It's really the only hope we have for our kids to overcome the world because it's really the only hope we have to overcome the world. As Charles Spurgeon wrote in his book Come ye Children, "The only way to keep chaff out of the child's little measure is to fill it to the brim with good wheat. Oh, may the spirit of God help us do this! The more the young are taught, the better; truth will keep them from being misled."
