

During a recent staff meeting at "Maggie House", one of our Arkansas Ministries children's facilities, our staff members were asked to share the reasons that motivate them to work with our young people. The answers were so powerful we want to share their thoughts for two reasons: So that you can see very clearly that for many of our staff, this is more than a job but a mission and ministry for them. Also, so you can see how God's love can take negative events in a person's life and make something positive:



- I lost my daughter, she was a teacher and I would like to be able to help teach the kids a better way of life.
- I have been in the system so I can relate to the kids and what they are going through.
- I was on my own at the age of 14 and had all of my kids before the age of 17. I didn't have the guidance
 that I needed and that has made me want to give the kids the support that they need.
- I feel I have a purpose here at Maggie House.
- I want to make a difference and let the kids know that there are people who really care.
- I didn't have anyone to teach me when I was growing up and want to be able to teach them.
- I want to let the kids know that I am here for them and won't leave them. I went through a lot growing up such as physical and verbal abuse.
- I was adopted when I was 2 due to the physical and sexual abuse from my parents but my brothers and
 sisters went into the system and I feel that I have a purpose to be here with them.
- I enjoy working with the kids.
