Christi Belcourt (b. 1966) is a Métis artist belonging to the community of Manitou Sakhigan (Lac Ste. Anne) in Alberta. The McMichael Gallery in Ottawa is currently hosting the first retrospective of her work: Uprising: The Poswer of Mother Earth runs through Easter.

According to the McMaster: Belcourt's work draws heavily on the Métis tradition of floral beadwork, using subjects found in nature as metaphors for the human experience. The artist's work reflects her passionate views on biodiversity, spirituality, the environment and the rights of Indigenous people. In 2008, the Government of Canada commissioned Belcourt to create a mural that recognized the historic significance of Prime Minister Stephen Harper's June 11, 2008 apology to the former students and survivors of the Indian Residential Schools. The resulting stained-glass piece, titled Giniigaaniimenaaning (2012), is installed in the Centre Block of Parliament.

Here are Christi's own words about the painting above: In Ontario, over 200 species of plants and animals are listed as threatened, endangered or extinct. Of those, included in this painting are the Dwarf Lake Iris, the Eastern Prairie Fringed Orchid, the Karner Blue butterfly, the West Virginia White butterfly, the Spring Blue-eyed Mary, the Cerulean Warbler and Acadian Flycatcher. Globally, we live in a time of great upheaval. The state of the world is in crisis. We are witness to the unbearable suffering of species, including humans. Much of this we do to ourselves. It is possible for the planet to return to a state of well-being, but it requires a radical change in our thinking. It requires a willingness to be open to the idea that perhaps human beings have got it all wrong. All species, the lands, the waters are one beating organism that pulses like a heart. We are all a part of a whole. The animals and plants, lands and waters, are our relatives each with as much right to exist as we have. When we see ourselves as separate from each other and think of other species, the waters and the planet itself as objects that can be owned, dominated or subjugated, we lose connection with our humanity and we create imbalance on the earth. This is what we are witnessing around us. The planet already contains all the wisdom of the universe, as do you and I. It has the ability to recover built into its DNA and we have the ability to change what we are doing so this can happen.

Perhaps it's time to place the rights of Mother Earth ahead of the rights to Mother Earth.

Reflection One:

Rev. John Snow, Jr.

A Reading from Paul's letter to the Romans (11:13-24)

First Nations Version: An Indigenous Translation of the New Testament I am now speaking to you who are the people from the Outside Nations. I consider it an honour that I have been sent to you as a message bear. I make sure that my flesh and blood Tribal Members know how much I honour you, in the hope that it will make some of them jealous, so that they can also trust in Creator Sets Free (Jesus) to be set free and made whole. So think about it this way. If the turning away of our Tribal Members from the Great Spirit means that he then turned toward the rest of the world, to bring them back to himself, then what will it mean when our Tribal Members turn back to welcome him? It can only mean that they have come back to life from the dead! If the piece of ceremonial bread that is offered first to the Great Spirit is sacred, then the whole loaf is also sacred. If the root of the tree is holy, then its branches are also holy. Some of the branches of this olive tree were broken off, and you Outside Nations have been grafted in from a wild olive tree. This means you now share in the health-giving sap that comes from the roots. So do not think that you are better than those broken up branches. For you are also a branch supported by what the root supplies. But someone might say, "those branches were broken up so I

could be grafted in". What you say is true. But they were broken off because they did not believe, and you stand only by your faith. So do not get big headed, but show deep respect, for if Creator did not have pity on the original branches, why should he have pity on you? So you can see how kind and how strict the Great Spirit can be. He was strict toward the ones who walked away but is kind toward you, as long as you keep walking in his kindness. If not you also will be cut off. And if the ones who walked away turn around and begin trusting again, then Creator has the power to graft them back in because of his great kindness. It is not a natural thing for wild branches to be grafted into an olive tree that is growing in a garden. It is much easier for the natural branches to be grafted back into the same olive tree they were cut from.



Women's Lectionary

As a liturgical church, we join the wider church in a common set of readings each week in worship, called a *Lectionary*.

However, the 3-year Revised Common Lectionary (RCL) has many limitations in terms of what stories are centered and told - and more importantly, those that are not.

Since last Advent, we at AbbeyChurch have taken our weekly readings from the Women's Lectionary for the Whole Church

Year (Year W) - and we'll continue to do so for the rest of this liturgical year (at least).

The Rev. Wilda Gafney (ordained in the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church and The Episcopal Church USA - part of the Anglican Communion) has put together this alternate set of readings which includes a new Womanist translation of the Biblical texts. Her translations contrast our traditional readings in important ways – such as rendering the personal pronouns and titles for God in the feminine (which you will find weekly as we say/sing her Psalm translations) and centering the unnamed women in the genealogies and accounts of historic figures in the Hebrew Bible. This centers the long overlooked or neglected figures in our Bible reading.

Our aim in adopting this lectionary is to recover a deeper and more liberating reading of the Biblical text, even as we confess and confront the ways our reading of these stories has done much historic violence and harm to so many.
