

Zoom and in-person worship options have been offered and appears that both options are welcomed by everyone and allow for each family to attend worship as they wish. In 2021, a new Paschal candle was purchased, and new candles were purchased for the alter. Thank you to Pastor Matt and Matt Brown for building the holders for the alter candles. For most of 2021, communion has been served with individual cups of grape juice and a wafer, however, Salem also purchased new pouring chalices for communion. The pouring chalices have been used on a few occasions, but due to the pandemic, the individual cups have continued to be used. Rally Sunday had a slight change to its name in 2021 to "Welcome Back Sunday." Activities were planned for families and it felt good to have a nice turnout in church for these activities. The Advent and Christmas season welcomed a beautiful, new Christmas Tree in the front of the church. The Worship and Music Committee continues to be responsible for lay reader assignments each Sunday.

We also want to express our thanks to organist/pianist Diane Schulte, to pianist Kim Osman, to guitarist and worship leader Thomas Philaya, Merideth Brown who directs the hand bell choir, Kim Osman who directs the senior choir, video technician Kurt Hoehne and to Pastor Matt, Diane Schulte and Amy Hamilton for organizing each Sunday's worship service for Zoom viewers and those attending in person.

## **Pastor Report**

# Pastor Matt Philaya 2021 Annual Report – Salem Lutheran Church 2021 Highlights

Isaiah 43:1-2; 18-19

But now thus says the Lord,
he who created you, O Jacob,
he who formed you, O Israel:
Do not fear, for I have redeemed you;
I have called you by name, you are mine.

**The year twenty twenty one** was a year where in the midst of a global pandemic the Holy Spirit seemed to use the experience as a blessing. Adaptations that might otherwise be difficult became opportunities "let some things go other things can grow". We may not be as big or as busy as we once were, but we still have a stories to share about our ministry from this unusual year.

**Hybrid Worship** — Attending worship in person may always be preferable because of the opportunity for face-to-face interaction. However, the pandemic has provided us with the continued opportunity develop a method for folks to attend worship live online or by phone. As opposed to simply watching a worship service, the "hybrid" model invites those attending online to actively participate in real time with those in person. I am thankful that Salem members have graciously allowed this format to be a part of our ministry and worship culture.

**Synod Assembly Online** – Salem Voting Members Dave and Judy Johnson attended the 2021 SWMN Synod Assembly which was held online June 6, 11 & 12. Because there was also a synod bishop election, the event needed to be split over two weekends to allow for nominations and time in between for background checks and other matters. Dave and Judy were among the hundreds of participants from our synod who participated in the assembly in this way.

**Bishop Dee Pederson Elected** – Bp. Dee is the first female bishop of the SWMN Synod, who follows Bp. Jon Anderson who served multiple terms totaling 18 years. Bp. Dee formerly served the SWMN Synod as Director of Evangelical Mission, and came to Salem to lead a visioning workshop in January of 2020.

**Pouring Chalices For Communion** – Among other adaptations to our worship as a result of the pandemic, we also introduced pouring chalices for communion in 2021. This provided us with the opportunity to come forward to receive communion for a few months until needing to return to the disposable juice/wine packets. The pouring chalice will replace the intinction method as a more sanitary option, also allowing recipients to receive a cup rather than simply dip a wafer.

**Altar Guild "Reboot"** – A special thank you goes out to Leanne Anderson and Ardy Spray for time and effort put in to take inventory of, clean out, and organize the sacristy. The different colored paraments, the banners, communion supplies, candle oil, the Advent Wreath - all of it needed to be gone through. Leanne and Ardy have now also reorganized the altar guild so that more volunteers can take part.

Strombeck Church Model Permanently Displayed – Most folks reading this may know the story of Strombeck Church, the congregation of Swedish immigrants who founded Salem, and eventually joined with Salem in the 1940's. A handful of people remain who recall the Strombeck Church from their childhood. Salem member Lavonne Schultz and her husband Earl, who have been gone for a number of years now, built a scale model of the Strombeck Church entirely from Lavonne's memory. This model sat in storage upstairs for many years until this past summer, when family members of Lavonne and Earl built a moveable lighted display case for the model. This display case can now sit in the front entry, or at the entrance to the sanctuary.

**Ice Cream Social** – With the pandemic, the Ice Cream Social was cancelled in 2020, but was able to be held as an outdoor event on Sunday, July 18, of 2021. Thank you to Salem members who took the time to organize this and make it happen.

"Welcome Back Sunday" – Our traditional "Rally Sunday" became "Welcome Back Sunday" on September 12. This slight change of theme reflected Salem member's longing to return to a routine of in-person worship attendance during the winter months.

**Sunday School** – For the record, "Sunday School" for the fall of 2021 was led by me using a family based model in the sanctuary after worship. For each session I introduced the lesson to the families attending, and each family would work together on the lesson and art project that went with it. This worked well for those participating. I have also had a few parents who have sought out resources for doing their own home-based Sunday School model, which I think is fantastic. Faith teaching is not one-size fits all, and a more customized "equipping" approach is likely to be the future trend.

**2022 ELCA National Youth Gathering** – Ninth grader Hallie Helgeson and tenth grader Kiya Blom are Salem youth members, and will be attending the ELCA National Youth Gathering July 24-28, 2022. They have been preparing for this event with Carman Mills who will attend as one of the adult leaders. Salem is partnering with Our Savior's of Montevideo to attend this event.

**Confirmation** – A special thank you goes out to Carman Mills and Esther Mills for once again teaching the grades 7-9 confirmation program here at Salem. I have been doing some teaching of the ninth grade class with Esther, although she and Carman have organized and facilitated most all of it. They have also incorporated a number of Salem adults to be paired up with the confirmation students as mentors. Thank you as well to those volunteer mentors for their time and energy.

Joint Thanksgiving Eve Service With Baxter and Saron – Some things are more fun to do with the neighbors, and one of those is the annual Thanksgiving Eve service. This service is dwindling in attendance for Salem and other churches individually, but provides a great way to partner with other congregations. Thank you to Pr. Matt Danielson for inviting us to join them at Baxter on Thanksgiving Eve 2021.

**Festival of Santa Lucia** – Salem's annual Advent tradition of the Swedish festival of Santa Lucia resumed its place on our December 2021 calendar after a cancelled year due to the pandemic. Swedish folks musicians Ross Sutter, Cheryl Paschke, and Marya Hart came once again to provide music for our worship service and the festivities afterward.

**Multi-Generational Christmas Program** – When you cannot do what you normally do, you can do something different. This was the case for us this year with the annual Sunday School Christmas program. With the pandemic adversely affecting our Sunday School attendance this year, we chose to hold a Christmas Program that involved members of all ages. Through this customized version of Lessons and Carols, quite a variety Salem members took part in readings or musical selections for this program. Participants included families with young children, to confirmation students and mentors, to senior members Salem.

**Roof Debt Paid Off** – Thank you to members of Salem who contributed to our \$48,000 re-shingling debt with which we started 2021, allowing us to pay this off in the course of one year. Thank you also to Paul Anderson, who gently and persistently worked with me to produce a series of video updates that helped to keep this matter a priority for 2021.

**New Coffee Maker** – Someday somebody WILL ask "When did we get the new coffee maker?" The answer is December of 2021. It is a BUNN commercial coffee maker just right for the quantities made and frequency of use by volunteers at Salem. Thank you to Rick Mohagen for this purchase in memory of his wife Karen.

#### Bishop's 2021 Annual Report

"God has placed us in cities, farms, and towns together....

The Risen Christ surprises us as we plant God's Word in the world....

By God's grace, together we have what we need."

These words from our synod mission statement provide both grounding and direction as we complete a year of significant change and look ahead to the future. And first I want to say **Thank You!** for your congregation's participation and leadership, and for your partnership with one another across our synod. I am inspired by your witness to Jesus Christ and grateful for your dedication! As I share this first annual report, there are key insights in this statement that I want to lift up.

God. I know: that is not a surprising place to begin, is it? But all too often, we do not begin with God or God's Word; we begin with us. Or me. And given the year we have just been through, that is understandable. There are so many concerns that weigh on our hearts. We have mourned the loss of loved ones, struggled with pandemic protocols and illness, seen our kids be on-again off-again with their schools, navigated worship and devotions online, worried about attendance and offering, waited for a pastor to come to lead us. But during challenging times especially, it is vital to begin with God, just as the stories of God's Word do:

- In the beginning God created. Genesis 1:1
- In the beginning was the Word. John 1:1
- The grace of the Lord Jesus be with all the saints. Amen. Revelation 22:21

As we consider how much the world has changed in the last 2 years, and as we consider the challenges our congregations and communities face in greater Minnesota right now, it is easy to get stuck on us and our problems.

Yet your congregation is not here by chance. It is God who planted you where you are – whether that was 155 years ago, 45, or 5. You have been baptized into the Holy Trinity, who now sends you to serve each other and your community for a time such as this. God is calling you. The Risen Christ does surprise us as we plant God's Word. God's grace will provide what you need. "It is the Lord your God who goes with you. And God will not forsake you or leave you." (Deut. 31:6).

"Synod" literally means "walking together." Planted in cities, open rural country, and towns, no two of our congregations are identical; we are different from each other. We have different histories and traditions. That can lead us to think that because we may not have certain things in common, that we don't need each other. After serving in this Office for only 4 months, I have been blessed to see the varieties of gifts the Spirit has poured out on each of our congregations and rostered ministers. And one of the things the pandemic has taught us is that we are better together. This year we have discovered that "togetherness" in new and important ways:

- Presidents & lay leaders making connections and sharing best practices as they meet together.
- Rostered ministers forming long and lasting relationships via zoom, in person, in text studies, and conference gatherings for support, encouragement, and prayer.
- Neighboring congregations meeting together to explore how they might share ministry programming and pastoral care and leadership.

Together, your synod staff has been walking with you as we have been in a time of transition:

- I am so grateful for the leadership of Bishop Jon Anderson over these past 18 years. His legacy provides such a strong foundation for this synod as I have begun to serve in this new role.
- Synod Minister Pr. Stephen Cook will continue to serve in his call as pastoral staff and will relate to conferences
  in the northern tier of the synod.
- Synod Administrative Staff includes Tammy Schacher Executive Assistant to the Bishop, Office Manager, and
   Call Process Administrator; Kristin Bakeberg Communications Coordinator; Maggie Berggren Administrative Assistant;
   Carla Klawitter Temporary Administrative Assistant.
- Transition Synod Ministers Pr. Dwaine Bruns, Pr. Art Wiese, Pr. Stephen Rasmusson, and former Synod Staff member
   Pr. Linda Pedersen sustained conference call processes and will conclude their transitional ministry at the end of January.
- · Gifts of Grace staff Pr. Andrew Hermodson-Olsen and Pr. Kelly France.
- Pr. Keith Pearson, ELCA Planned Giving Coordinator a position funded by the ELCA and deployed in the synod.
- Sister Sarah Hausken now serving with the churchwide Deaconess Community after working with our synod for 21 years.
- Pr. Troy Pflibsen Director for Evangelical Mission (D.E.M.) a position funded by the ELCA and deployed in our synod.
- Pr. Heather Culuris, joining our pastoral staff January 1, 2022, will relate to conferences in the southern tier of the synod.

Together, your staff team has been doing a fantastic job of focusing on candidacy, interim ministries, call process, and the leadership transition. At the present time, there are 54 out of 230 congregations that are in some point of transition – the highest number ever. If you know someone in your congregation who has the gifts for full or part-time ministry, please be bold enough to encourage them; it may be the Spirit's way of calling forth a new leader. And if you have a rostered minister leading your congregation right now, please express your appreciation to them and let them know you are grateful for their ministry.

By God's grace, together we have what we need.

I return to the place I began: gratitude. Thank you for your continuing and generous financial gifts for Mission Support that sustain the ministries of this synod and our many partners locally and around the globe. We are grateful to all who have shared gifts for Gifts of Grace that enhance the financial well-being of our rostered leaders. In addition, this year Lilly Endowment, Inc. has awarded us a new grant that will assist rostered ministers impacted financially by the pandemic, as well as assisting congregations who will explore partnerships with neighboring churches. During a change in leadership, I am grateful for the staff and governance leaders who have ensured that we enter 2022 on a solid place financially and begin a process of envisioning how God's mission is leading us in new ways into the future.

Finally, thank you for your prayers as I begin serving in the Office of the Bishop. I have been overwhelmed by the power of your prayers and encouragement during these first four months of leadership and pray that I serve you and God's mission well as the synod's pastor. # **2021 Congregational Report**

We are absolutely blessed to report that Green Lake Lutheran Ministries had a fantastic year! With the return of summer camp, increased retreat ministries, exciting projects completed, and giant dreams for the future, we have so much to be excited about and thankful for!

In this report, you will find a brief summary of our year, but please watch for our official Annual Report. This will be mailed out to congregations in January, before our Annual Meeting on February 8, 2022.

#### **Program Ministry**

What a healing experience it was to be back around the campfire with kids from across the state this past summer! After cancelling the 2020 summer camp season, which paused an over 80 year tradition of running onsite summer camp ministry, there was an overwhelming joy that came with welcoming the first groups of campers back to camp. With COVID still being a significant and serious presence in our collective lives, we planned for roughly 50% of our record breaking numbers in 2019, but exceeded those numbers by almost 20%! And the 7 layers of risk mitigation put in place to keep campers and staff safe worked - no reported COVID cases from campers or within our staff teams!

2021 also marked the return of our programmed retreat schedule. We have hosted confirmation retreats, service weekends, crafting groups, elementary mini camps, a new grandparent and grandchild program, women's retreats, men's retreats, and so much more! The variety of faith-based and Christ-centered groups that returned to each of our three sites this year has been so joyful.

And lastly, our Dinner Theater was brought back in person this year! Guests enjoyed a four course dinner with over four dozen made from scratch menu items, while being entertained and inspired by a wonderful play and choral production by Dave Eliason and Brian Pearson. Although all was done in a modified format limiting numbers and risk, to see the community come together back at camp was incredible. Thank you to the dozens of volunteers who help share the Gospel in such a unique way, each year!

#### **Properties**

All three of the sites had projects happening in 2021. A signature project that was finished this year was the remodeling of two cottages located at Shores of St. Andrew Bible Camp. Both cabins were rented out by staff alumni, pastors, church groups, and families all summer and well into the fall. And we can't wait to host some of our own program groups this winter and in the year ahead! At Camp House, we were blessed by a volunteer group who replaced the Lodge's shingles with a new steel roof and significant work on the baseball field commenced. At Green Lake Bible Camp, we had various infrastructure projects that really added up - water heaters, furnaces, well house remodels, septic work, staining, painting, and so much more.

We are so blessed to have such talented property staff and volunteers.

#### **Financial Position**

Although our year end financials are not finalized as of the writing of this report, we are projecting that we will finish the year strong without having to take on the debt which was approved for general operations at the 2020 Annual Meeting. Summer camp, retreat, and fundraising income have all exceeded expectations! Thank you all for the incredible support!

#### Water's Edge Strategic Process

At our Annual Meeting in February, we will be sharing the final report from our pre-campaign work which will include updated master site plans, concept drawings for key buildings, and a recommendation for the corporation to consider regarding a capital campaign.

We feel so great about where we are in this process!

#### Closing

As we consider the year ahead, we have so many reasons to be optimistic about what is to come. We expect that as was the case in 2021, we will again take another step forward in regaining our footing before the shutdowns of 2020. It is clear that our style of ministry is still incredibly relevant and needed in this ever changing world.

The format of this report doesn't allow near the space needed to process the entire year nor thank all that contributed to its success. The almost 200 congregations and thousands of people who are connected to this organization are a special group. Thank you so much for partnering with us again this year as we share (together) the life-changing love of Jesus in vibrant settings in community and creation!

Change and the need for creativity have become constants over the last year and a half in many aspects of life, including the church. This was the case for **Living Christ <u>Lutheran Church</u>** in Flagstaff, Ariz., even before a global pandemic caused many of us to rethink what it means to be church. Generosity from all three expressions of the ELCA (the churchwide organization, the Grand Canyon Synod and members of Living Christ) helped turn a congregation "on the road out of town, near the mall" into an online presence reaching over 500 people a week from Phoenix to the Philippines. (Read more about Living Christ in the current issue of "Stories of Faith in Action" at ELCA.org/SOFIA.)

Many other congregations have found new ways to connect both when inperson worship was impossible and when congregations began to return to their sanctuaries. Generosity, especially through Mission Support, helped us find and support these new ways of being connected. Early in the pandemic, ELCA Worship launched the "Worship in the Home" webpage, with Scripture, hymn links, prayers and reflections for each

Sunday. These resources were and continue to be used in congregations across the ELCA—even at **Sitka Lutheran Church** in Alaska, whose members printed and hand-delivered "Worship in the Home" resources to fellow members without internet access.

Change and creativity have taught us many things. As Pastor Sandra Rudd of Sitka Lutheran Church noted, "The pandemic was a stark illustration of the fact that the church is not a building. A lot of people say that, but we didn't fully know it until we didn't have a building to use. We learned that there are many ways to be connected as the church." Throughout the pandemic, the ELCA has changed and adapted, doing ministry in new and creative ways, because of the generosity of its members. Even now, you may be gathering in a new way for your annual meeting, to discern how you will steward the gifts shared generously with your congregation to do ministry in your community and beyond. As you have these important conversations, remember that your gifts of time, talent and resources have helped create new spaces beyond our walls and buildings where we continue to worship, serve and love God and each other.
