Shopping for presents, decorating the tree, singing carols, making gingerbread houses, sending cards, enjoying holiday parties, making a list and checking it twice! Well, there's a little bit more to Advent than that... Advent is about preparing for Christmas AND Christmas is...

Christ entering our world and Advent is expectant waiting, hopeful anticipation and joyful preparation. God incarnate is coming into our lives and into our hearts reminding us to LOVE our Neighbour, to be kind to each other, no matter how challenging that may be. Jesus, God incarnate, God within us and around us...Past, Present & Future.

As we prepare our hearts and minds for the feast of the Incarnation, we invite you to attend the wonderful services to take you through the remainder of the seasons of Advent, Christmas and on to the 12 days of the Christmas season. - Advent I (November 28) A reminder of the Hope of Advent. We will light the first Candle, tell
 the stories and sing wonderful hymns of hope and anticipation
- Advent II (December 5) we will light the second Candle and hear of the Love as we anticipate
- Advent III (December 12) we will light the third Candle and Celebrate the Joy and thanks for Mary
- Advent IV (December 19) we will light the Candle for Peace. We welcome Bishop Anna on this day at both services.
- The Longest Night Service (Tuesday December 21 at 7 p.m.) This is a special service of Comfort and Light in the Midst of Darkness. Many loving hands came together to bring this service to you during these uncertain days. May it bring you, your friends and neighbours, a sense of peace as the nights are long and remind you, you are not alone.

- Christmas Eve Service (December 24 at 4 pm) for those young at heart, and with a focus on young families as we spread the Joy that comes with the Christ Child
- Christmas Eve Contemplative Service (December 24 at 7pm) Once again, we will offer a traditional candlelight service of music and quiet reflection, for those who need to quiet their hearts, simplify the season, and take a moment to reflect on the birth of Jesus
- Christmas Day (December 25 at 10 am) We will be providing a service of the Word for Christmas Day! A day of joy and celebration that we can share together, from the comfort of our own homes.
- The First Sunday of Christmas (December 26 at 10 am) We will observe Christmas 1 and the Feast of St. Stephen.

All of these services can be accessed online at any time once the links have been sent out. I invite you to watch and re-watch them, to spend time with them, to sing along and sit back and enjoy the season with us in this way.
