that love and peace and justice may give God's kingdom birth.

**Muriel Duckworth** – social gospeller, standing with the poor and powerless, a champion for peace.

**Viola Desmond** – an African Nova Scotian who broke down barriers by challenging segregation, helping to start the civil rights movement in Canada.

**Ret'd. Bishop Sue Moxley** – a tireless supporter of Indigenous rights, a giver of sanctuary to a woman facing deportation, and former Convenor of the *Anglican Peace and Justice Network (APJN)* for the Anglican Communion worldwide.

**Her Honour Mayann Francis** – Nova Scotia's first African descent Lt. Governor and a human rights champion. Her motto always is: "Go where God leads you".

## Women's Ministry Sunday

Here are some suggestions for readings and hymns that you may wish to include in your service if celebrating Women's Ministry Sunday on March 6, 2022

- Amos 5:4-15 More than the other prophets, Amos concentrates on injustice. The words of **Common**Praise (CP) #575 Let Streams of Living Justice speak to injustice.
- **Micah 6:1-8** Even though Micah lived in one of the darkest times in Israel's history, he could see God's light at the end of the dark tunnel. **Hymn CP #171** What Does the Lord Require? spells out the way back to God.
- **Is. 58:1, 6-14** Here again, Isaiah brings the word of the Lord to the people, showing how justice can be restored if people will only listen. **Hymns CP #171** and **#575**, already noted, suit this reading; as well, **CP #576** For the Healing of the Nations speaks of the common quest for justice.
- 1 John:7-21 John stresses that the Christians must love one another, because if they truly do this one thing, they will not fall back into hate, injustice and other sins. CP Hymn #573 O Day of Peace When people learn to love . . . all the world shall know the Lord.

## Let Us Be Women Who Love
