PRAYgrounds

You may have heard we are getting a Prayground at Mt Zion. A prayground is a space for children to play in the sanctuary so that they can stay in worship throughout the service and participate at their level.



Where will this Prayground go?

It is going to be on the south side of the sanctuary right up front by the altar and pulpit. We'll be removing 3 pews to make room for this space. Why the south side? So that it's accessible for people at both services, since the 2nd service people only sit on the south side. Why up front? Well, let's be honest: kids are short. If they are going to be able to see everything going on, they need to be up close to the action. You'd be amazed the things kids absorb just by being able to see what's happening!



Won't this encourage noise?

No more noise than the kids already make in the pews. We are working right now on finding the right toys for this space, but they are all going to be plush or foam so there's no chance kids can bang things together.



I'm a parent; my kid likes to run if I don't hold onto them. Will this space work for my child?

The front divider rail will remain when we install the prayground (we do plan to find someone to cut a foot off it so that the kids can see more easily). And we plan to find a carpenter to help us create a half pew to put sideways along the outside aisle. This will block in 3 sides of the prayground, hopefully minimizing stray children. But if they do get away, well, there's grace for that.





Mission of the Month

MICAH – Mission of the Month – Feb 20, 2022

We Rise to Speak the Truth

The Feb 6th the Grace Notes mentioned some of the injustices that MI-CAH (Milwaukee Inner City Congregations Allied for Hope) Task Force for Education is tackling. The Feb 13th subject was MICAH's Task Force on Health and especially their COLE (Coalition on Lead Emergency) working for justice. If you were unable to read either of those two notes and/or neither Education nor Health are of interest to you in a justice framework, pick up a MICAH booklet at the front entry desk or one of the coffee tables in the Gathering Space for more information.

This week, the MICAH restorative justice subject is covered by the MICAH Criminal Justice Reform Task Force. This task force investigates changes that need to be made. Would this be the justice model which piques your interest and the subject for which God wants you to use your gifts? In our Baptism covenant, we are instructed among other things to lead a Godly life. Micah, the Old Testament prophet in Chapter 6 Verse 8 states: "He has told you, O man, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you, but to do justice and love kindness and walk humbly with your God." In that vein, the motto of MICAH is: **Do What is Just.**

Criminal justice reform has many aspects. As first responders, police have a tremendous task. They need more options. They need to be trained to know who to contact to de-escalate a situation. They should be immediately backed up by mental health experts and sociologists who can determine PTSD or mental illness or addiction and police need help from health experts to know the differing actions to be taken for each.

Criminal justice reform addresses the need for restorative justice. Restorative Justice means to change the individual to wholeness. Incarceration without that transformation is useless. We must take action to transform the legal system. Solitary confinement is used extensively in Wisconsin as a punishment for even extremely minor offenses. Currently, there are 743 people in Wisconsin's solitary confinement. Solitary confinement exceeding 15 days has been determined to be torture since people are social creatures. The average stay in solitary confinement in Wisconsin is 1-3 months without interacting with another human being. This produces the same effect as PTSD. If the incarcerated person was a veteran, there is a good chance that this adds to the severity of the PTSD that the person already has endured. Solitary confinement must end if we are to do God's work.

Mission of the Month

In 1853, Wisconsin abolished the death penalty, but with Covid, there has been no proper care of imprisoned people. Medications are not given in a timely manner. Social distancing is impossible. If people get sick, they are put into the infirmary with non-quarantined Covid victims. This adds up to a possible death sentence not legally imposed by any court system.



MICAH is committed to reinvestment of our tax dollars. At the inadequate Waupun and Green Bay facilities, both over 100 years old, we spend \$94M per year. If we would use TAD (Treatment Alternatives and Diversions), those facilities could be closed and our taxes could be used in many cases for treatment instead of incarceration and those saved tax dollars could be more effectively used while also bringing useful citizens back to their families and to their community which would stabilize neighborhoods. TAD saves \$2 for every \$1 spent and those persons working under TAD treatment are nine times less likely to return to prison. If drug and alcohol treatment courts were expanded, the facilities would also have fewer imprisoned persons which would also lessen required tax dollars.

Crimeless revocations waste tax dollars. It is estimated that right now, Wisconsin has over 4500 persons in prison for crimeless revocations such as missing a bus and being late to meet with a parole officer or buying a cell phone or getting a job without the ok of the parole officer. Doing these crimeless "offenses", none of which have anything to do with the original crime, causes people to be automatically sent back behind bars for a lengthened sentence without any trial. This does not make our streets safer.

There are many ways in which justice could be attained with fewer tax dollars. MICAH wants to let our tax money to be used more effectively for justice, while also having a safer community. I don't think anyone likes to pay taxes, but when tax money could be spent more wisely and justice done as well, it just makes sense. If some Southern states are using these procedures, not for justice, but just to save money, why don't we?
