I'm a huge fan of detective novels, especially if they take place in other countries. I've enjoyed the Department Q series set in Denmark, the Coroner's Lunch set in Laos, and recently I've been reading Antti Tuomainen's books set in Finland.

On Thursdays, I walk with my dear friends Fr. Gordon and Deacon Charles. A Catholic, Episcopalian, and Lutheran walk into a bar . . . yes, it sounds like the beginning of a joke, but we have lovely conversations.

Recently Gordon said he was a detective (I think I was making fun of him for missing something obvious); he looked for clues of God's fleeting presence in this world. It was a great quote that he made up on the spot and hopefully I got right, but that is some of what the call to pastor is about.

We are detectives looking for clues, glimpses, of what is eternal, what is meaningful, what is worthy of being called God. It's hard to keep paying attention when there are so many details to tend to and such an emphasis on busyness, but that is the primary part of my call. So I'm trying to be a detective too.

Providing hospitality for families who are experiencing homelessness has been a glimpse of God's presence not because everything is perfect and rosy, but we get to experience the work of building up community. When I talked with the senior high youth before volunteering, I shared one of my mantras, "Family Promise is not about fixing people as if they have something wrong, but it is about fixing a community so we are in right relationship and no child is left without a home."

Our council is a glimpse of God's presence in this world, and even our annual meetings and report. Again, not because they are perfect, but because there is a realness. People show up as they are and try to figure out how to live as community. That's God's good work of salvation, building the body of Christ so we may witness to the world a different way of being together than hostility and domination.

February is a good month to curl up with a detective novel, but like all months, it is a prime time to open your eyes and be a detective who seeks clues for God's fleeting presence in this world.

February 6 10:45 a.m.—Walking after church.


February 13 10:45 a.m.—Counting cans for Souper Bowl Sunday.

The Season of Lent begins on March 2

Lent is traditionally a time of preparation for Easter. It is 40 days (not including Sundays) of fasting, prayer, and confession. This is also a time of preparation for baptism. Purple is the color for Lent as a sign of penance, as we enter into the darkness of our sin; and it is a sign of royalty, recognizing Christ's lordship even over death and sin.

We begin this season with **Ash Wednesday** on March 2. There will be a hybrid worship at 5:30 p.m. at Shepherd of the Valley (both in person and on Zoom). This is a 30-minute worship and we will follow the current covid mitigation plan (we remain flexible re: mitigation plans). Please make a point to join us for this powerful worship.

We will hold **Holden Evening Prayer** on Zoom at 5:30 p.m., Wednesdays through Lent.

Choir and Fat Tuesday Follies

We hope to begin choir rehearsals again during Lent pending covid guidelines. Our pancake feast and variety show, Fat Tuesday Follies, is also going to be held (or not) with regard to community guidelines. Stay tuned for details (and maybe get an act together for Follies? Let's be optimistic).

Lenten Disciplines

We are all encouraged to choose a Lenten discipline. It is a time of fasting from destructive habits and embracing creative ones:

Possible fasts:

Single use plastic - straws, bags, packaging.

Screens - make a goal that is attainable i.e. one hour on weekdays and two on weekends.

Gossip or criticism - say something that builds up every time a nasty thought enters.

Alcohol - Alcohol still kills more people than drug overdoses in Alaska. Lent is a great time to check in with your body and make sure you are not hooked.

Convenience Foods/Meats - Fast from meat or processed food once or twice a week.

Forwarding Social Media without fact checking.

Possible new habits:

Worship regularly
Give generously
Journal
Prepare and eat meals with others
Read scripture and poetry
Walk 20 minutes a day
