Missioner's Report (2021)

Looking back on the last year, we have come through a lot, haven't we? As Anglican Christians in Valhalla Parish, this has been another year in which we have sought to love and serve our neighbours as best we can. In and of itself, this is not different from any other year—for this is the call to the church in every age. And yet, with an ever shifting public health environment, we have not always been able to lean on the practices that we usually rely on to do these things.

2021 St. David's Thrift Shop Annual Report

This has been a challenging year. We have lost several of our volunteers due to COVID-19 and we are only open half days. In spite of the shorter hours, we are thankful for the continued support of our community, which is reflected in the bottom line. Our cash register was stolen during a robbery, but a new cash register was donated by Jean Schwan. We received cash donations and good wishes from many of our clients.

St. David's is proud to support the Castlegar Community Services, The Way Out Homeless Shelter, and the Red Cross Society. Blankets and towels are donated to the West Kootenay Animal Shelter. Some of our volunteers make cloth bags, which are given to our customers to help reduce the use of plastic grocery bags.

Bonnie Thompson stepped down in June, after four grueling years with floods, thefts, and COVID. She did an amazing job. In late September, my husband passed away, and unfortunately, I was not able to do much for a few months. I am thankful for the vice-president, Joyce Munden, and the executive team for ably taking over in my absence. Val Thompson, Treasurer, will provide the financial report.

2021 Community Harvest Food Bank Report

The last year has certainly challenged all of us. Frustration, sadness, fear, uncertainty and most noticeably a disconnect with our clientele. The benefits of a Drop-In of course is the social aspect of it, comradery, and community connections are so important. Not having the opportunity to sit with our people and discuss the issues that they are facing has been challenging to say the least.

The extreme weather has posed a challenge as well, from heat, smoke, and the cold snaps. Our homeless population suffers the most. There are those who do not want to stay indoors at the shelter for safety reasons. There are still no sufficient outdoor facilities for these folks to use for personal hygiene nor are there bathroom facilities. We are also seeing more women sleeping in their cars, sometimes with children. Current housing options are simply not in their reach.

Homelessness is not going away, in fact, you will be seeing a significant rise as there is no affordable housing stock. The cost-of-living weighs heavy on those with little income. So many of our housed clientele fear the cost of turning up their furnaces or using extra power in the heat of summer. Community connections and social gatherings are now more important than ever before.

We have been providing sleeping bags, tents, warm winter gear to those in need along with gift cards, lunches, and food hampers. Our lunch numbers run between 85 and 110 lunches, three times a week. We have really felt the extra costs of having to prepackage all the lunches for delivery and pick up, it has added at least an extra \$5000.00 plus to our costs. Food costs have gone up, and on average we spend \$100,000.00 on groceries/lunches a year.

We continue to offer our small shelter to people. Due to COVID, we have had to limit the capacity to one person at a time. We housed people over the 2021 year in Motels and Hotels. We have been spending \$40,000.00 per year on housing. We continue to help our clients with gas, rent, utilities, medical, and other necessities when funds allow.

Harm reduction continues to be a large part of the work we do. We can supply clean safe supplies to those that use in a respectful and non-judgemental space.

We are so grateful to St David's for allowing us to use their space and for your tolerance. We also appreciate Andrew's words of wisdom, his calming demeanor, and his willingness to listen. We thank all who have donated to us over the years. Community Harvest Food Bank is humbled to have the trust of our community. We look forward to better days ahead. From our homes to yours, have a safe and healthy 2022
