

## **CLARA'S CORNER**

The other day I was walking around the church building and happened to slow down long enough to notice a few delightful new signs of growth in the flower beds. I don't know why this always feels like a surprise. It happens every spring! I love how after months of dormancy and no signs of life, in the right conditions tiny green sprouts pop up above the soil, stretching for light and ready to grow into something new and wondrous. It always feels like a miracle to me. Maybe this is one of the reasons I love spring so much. Creation is always teaching us something about life, about relationships and about God's creative capacity.

In a few short weeks we will once again begin the season of Lent. Like the seasons of creation, our liturgical life circles around the story of Christ's birth, life, death and resurrection. It is the ongoing story of God's creative purpose. Having come through Advent, Christmas and Epiphany we focus on Jesus as he emerges from the waters of the Jordan River, baptized and ready to

begin a new ministry and path. Before that ministry and new path unfold, Jesus spends time in the wilderness. The wilderness or barren land is often seen as a place of emptiness. The images are usually sand or dry earth, very little vegetation and seemingly lifeless. What we don't see with the naked eye is the microscopic activity happening below the surface. Much like a winter season, the wilderness seems harsh and unvielding, and yet in the right conditions, bursts of new life and activity emerge even in the wilderness.

We will begin our journey in the wilderness starting on Ash Wednesday, March 2<sup>nd</sup>. We go into the wilderness with faith and with trust. We will take time to consider the wilderness season that seems to have gone on for more than 2 years. We have faithfully endured many challenges and yet here we are tired and wondering what this next season will bring. What have we learned about ourselves, our faith and our relationship with God, neighbour, and our beloved earth?

## TREASURER'S REPORT

FINANCIAL REPORT TO END OF JANUARY 2022

This is the first Financial Report of 2022.

We ended January with a \$389 shortfall; without Christmas offerings and the Federal Canada Employment Wage Subsidy we would be \$9,000 in the hole for the month. In January, we received almost \$6000.00 in Christmas offerings which should have come in December, and there was the last of the Federal COVID support payments for \$3200.00.

During 2021 we averaged \$7300 deficit each month. If that trend continues into the future, we will use up the \$157,004 surplus within 24 months.

Thanks to everyone in the Parish who have continued their giving during these most difficult times.


