Report of the Corporation – 2022

As people who write reports regularly, it has begun to feel inaccurate to say “This was a year like no other,” as we head into the third “year like no other.” 2021 was a year with many challenges, unexpected turns, and plenty of signs of God’s love and blessing in our midst.

Thanks go out to everyone who has coped with closures and openings, reschedulings and cancelations, distancing, masks, and everything else that has happened. Special thanks to all of those volunteers and leaders in the parish who have adapted their work again and again to changing circumstances. Special thanks go to Derek Feschuk who, after several years of work, has retired as the parish webmaster. Thank you, Derek, for developing and maintaining an important means of communication for so long!

We also offer thanks for the lives and work of Davada Carlson and Richard Greig. Davada served the parish in many capacities and died this year while in office as the People’s Warden. Richard was the long-time organist of the parish and also died this past year. The presence and gifts of both Davada and Richard are deeply missed and we treasure their legacies.

Davada’s death meant that we had a mid-term vacancy in the corporation. Thank you to everyone who participated in the congregational meeting where we saw Laurel take on responsibility as People’s Warden for the remainder of Davada’s term and Michael Minor step into his role as Incumbent’s Warden a few months early. Everyone was gracious about accommodating the unexpected change and holding space for grief even while we took care of the necessary administrative changes.

Maintaining connections with parishioners and all of our friends and neighbours has remained a challenge this year. Emails, Zoom meetings, telephone calls, and letters delivered by Canada Post have all been important, but the greatest means of all has been the conversations between people. The many stories of telephone calls and (appropriately distanced) visits have been so heartening and a great sign of deep care for one another.

Over the summer the parish was privileged to host the Emmanuel Mission Summer Learning Program. Emmanuel Mission is an Anglican congregation of primarily South Sudanese people here in Winnipeg. Each summer they run an educational program for youth teaching math, science, and Dinka language and culture. Hearing the rooms and halls of the parish filled with laughter and meeting so many bright, energetic children was a true blessing. This relationship proved to be the beginning of something longer, as Emmanuel Mission is looking for a home for a more permanent Learning Centre. This program will be housed in the lower level of Trinity Hall and is designed to help young people connected to the Emmanuel Mission community succeed and thrive in middle and high school, preparing them for university and working careers. This is an exciting partnership and we are looking forward to seeing the fruit it bears in the months to come!

As our parish neighbourhood changes around us—not for the first time in 153 years!—we find ourselves called to discern our mission as the Anglican expression of God’s church in downtown Winnipeg. How are we called to be the Body of Christ as a community, for the sake of all of our neighbours and for one another? And, as we consider plans such as repair of the church building in the near future, how can we make sustainable choices that support the mission of our congregation today, tomorrow, and for the next generation? Discernment of how our work aligns with God’s will is critical, as we read in Proverbs 16.9, “The human mind plans the way, but the Lord directs the steps.”

2021 was once again a challenging year for the Lunchroom. We were hoping that we would be able to bring people into the building to dine together. Yet, every time we thought we might be ready, another Covid-19 lockdown occurred.

One thing to be grateful for is the fact that Government regulations have allowed us to continue serving people in need, even when other parts of our communal life have been forced to take on different forms of gathering.

I'm also grateful for the many people who continue to come and give their time to the lunchroom. Blair, James, Janice, Joan, Karen, Laurel, Michael M., Michael O., Nancy, and Rhianna for their support. In particular thanks to Blair and Laurel for all their efforts in picking up food. To Karen, as well for agreeing to take the lead in coordinating volunteer help.

There are undoubtedly those who have assisted from time to time whose names are not listed, but I appreciated your efforts also. In a difficult time, many people have put in to practice God's love for his people, by helping out at The Lunchroom.

Financial support for the Lunchroom was quite strong through the year. In addition to ongoing, regular support from parishioners, we also received financial grants from the Second Harvest and Access Credit Union. We also receive weekly donations of bread, thanks to Crusty Bun Bakery, and to Marilyn Surbey who picks them up for us. We pray that God will continue to bless such organizations.

Along with these organizations, government subsidies covered a portion of my salary, which is very helpful as well.

In addition to The Lunchroom, we were able to connect with Rev, Tanis Kolisnyk and Rupert's Land Wechetowin to help provide winter items, gifts, and hygiene products to Indigenous communities.

When not doing Lunchroom activities, I spend a good portion of my time working with livestreaming our liturgies. This is an area in which we could use a lot of help going forward. We have the capacity to operate two cameras during the liturgy, but we don't have the people.

This is something that would improve the worship experience for parishioners and others accessing our livestreams. If you would like to be involved in helping to operate the cameras, please let me know.

Looking forward in 2022, I hope we make more connections to the broader community. I also hope that the connections we made during the past year become stronger. Let us keep moving out into our world and enter into the work that God is already doing.

Following shut down there was only a need for Intercessors to write and submit prayers for the weekly messages sent out by The Reverend Andrew to Connectors for parishioners. The Prayers also were placed on the web page and were read by the Priest for the Virtual services.

Many thanks are given to the very few Intercessors, Be Buckingham, Bill Latter, Joan Lloyd who diligently served in this ministry throughout the whole year. When we opened for services in the summer for outside worship and when the church was open for worship, the same volunteers delivered intercession in person. Their dedication is much appreciated.

HOLY TRINITY AGM 2022 GREETERS AND SIDES PEOPLE REPORT.

We have had a few extremely dedicated people who have served as Sides People and Greeters over the past year which has been an invaluable commitment. They have served in person in the grounds during outdoor services in the summer and when the church was open for in person worship. Many thanks must go to Rob Loudfoot, Blair Stevenson and Bill Latter who have consistently served. Not only greeting people and making sure protocols of sanitizing hands, mask wearing and signing in were adhered to they collected the offertory and guided parishioners to have a safe Holy Communion and worship. Thanks also to the counters, Escott Cuff and latterly Be Buckingham, The added recording of QR Coode I.D. was another addition to their duties before the closure December 25th. Another duty added to my role as Lead Greeter was to assign people to take up the Elements for the acceptance of all gifts to the altar. It made more sense as the altar guild folks previously assigning were in the other cohort. Other people stepped up to aid with QR code recording and many helped out to greet and welcome new comers especially in the summer outside when chair setting up and safety protocols were a little different.

Let us hope and pray that soon we shall return to a new normal and be able to welcome many people safely to our midst to Holy Trinity Church in down town Winnipeg.

Parking Committee

The Parking Committee was created in 2004 to manage all parking related issues involving Holy Trinity Anglican Church. The Parking Committee has been given direction by Vestry that accessible parking is to be provided for Parishioners attending all Church functions. During 2021, as a result of the COVID19 pandemic, there were limited events requiring any planning with respect to parking at either Holy Trinity or Canada Life Centre (formerly BellMTS Place). The number of Canada Life Centre events did however pick up in the fourth quarter of the year.

Last year I skipped the advice on parking requirements for events at Holy Trinity but I will provide it again this year in hopes that there will be more events at Holy Trinity during 2022 in addition to regular Sunday services. Anyone planning a Church event in the evening or on a weekend should be aware of Canada Life Centre events being held at the same time. A representative of the Parking Committee or the Church Office will make arrangements for parking to be provided. Event organizers are responsible to communicate parking arrangements to the Parishioners attending the Church event. When a conflict with a Canada Life Centre event is unavoidable, scheduling the Church event one half hour prior to the Canada Life Centre event does make parking requirements more manageable.

I would also like to remind readers that there are several parking passes normally available in the office for Church volunteers. These passes are intended to be used during normal weekday business hours to avoid parking fees and parking tickets.

The Church received gross income of \$77,906.40 from operations of the parking lot during 2021. This is 17.1% or \$16,075.01 less than the income of \$93,981.41 received for 2020 and 67.0% less than the 2019 income of \$236,363.75. This significant reduction in income resulting from the pandemic is the first time since the creation of the Parking Committee that there has been a year to year reduction in income two years in a row. The last time we received rent less than in 2021 was in 2004. There was a different rent structure at the time that had been developed prior to the opening of the MTS Centre (now Canada Life Centre). Since 2012 Holy Trinity has received a straight 75% of the gross parking lot revenue collected by Impark. This rent structure has worked well for both Holy Trinity and Impark when the parking lot revenue was increasing annually. Recognizing that Impark has also realized a significant income reduction during the pandemic, Holy Trinity has allowed Impark to reduce their operating costs by allowing Impark to store snow on a portion of the parking lot after the lot is cleared.

The current lease with Impark for the operation of the parking lot went into effect on July 1, 2016. The lease remained in effect for a 60 month term which ended on June 30, 2021. Impark and Holy Trinity are currently operating the parking lot according to the terms of the now expired lease. Negotiations for a new lease are not expected to commence until the parking lot revenue returns to more normal pre-pandemic levels.

Until the COVID19 pandemic comes to an end and we return to normal activities on a day to day basis, the revenue received by Holy Trinity from the operation of the parking lot will continue to be considerably less than the income received in the years prior to the pandemic. It is not clear how long it will take after the pandemic ends for Holy Trinity to once again realize an annual income close to pre-pandemic levels from the operation of the parking lot.

Stratification of Identifiable Donors based on recurring offertory:

22, or 24%, gave from \$1.00 to \$250 yearly, or a weekly average of \$2.13.

33, or 35%, gave from \$250 to \$750 yearly, or a weekly average of \$8.82.

22, or 24%, gave from \$750 to \$1500 yearly, or a weekly average of \$20.98.

10, or 11, gave from \$1500 to \$3999 yearly, or a weekly average of \$43.07.

6, or 6%, gave over \$4000 yearly, or a weekly average of \$112.61.

Freewill donations are the life-blood of any charity. For this parish recurring offertory comprises 25% of our total revenues. Both 2021 and 2020 years were not normal due to the Covid pandemic. Nevertheless, it is pleasing to note that even though we were clobbered by the virus alerts, our prime source of revenue did not utterly collapse. Most of the congregation continued to support the parish even without a normal cycle of worship services. Such loyalty is a firm basis for optimism once things improve in the new year.

Other programs were also supported. In 2021 the congregation supported the new Lunchroom outreach program with \$8,910 om donations, compared to \$5,105 for the prior year.

Parishioners also supported the retirement of the debt incurred to finance the new boiler system. To that end \$7,427 was donated in 2021, compared to \$8,354 for the prior year. There are still too few people making a recurring commitment to retire this debt. Everyone must annually give or this debt will hamper our ability to move forward with new projects.

All things come from thee, O Lord, and of thine own we have given thee.

As always, the parish should be very grateful for the dedication of Thelma Forzley and John Fraser for their dedicated service in managing our receipt records.

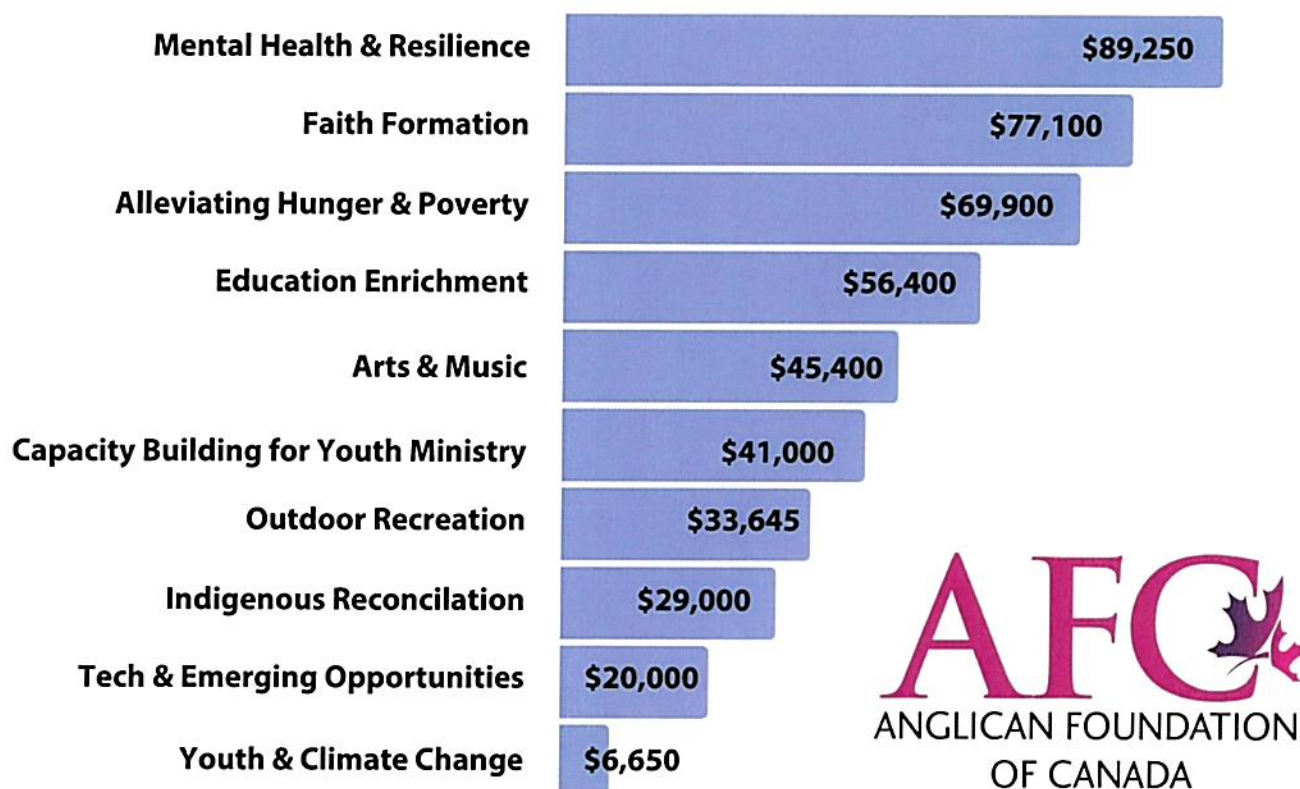
