




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DESCRIPTION OF STREET

MINISTER'S MESSAGE

We are blessed with a very special faith community here at Squamish United Church. There is a reality of caring for each other, and a love that knits us together which is warm and supporting and much in evidence in our life together. As we worship and serve and work at being faithful together, we are a people with a great diversity of ages and gifts and opinions, but we <u>feel</u> like family and we act like family because we care like family. That's special. It's a spiritual treasure. I cherish it, as I'm sure you do, too.

"Yet we who have this spiritual treasure are like common clay pots, in order to show that the supreme power belongs to God, not to us." (Paul in 2 Cor.4)

What a wonderful way Paul has of imaging spiritual realities! We are earthen vessels, clay pots, but we carry God's treasures inside. That treasure is God's power at work not ours. That's the gift we celebrate the news of hope and love we share. Because of God's power in our clay pots -

"We are often troubled, but not crushed; Sometimes in doubt, but never in despair; There are many enemies, but we are never without a friend, Tho' badly hurt at times, we are not destroyed."

But clay pots are meant not only to hold the contents that fill them up their treasures are for the feeding of Jesus' sheep. Much as we celebrate the
love and caring that binds us as the church in this place, we are very aware of
Christ's call to outreach work. The ablility to be a "giving" church in terms
of time, talent, money and service is also a spiritual treasure. Paul says of
the clay pots: "We carry in our mortal bodies the death of Jesus so that his
life also may be seen in our bodies". In other words, to carry the death of
Jesus in our clay pots is to carry His cross and it's suffering, and we do that
by seeing Christ's cross and suffering in other people's troubles, and helping
to carry the burdens and to make the changes that would bring resurrection life
to their experience.

I celebrate the many ways this faith community acts out it's ministries - from Alf Sherriff providing money and materials so that those pews which had no cushions got them this year, to the benevolent money that so often lights up a flicker of hope in the eyes of someone not daring to hope; from the marvellous new instrument donated anonymously for our 25th anniversary to the World Hunger coin folders so generously filled for M & S. Both in the church and reaching out from it, all you clay pots out there are doing a wonderful jo, and I'm grateful to you all.

God bless you and yours as together we journey into 1989.

SESSION REPORT 1988 (March to December)

Session in 1988 consisted of Grace Halvorson, Ferm Green, Kathy Davis, Elizabeth Glover, Bert Ionson, Louise Martin, Patsy Riecker, Maureen Gilmour, Trevor Harris, Retta Behrmer, Stein Hoff, Betty Clay, and Rev. Chris Burnett. Meetings were monthly (excepting July and August) in the church kitchen.

There were two "biggest" events involving Session this calendar year:

1) Acquisition, in the fall, of a complete new sound system and electronic keyboard. The variety, complexity and excitement of music played since has been very stimulating. Decisions still will need to be made regarding the old organ, and the Britannia organ being stored in our church.

2) Coming up for thoughtful discussion many times during the year was the United Church's Human Sexuality Report, and following the General Council August meeting, the 32nd General Council's new statement of the United Church of Canada

entitled "Membership, Ministry and Human Sexuality".

Brief Review of the year:

MARCH - Maureen Gilmour retired, and Louise Martin elected, as clerk of session. Bert Ionson appointed as liason to 1st Squamish Boy Scout Group. Debra West will serve as Youth Group Leader. Freda Hoff heads up the Sunday School. Organist roster involved mainly Joanna Schwarz, Ann Kristianson, and Carol Finnie.

APRIL - Squamish United assisted with the Senior Youth Retreat of Vancouver

South - Burrard Presbytery.

MAY - Grad Rible tradition was continued.

JUNE - Ileana Rudy retired as church accountant. A new photocopier for the church was aquired through the fund raising efforts by our U.C.W. A very successful congregational picnic was held at Porteau Cove.

SEPTEMBER - New statement of the United Church of Canada by the 32nd General Council on Membership, Ministry and Human Sexuality was received and discussed.

OCTOBER - New keyboard and sound system arrived. Mission study on South Africa (Special Mandate Edition) organization commenced, for study early in 1989. Communion with children participating was tried for the first time in this congregation, to mixed reviews.

NOVEMBER - Concerned group within our congregation dissenting with the decision of the 32nd General Council's new statement of the United Church of Canada on Membership, Ministry and Human Sexuality requested and received permission from Session to circulate to the congregation a petition expressing their view, for forwarding to the General Council Executive and to the Community of Concern. The process of this was / is supported, although the the wide spectrum of views within this congregation was recognized. Further feedback and correspondence on this issue from B.C. Conference was received and discussed at length.

DECEMBER - Debra West and Freda Hoff completed their terms in their leader-

ship positions. Christmas pageant put on by the Sunday School.

BOARD OF STEWARDS, 1988

The Stewards committee continued to look after the church properties in a timely and efficient manner. Aside from the numerous small maintenance items that demand constant attention, the stewards also tackled some major, long outstanding, repair jobs.

A new storage cupboard was installed in the church foyer. A photo sensitive yard light was attached to the church entrance to keep this area lit during darkness. The south wall of the Church building received a fresh coat of stain.

A week-end work bee saw the Stewards strip the old carpeting from the Annex building and sand down the floor. New carpeting was subsequently installed in the two main sections of the Church Annex. The ceiling and west entrance foyer were given a fresh coat of paint.

The manse shake roof, over 25 years old and covered with moss, was finally replaced. New strapping and 2 inch styrofoam insulation was put on the roof joists before installing the new metal roof. The old wooden eaves troughs were later also replaced with new metal troughs and downcomers.

A telephone answering machine with remote access capabilities was installed in the Pastors office. A duplicating machine, funded by a U.C.W. grant, was obtained on a lease to purchase arrangement.

The Stewards again hosted a very successful Fall congregational dinner on October 30/88. Approximately 100 persons attended the roast beef dinner, complete with the traditional turnips.

Mid 1988 marked the end of an era in our church treasurer's role. Mrs. Ilaena Rudy and her late husband Doug looked after the Squamish United Church financial books for over 30 years. The Stewards wish to express their deepest appreciation to Mrs. Rudy and wish her well in her new home on Vancouver Island.

Financially our church appeared to do quite well this year. Mission and Service donations were 97% of target. Total receipts were above budget, however, this was only due to large donations designated for specific projects such as the Manse roof replacement and the new church organ. Regular Sunday morning donations were actually lower than in the previous year and accounted for little more than half of the general fund. Honourariums, U.C.W. and other outside donations played a major role in allowing us to finish the year with a positive balance

ADULT BIBLE STUDY 1988

Winter and Spring of 1988 - A lively group of men and women met in the church kitchen to participate in the V.S.T. course "The Prophets Speak". Each week we met a real live prophet - Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekial and others. Hosea, we met in a unique way. He was portrayed through the story of his wife, Gomer, fascinatingly portrayed by Old Testament scholar, Helen Hobbs. After each dramatized portion in which the prophet's time and place in history and their message was elicited by an interviewer, a V.S.T. professor engaged the "prophet" as "modern scholar" for contemporary insights. Indeed, the contemporary scene was amazingly relevant to the prophets' concerns, and ensuing discussions were wide-ranged and exciting.

So keen was this group at the end of the course, it decided not to disband at Easter, but to organize and offer to the congregation opportunities to gather round the kitchen table to discuss a variety of issues then currently being dealt with in the church: Native Land Claims, Free Trade and the Sexuality Report among them. Our thanks to Alex Bell, in particular, for finding resource people and organizing or giving leadership for these fruitful Wednesday evenings,

Easter to May, and to the committee, Elizabeth Hansen and Kay Lynch.

During Lent, the Morning Bible Study Group tackled "No Small Legacy", the

faith story of Methodist pioneer of Women's Rights in Canada.

In the fall, September and October flew by busyily with 25th anniversary, rummage sale, several weddings and funerals, a Caring Ministry workshop and Chris' two weeks in Hawaii, so it was November when we got started on "Kerygma". The three introductory sessions proved new and interesting to the small group who began the course, then we decided to stop for December and resume at "Part 1: God is a Saving God" in January. Seven of us are finding the "in depth" scripture study and theme approach an excellent course, and heartily recommend Kerygma Part 2 to others when it comes up in the Spring.


Fellowship:

At each Unit meeting, a devotional period is observed as well as a mission study or discussion on topical subjects within our National church.




