### Pastor's Message

I remember an old Calvin and Hobbes strip in which Calvin muses on the fact that, since September, the days have gotten colder and shorter. He comes to the only logical conclusion, which is that the sun is going out. In a few months, he predicts, the earth will be a cold, lifeless ball of ice. In the following strip, Calvin's father has explained to him that the world is not ending, but that winter is coming. Calvin explains his father's theory to Hobbes and then observes: "Isn't it sad how some people's grip on their lives is so precarious that they embrace any preposterous delusion rather than face an occasional bleak truth?"

I think of that strip nearly every autumn at some point. Without knowing what comes next, one could be forgiven for coming to the same conclusion as Calvin; but, of course, we know that this is simply the cycle of things: the days get shorter until they start getting longer.

As we come into the season of Advent, we begin by reading texts that are, at first, dark and frightening: the earth shaking, the seas roaring, the nations raging, the heavens falling. In my experience, we mostly like to ignore or explain away these texts. It is almost as if we are doing what Calvin thinks his father is doing: dealing with a bleak truth by trying to avoid it. The truth of it, however, is that this is all part of the cycle of things. This is what Jesus wants us to hear. He even uses the example of changing seasons: when the fig tree starts to bud and produce leaves, one knows that summer is near; or, he might also say, when the leaves begin to yellow and fall, the winter is near.

Even as we set our eyes and our hopes on what comes next, Advent also invites us to dwell in the tension of the inbetween. The season gives us an opportunity to reflect on what it means to wait, to expect what we know to be coming but which we cannot yet see. It is, by definition, a season of darkness: not just the darkness of shorter days, but the darkness of a complex world in which we cannot yet see the God for whom we wait.

As part of our Advent observance this year, we will take time to sit in and appreciate this darkness. Normally in our worship, we encounter God in words: the incarnate Word Jesus Christ, in the word proclaimed in preaching and declared in forgiveness, and in the written words of scripture and the liturgy. This Advent, however, we will explore with our midweek worship how we may also be nourished by simpler fare—where the words spoken aloud are few, and the silence surrounding them becomes itself our prayer.

You will notice a lack of extra words or music or explanation. Silence will seem long and perhaps even uncomfortable. This is intentional. We are used to words and music and liturgy guiding us into what we "should" think or reflect on or pray about. In this season, we will let the silence guide us. We will trust in the Holy Spirit to be present in the spaces between the words and the prayers to work on us as only She can.

We will also more intentionally explore what it means to worship and practice from home. Advent Calendars from ELCA World Hunger are available in the narthex or by contacting the church office. Each day, these calendars will offer a bit of scripture or a thought or a line from a hymn that can be a pebble for our shoes each day, so to speak; to sit with us and draw our attention to the waiting of Advent. We are also providing links to some Advent devotionals that *(continued)* 

you can study by yourself or with family or friends as part of your devotion. You can find links to electronic versions of these devotionals in this newsletter on our Advent page and in the weekly emails you'll receive during December.

Then, on Sunday evening, December 19, we will once again gather for our "Longest Night" worship, also called "Blue Christmas." While this service can be especially meaningful for folks who are experiencing depression, melancholy or grief during the Christmas season, it is really just an opportunity to come at the holiday from a quieter, more subdued angle. Taking place near the solstice--the longest night of the year--it allows us to sit in the darkness and honor the mystery of Christmas in a different way than we do on Christmas Eve when we sing carols and brim with joy. It may be that, after our midweek services relishing the Holy Darkness, the Longest Night service will be a good way to appreciate the darkness of Christmas.

We encounter Advent every year in the hope that we might actually be able to face the "bleak truth" without turning away from it or distracting ourselves from it, but also seeing in that truth the hidden promise: that even the darkness is simply a part of the cycle of things. This darkness, just like the light, can be nourishing, healthful, even holy. As we enter into the busiest and most stressful time of the year, I'd like to invite you to join me in resting for a while in the dark, and in waiting and watching for Christ.

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 pm.

Pastor Seth Novak led us in devotions.

The agenda was approved.

The minutes from the September 14<sup>th</sup> council meeting were approved.

#### Old Business:

Annual Committee reports have been received and were presented at the November congregational meeting. Building usage: Discussions are ongoing.

#### **New Business:**

The Council approved the Reopening Committee's recommendation to allow worshipers to sing at services starting in Advent as long as they are masked.

Sister Ann and Denny Sapp will plan several children's programs.

A note in the newsletter will advise congregants how they may contribute for the staff Christmas gifts.

The church office will be closed Dec 27-31.

The Council discussed the pros and cons of presenting a 2022 budget at the congregational meeting on November 7<sup>th</sup>, 2021.

Gene Kuest made a motion to recommend to the congregation to delay the presentation and not vote on the 2022 budget until February 2022. As our ADLC Bylaws (Chapter 10, C10.01.01 B. ii) state that the budget must be voted on at the November meeting, the congregation will need to approve this measure. Marlene Bridgforth seconded this motion, and the Council approved.

Gene Kuest made a motion to recommend that the congregation approve the extension of the expenditure authority under the 2021 budget until the next congregational meeting in February 2022, with the exception that personnel increases reflecting the Synod's recommendations will be implemented now. The motion was seconded by Susan Whitney, and was approved by the Council.

Marilyn Colyar made a motion to present the Land Acknowledgment statement at the congregational meeting for approval. Lynette Brentin seconded the motion, and the Council approved.

The next Council meeting will be held on December 14, 2021, beginning at 7 pm.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:42 pm.




#### We Share the Air - Please Keep It Fragrance-Free and Healthy for All

The title of this article comes from a time a few years ago when my niece and my wife were constantly breaking into these lyrics from Wonder Pets (a cartoon, for anyone who is either too old or too young to have been subjected to the song). If your incoming phone calls are anything like mine, many of them are

from a variety of charities asking for donations. Most are worthwhile causes, although some spend far more on fundraising than is ever passed along to the charities themselves. Several years ago, I began responding to these requests by politely saying that we gave all our donations through our Church. Although I am going to discuss my favorite charities, the only thing that I would suggest is that we all make our charitable donations intentional.

First, and foremost, Agnus Dei is at the top of our list of charities. It is where we direct the largest part of our charitable giving. The remaining charities we donate to are always people centered and almost always local. For many years we have supported Food Backpacks 4 Kids and FISH Food Bank. Some of our donations to these two are monetary, but our Community Outreach Committee also provides many opportunities throughout the year to give food and other materials. We also feel that education is important so from time to time we have donated to Little Lambs Preschool. ELCA World Hunger is the only nonlocal charity to which we routinely donate. Whenever there is a disaster worldwide and you would like to donate to help relief efforts, the ELCA usually provides a way for Lutherans to donate money to help.



"interest-only" payments for the first four months of the year, with small principal payments beginning in May 2021, which 
have reduced our costs so far this year by approximately \$39,000, as well as receipt of one-time federal PPP funds (\$67,270) 
and the Congregation's decision to reduce the monthly payment to ELCA Mission Support to 5 percent from 10 percent, which 
has saved \$17,475.
