MAKE MY EARS SHARP TO YOUR VOICE.


MAKE ME WISE SO THAT I MAY KNOW THE THINGS

To your symbol colour white of clarity and brightness.

To your animal symbol the swan which brings us in touch with Mother Earth and growing things;

To your lessons calling us to balance of our Body in the spirit of a good sense of humor;

To invoke your spirit of innocence, trust and love;

Help us to open our eyes to the sacredness of every living thing,

We pray: **COME HOLY SPIRIT, COME.** 

## We turn to complete the circle and to look:

To God, our Creator who cleanses our Mother Earth with snow, wind and rain;

To Jesus Christ, the Peacemaker who fills us with the wideness of mercy and Lovingly embraces all, and the Holy Spirit who inspires us to action:

## COME HOLY SPIRIT, COME.

## Genesis 1-11,31 NSRV

In the beginning when God created<sup>[a]</sup> the heavens and the earth, <sup>2</sup> the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God<sup>[b]</sup> swept over the face of the waters. <sup>3</sup> Then God said, "Let there be light"; and there was light. <sup>4</sup> And God saw that the light was good; and God separated the light from the darkness. <sup>5</sup> God called the light Day, and the darkness he called Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day.

Leader: We give thanks to you, gentle Four Winds, for bringing clean air for us to breathe from the four directions.

Response: We give you thanks, O Lord.

Leader: Elder Brother Sun, we send thanks for shining your light and warming Mother

Earth,

Response: We give you thanks, O Lord.

Leader: Thank you, Grandmother Moon, for growing full every month to light the

darkness for children and sparkling waters.

Response: We give you thanks, O Lord.

Leader: We give you thanks, twinkling stars, for making the night sky so beautiful and

for sprinkling morning dew drops on the plants.

Leader: Spirit Protectors of our past and present, we thank you for showing us ways to live in peace and harmony with one another.
