What is your vision for Grace community of faith going forward? Spirit on the move, dancing in, through, around and with us, we dare to catch the excitement and stay rooted in coming from a place of joy, living in gratitude and thanksgiving.

I am so grateful for opportunities I have been a part of in my year with you at Grace United. My special thanks to the Transition Team for their faith in recommending me and all the work undertaken, to the Board of Management, staff, worship team and to all of the congregation. The pandemic was difficult to be sure, but what wondrous opportunities we had in creative connecting.

- The minister's weekly newsletter along with the office sending out worship reminders, song and hymn lyrics kept us faith-focused.
- The daily "A Little Spiritual Care" offered a brief reflection, Bible verse, prayer, a photo and video.
- Zoom groups for fellowship, a few virtual supper opportunities, weekly craft and chat, lunch bunch, Bible Study, Spiritual Practices and Book Study name a few virtual outreaches we undertook to stay creatively connected.
- Card making and prayer shawl ministry brought new outreaches including our every household Easter and Canada day deliveries.
- The pastoral care phone team was birthed by a team of wonderful people sharing connections by phone.

- A summer fun outreach delivering pizza takeout boxes filled with activities for families to enrich their spiritual connections and have some summer fun.
- The arrival of our Youth, Young Families, & Community Outreach Minister for a two-year SME began July 1, welcoming Kevin Fitzpatrick for fourteen hours/week. Kevin's energy and enthusiasm brought a monthly newsletter to young families, outreach activities and service and volunteer experiences.
- One Roof Community Centre received donations throughout each month supporting diverse needs, with Grace members generously providing additional monthly gifts.
- A sandwich ministry, making sandwiches every second Monday began in November, with eight loaves of sandwiches going to One Roof.
- The Sleeping Cabin committee was created to support the build of one cabin, as part of the Peterborough Tiny Homes (PATH) project which included a walkathon
- Susan and Jane brought the Halloween ministry COVID style with special thanks to the youth helping to prepare the treat bags.
- The Board of Trustees were activated.
- The Board of Management worked tirelessly.
- Several governance documents were put in place and the M and P were kept very busy with many staff needs this year.
- We are so grateful for the extraordinary efforts of people to keep things going even when we had no congregation present and pandemic restrictions limited us to ten people in the building.
- The tech team was amazing figuring out livestreaming, on-line, and incredible at adapting as each week brought new experiences and ever-present efforts to try to offer worship on-line and since August 29 when we began to gather in-person, hybrid worship, with service in the sanctuary and livestreamed.
- The blessings of our two worship services and the incredible music has been so wonderful.
- A discipleship team was formed in the fall and the worship team implemented a "discipleship moment" each week to share about our many ministries.
- GPIF continued to support Honduras, even though the Missions trip in November had to be cancelled again due to COVID. Fundraising efforts were so appreciated.
- Kevin and youth and young families made a Grace tree collecting items for One Roof and YES.
- Project H.O.P.E. (Help Other People Everyday) was birthed, in a new iteration of the previous Ministry of Compassion, with many outreaches taking place from school support to blessing bags. Grace blessed others.

Thanks to all the staff and volunteers for their tireless efforts and all the care and support I received while serving as your interim intentional minister.

May hope rise in each of us to engage fully in the dance God calls each of us to be whole-heartedly part of. Faith, love, hope, compassion and positivity compel us forward in the awesome wonder of God's mystery and unending love.

EAST CENTRAL ONTARIO REGIONAL COUNCIL

Report submitted Paul and Joanne Gray Lay Representatives on Regional Council

In 2021, the Regional Council held two general meetings, one in the spring and one in the fall. Unlike previous years, where they met in person for 1 ½ days each time, these meetings were by Zoom which increased the number of people participating while reducing the cost of holding the meetings. In addition to the semi-annual meetings, in the few months prior to each of the meetings, a series of three meetings were held, via Zoom, with each one focused on a specific topic that was to arise at the following semi-annual meeting. Participants enjoyed the opportunity for more in-depth discussion of a topic while reducing the need to spend large amounts of time on this topic at the semi-annual meeting.

The Regional Council picks about four priorities for staff and member teams to concentrate on each year and these groups provide research, background materials, training and advocacy materials on these topics. In addition to the annual priorities, the Regional Council is responsible for Ministerial oversight and placement and the creation of new or disbanding of existing churches. The later has taken up quite a bit of the Regional Council capacity. To address the problem of a growing number of churches that do not have a permanent Minister, the Regional Council voted to allow Ministerial candidates who have completed their course work and at least 6 months of congregational internship, to perform the sacraments of baptism and communion provided that they have done this at least once supervised by an ordained Minister. Sharon and Kevin arranged to do supervised sacraments shortly before Sharon left so now Kevin can officiate at the sacraments for Grace.

Also, Joanne Gray attended several meetings of the Extension Council. This council managed funds that were lent out to churches for capital projects at zero interest. It was decided that we would close our account and transfer the funds to Toronto. They will manage our funds under the rules we provided to them. Larry Breakenridge has agreed to be the treasurer during the wind down and final transfer.

TRANSITION TEAM REPORT 2021

The past year has been challenging for us all. Not only have we been dealing with the far-reaching impact of the on-going pandemic: we are also continuing to work our way through the major transition in the life of our congregation, following the retirement of our long-term minister in 2020 during a pandemic.

In 2021, under the guidance of Reverend Dr. Sharon Ballantyne as our Intentional Interim Minister, Grace made significant progress on the transitional goals we set out for ourselves. With Reverend Dr. Sharon Ballantyne's resignation in 2021, it was determined that significant progress had been made on the transition goals, as reported in the Transition Team's communication in December, such that Grace could now start to search for a permanent call while we continue to work to progress our transition goals. This search process has been started by the Search Team.

While Grace seeks a permanent call the Transition Team will continue to:

- Maintain the overall focus and vision of the congregation during the transition period.
- Oversee and guide the day-to-day decisions of the ministry of Christ at Grace.
- Support, encourage, and work alongside incoming personnel during the transition period.
- Support and encourage the new clergy as they establish themselves successfully in the ministry of Christ at Grace.

The Transition Team would like to thank all the people of Grace who have worked very hard to help the congregation walk this path of transition.


2021 EXPENSE SUMMARY

Vision - As a Community of Faith, Grace United answers God's call to help others. Through our continued outreach programs, we are making a difference and impacting the lives of many. We do so both near and far, and in 2021 nothing stopped us from still reaching out and 'Engaging our Community'. Locally, we have provided outreach through Project H.O.P.E. (Peterborough schools and shelters), Peterborough Public Nourishment Programs, the One Roof Community Centre and other Local Initiatives (Halloween ministry and Congregational outreaches). Through Mission & Service, we "help transform and save lives" both domestically and globally through the amazing work done through the United Church of Canada. Globally, Grace does wonderful work through Grace Partnership in Faith and we extend God's love and compassion to the people in the Nuevo Children's Village.

Worship & Ministry - Here at Grace, we have been blessed to be able to continue offering two worship services each Sunday. In 2021, we strengthened our online presence and our livestream offering has been embraced by those who are unable to join us for in-person worship. Our ministry personnel, Worship Team and lay leadership continue to be energized by The Spirit in responding to God's call in our Community of Faith. We support ongoing learning to help each of us (child, youth and adult) grow in our knowledge of what it means to be the people of God in our world.



Administrative - This section of our budget covers Office & Administration,
Communications, Advertising and Banking
Fees. These are necessary expenses in keeping
Grace an active and vital part of our
community. We have worked hard over the
last year to cut administrative costs and have
been successful in drastically reducing our
communication costs (phone, internet and
website) and Banking Costs (service fees,
interest, interac machine). We continue to
work toward ways to further reduce these
expenses while remaining effective in this
area.



Operational - Our operational budget is vital in keeping Grace alive and able to be the hands and feet of Christ in our world. The operational costs include Salaries & Benefits, insurance, Property costs, Utilities and our United Church of Canada National Assessment. The building remains in good condition and our preventative maintenance agreements continue to save us money. The United Church of Canada's National Assessment helps the costs of the broader church. People around the globe have been challenged over the past two years by the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, yet through this time, Grace United has been able to keep all of our staff employed. Grace benefits in many ways through the continued employment of our dedicated staff and we are thankful for the aid provided through the Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy, which ended in 2021.



I found through phone conversations that the young families of Grace were hesitant to being involved because of COVID concerns, and we have had to look at some new ways at reaching out and engaging those families. I do this with the help of volunteers from the Grace community to make this a local offering that will be a temporary measure until such a time as children and parents will join the congregation again as risks lower as COVID subsides.

Discipleship Team



One Roof Community Centre

It was a challenging year for the staff and clients of One Roof Community Centre. On any given day, OR provides assistance to 100-200 people, and support from the people of Grace did so much to help.

I often ask the OR staff what they need, and the most requested items are water and socks. Because there are simply no water fountains in the city any more, bottled water is essential every day, and especially during the heat of the summer. (Due to COVID restrictions, it is only recently that OR was permitted to allow refillable bottles.) Re: socks: homeless people don't always have a place to wash and dry their clothes, so when their socks get wet – which happens frequently when living rough - they simply have nowhere to dry them. Inevitably the socks get lost or left behind.

Over the past year Grace has provided thousands of bottles of water, and at least a thousand pairs of socks. That has been a game-changer for some of the OR clients. This may seem like a huge expense, but to give it a monetary perspective, the socks cost less than \$1.40 per day. The water cost 8-12¢ (yes: cents!) per bottle, depending on where I could get it.

Additionally, and as funds allowed, we have provided many pairs of gloves/mitts, hats, personal hygiene products (shampoo, deodorant, toothbrushes, etc.), and many other essential items. Plus, every two weeks, I deliver about 8 dozen home-made cookies (always a big hit!) made by one of our regular contributors. In the winter I also purchase as many hand/foot-warmers as I can find.

The people of Grace are so wonderfully generous, and the staff at OR are very grateful for our support. At every visit I tell them the same thing: "This is from the people of Grace." They always send their thanks, as do many of the clients. In fact, I have rarely left OR without at least one or two clients calling out a "Thank you!".

I would also like to give a shout-out to the owner of the No Frills store on George Street and the owner of the Giant Tiger store in the west end. Both of these men - without a moment's hesitation - agreed to give me a special discount for the OR items I buy in their stores. I have learned from other sources that they are not making any profit on some of the items I purchase. That speaks volumes about their care and concern for people in this city. St. Matthew 25:35 comes to mind.

If anyone has questions or concerns regarding this project, please contact me. I am more than happy to provide any information that I can. Donations of money or goods are always welcome. If you would like to offer goods, I can provide suggestions. I will also deliver any usable items that are donated.

Following nearly one and half years of the Global Covid-19 Pandemic, a small group of Grace United Church members gathered together online in June 2021 to discuss ministry opportunities in our Community of Faith. We all believed that, not only after the pandemic but also during it, the call of the church and the needs of the community would be different from a time prior to March 2020. Much had already changed in everyone's lives, and our community inside and

beyond the walls of Grace would continue to adjust to changing times, so we gathered to reenvision some ministry opportunities. The question of the evening was: How can Grace United Church move forward in "Engaging the Community" through these new times?

Project H.O.P.E was born out of the desire to be the hands and feet of Jesus in our community and was built upon the foundation laid by the Ministry of Compassion. This ministry has been and will continue to be one that is constantly growing, changing and evolving to include programs that will offer HOPE to our community.

Our Project H.O.P.E. team has been overwhelmed by the tremendous support received for this

new ministry. You have once again shown what can be achieved when a caring and compassionate community comes together to *Share Christ so all will know... ...the forgiveness, love and grace of God!* When we asked for help with items needed in our community - you gave. When we needed volunteers to fill bags, boxes and packs - you came.



In the first six months of Project H.O.P.E., we have supported Roger Neilson Public School with 30 backpacks filled with much-needed school supplies; Kenner Collegiate with two boxes of personal items and school supplies to aid in student support; 30 well-stocked blessings bags to YES (Youth Emergency Shelter) of items they desired; and with the added blessing of The Grace Tree collecting warm items (gloves, scarves, socks etc) during Advent, we delivered 30 Christmas Blessings Bags to the One Roof Community Center along with extra items for their give-out cupboard; and from The Grace Tree we also gave two bags of youth items to YES to help keep them warm during the winter season.

We are looking forward to a time when we will have the opportunity to be able to gather once again to make Grace United Church a Community Hub where all people will be welcomed and we will truly "Engage our Community".

As we move into 2022, we pray that we all continue to refract the light of Christ with each colour from the prism of Project H.O.P.E. reaching more of our community. In order to better share our resources, Project H.O.P.E. has evolved to include our local outreach ministries including but not limited to the One Roof Community Center and Public Nourishment Programs. With your continued giving of time and resources (collected items and financial), HOPE will grow before our eyes.

Public Nourishment Programs

Well, I begin another year gazing wistfully at my bins of 'portable' kitchen equipment. Unfortunately, I didn't make it downstairs into your Grace United Kitchen for 2021.

That is not to say that we didn't do any cooking though this past year! Myself and two other community workers have been busy cooking for many different programs this past year. It has involved baking for the school breakfast programs, since volunteers couldn't go into schools, and supplying snacks and soup lunches for vaccine clinics all over town. We have started to use some of the cooking videos in Myrtle's kitchen (from December of 2020) that we did in the Health Unit kitchen, in our on-line cooking classes this year and available on our website for viewing anytime.

The Crock-pot classes have been well received and many people have received crock pots from us along with recipes and gift cards to buy ingredients so they had them 'on hand' to cook along with our community workers on-line. Many have 'graduated' to other classes, using the videos mentioned earlier and we have had Dietitians joining us to answer any dietary questions participants have had.

We have continued to help support the YWCA Nourish Food Boxes, (all through 2020 and 2021), with ordering food, submitting recipes for their newsletter, packing the boxes and then delivering them right to people's doorsteps. There was a total of 6,181 YWCA Nourish Emergency food boxes delivered in 2021. Many have been able to pay a subsidy price for the boxes which helps to extend the programs reach. Funding we had access to helped the health unit to pay for some of these boxes when a family's funds just couldn't stretch any further.

We also, have learned to stretch our ideas on how to reach people without the technology to 'see' a class, through group phone, 'kitchen table talks', discussing food and nutrition topics suggested by the participants.

With all the different formats of these classes many have connected with others to share their experiences and ideas on how they have coped with the last two years. There is a lot of chatting and words of comfort exchanged among them.

Kitchen tables will always provide a great base to build connections on and soon we will be sitting around them again, 'breaking bread' and sharing stories!

Thank you for your support to the food programs in Peterborough these past two years.

Sandwich Ministry




