Craft: Shamrock Sun Catcher

- 1. Use this template or your own design to sketch a shamrock on a sheet of black cardstock and cut it out: https://threelittleferns.com/wp-content/uploads/2016/03/clover.png
- 2. Cut out the interior of the shamrock, leaving a border around the edges.
- 3. Roll out a piece of contact paper large enough to cover a complete side of your shamrock.
- 4. Place the shamrock on the adhesive side of the contact paper.
- 5. Cut small squares or shapes of various St. Patrick's Day colored tissue paper (i.e., greens, gold, yellow, orange), and place them generously throughout the cutout.
- 6. Place a second layer of contact paper (sticky side down) over the shamrock and smooth it in place.
- 7. Cut away excess contact paper around the shamrock.

- Sheet of Black Cardstock
- Tissue Paper (greens, gold, yellow, etc.)
- Contact Paper
- Scissors

Foods to Prepare

According to The Food Network, these are five obligatory Irish foods you should eat in celebration of St. Patrick's Day:

- 1. Corned Beef: Corned beef is a meat that has been cured in a salt solution or brine. In the US, it is common to use brisket.
- 2. Shepherd's Pie: Shepherd's Pie is a casserole from Britain and Ireland done in an American style that consists of ground beef or lamb, vegetables, and topped with mashed potatoes.
- 3. Irish Soda Bread: Irish Soda Bread is a simple bread that is typically made from flour, salt, baking soda, and buttermilk but without yeast. It resembles more of a scone-like bake.
- 4. Colcannon: Colcannon is a Irish mashed potato recipe with mixed greens, scallions, and a lot of butter and cream.
- 5. Cabbage: Cabbage cooked Irish style is typically shredded boiled and served as a side dish with melted butter.

Activity: Wear Green

Do you know why people wear green on St. Patrick's Day? Perhaps as a kid, you were told that if you didn't have green on, people would pinch you, so you clothed in at least one thread of green; but, there is more to this story.

As far back as the 17th century, people started wearing green ribbons or shamrocks to honor St. Patrick and the country of Ireland, known as the Emerald Isle. Irish immigrants to the United States believed that wearing green made them invisible to leprechauns. Leprechauns are fictional fairy creatures that are typically depicted as long bearded men, wearing a coat and a hat. They were always up to mischief, pranking people, and hiding their gold at the end of a rainbow.

According to tradition, pinching someone is not for punishment because they don't have green on. Rather, it is a subtle way to remind someone that they are visible and susceptible to the mischief of a leprechaun.

So, pull our some green and suit of for the day!

Bible Study

"May the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all" (2 Cor. 13:14).

The concept of the Trinity is one of the most challenging for us to grasp as human beings because in our finite bodies, we have never experienced anything like three persons in one. St. Patrick used a three-leaf clover to try to help others understand the Trinity. While this concept remains unknown to our experience and is actually never shared explicitly in the Bible, it has been an orthodox view of the Church since the Council of Nicaea in A.D. 325.

In the above verse, we read references to "the Lord Jesus Christ," "God," and "the Holy Spirit" in Paul's salutation at the end of this letter. Thus, all three persons of the Trinity are mentioned together. Notice what is attributed to their presence with us "all:" grace, love, and fellowship. Grace is being treated with favor that is not deserved. Love is being treated with sacrificial kindness that is not merited. Fellowship is being treated with inclusive acceptance that is not earned. Paul's prayer is that the believers would experience such grace, love, and fellowship. Consider these blessings in your life. While we may not fully grasp the Trinity, we remain thankful for the blessings of God's presence in our lives each day.

Prayer Time

This prayer of St. Patrick is so powerful. Be reflective and pray it throughout the week.

"May the Strength of God pilot us. May the Power of God preserve us.

May the Wisdom of God instruct us. May the Hand of God protect us.

May the Way of God direct us.

May the Shield of God defend us. May the Host of God guard us;

Against the snares of the evil ones, Against temptations of the world.

May Christ be with us! May Christ be before us!

May Christ be in us, Christ be over all!

May Thy Salvation, Lord; Always be ours,

This day, O Lord, and evermore. Amen."
