

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Minister's Message

To all of you in the household of faith at Squamish United Church, greetings! Your name may not appear in the pages of the reports that follow, but be assured, each and every one of you, from the tiniest babe to the most elderly person among us, has been an essentially important part of our life and work together in 1986.

From earliest Biblical times, the gathered people of God have known themselves to be beth'el - house of God - joined in covenant relationship to God and to each other, for better and for worse, through all time. Even so, we are part of each others lives, and bound together also by Jesus' commandments: "Love one another as I have loved you." That's why each one of us is so important in the family of faith. We are loved by God-in-Christ. We matter to Him! He calls us to be His church! So each year of our church life is a year of celebrating that fact - in our worship and in our work of caring for each other and for others. It is your personal presence in this family of faith that really matters, whether you are in the annual report or not. We have been God's family together in this place in 1986. Nothing could be more worth "writing home about".

Yet - we must write (and read) our annual reports. To do so calls us to account for our stewardship of the gifts God gives to us. It helps us articulate what our faith has called us to do and to be in the past year, and to relect on that. Where, in the reports do you hear needs and concerns that are not being met? Can you, as a member of the family, take some responsibility to help meet the need or address the concern? Are there things you strongly feel our church should be doing in our congregation or community that are not happening at present? How might we go about new ministries, and with your help?

Martin Luther King has been quoted as saying: "The church should never be a caboose. The church should always be one of the driving engines at the head of the train." Is Squamish United Church a caboose or a driving engine in the life of this community? In the work of the wider church? Is the ministry of worship and service to others in our church a caboose or a driving engine in your personal life? If it's a driving engine, where is it bound? If it's a caboose, are you satisfied with that and if not, what will you do about it and how can we as a church help?

In his new book "Steps in a Journey", Ralph Milton quotes: "None of us is as smart as all of us." It takes all of us together to faithfully discern, proclaim and do the ministry God calls us to do. It takes all of us together to be the family of God, in the ministry for God's family everywhere. I do thank you for enabling me, by your honesty, prayers and support, to minister among you and with you.

What does the Session do? The United Church Manual assigns Session the oversight of the congregation's spiritual, education, outreach and fellowship life and work. Specifically, this includes responsibility for:

- 1. the conduct of public worship services
- 2. the administration of the sacraments
- 3. keeping the church rolls of membership (and adherents) including the registers of baptism, burials and marriages.
- 4. providing on-going Christian Education for all ages of people in the congregation and nurturing growth in faith, fellowship and service.
- 5. caring for the poor, the sick, the bereaved and troubled.
- 6. the outreach work of the congregation in evangelism and social action.

Who is on the Session? The Manual requires the minister of the congregation to chair the Session, and stipulates that elders of the Session are to be elected by the congregation from amongst those who are active as full members. Session chooses from its members a clerk of Session responsible for recording its proceedings as permanent records for the church as a whole, and for submitting records periodically to Presbytery for approval. Finally, all the records kept by Session are to be forwarded to the United Church Archives for protection and historical continuity.

As chairperson of your Session, I take this opportunity to affirm to you, the congregation, the high level of committment of your 1986 Session, and to thank them for the dedicated, honest and faithful approach they have consistently brought to bear on our work. At times our discussions have been hot and heavy as we have tried to deal with the various faith issues arising in the wider church at this time, and to come to some concersus as to what is our faithful response. Some of these discussions have touched the deep places of our committment, and I think it's safe to say that all of us value highly the opportunity to test and learn and grow together as we seek to be faithful to our Lord Jesus and to you, His church in this place.

There follows some highlights of Session's work as gleaned from the minutes by Maureen Gilmour, clerk of Session, to whom I also say thank you for a demanding and responsible job well done.

Part 2: from the clerk of Session 1986

January Session was pleased that 25 adults enrolled in the V.S.T. Knowledge Network course for 10 sessions. The Bible study on "Images of a Suffering God". Dr. Skai Stevenson and Dr. Louise Martin kindly offered their home for this Old Testament series. A Covenant Renewal Service and Communion was celebrated January 26. Session evaluated style of serving communion and felt that communion by stations was going well and would be continued during the year. An evaluation discussion raised some concerns of Sessions: follow-up needed for children who have been baptized; leaders needed for young teen group; broadening the participation by members of congregation in the work of the church because Session is aware that too few people are carrying too big a load. A kids workshop was in the planning stages and Session gave its full support.

February Session plans to send a card to children and parents on first anniversary of baptism and also to send a note to couples married in our church on their first wedding anniversary. Peace and Justice events for April and May were highlighted. Naramata Centre's quarterly magazine "Good News" gives information on courses being offered. Fern Green agreed to highlight these Naramata programs to the congregation.

March Kid's Workshop on March I was a great success with 43 children participating in puppetry, drama, Peace and Justic workshop, story telling, crafts, A swim for kids and families at Easter Seal Camp ended the day. Those who volunteered their time and talent in designing and leading the events are much appreciated. Youth teaching team discussed and leaders needed for September. Good Friday and Easter services planned. Our minister made several suggestions re: special ways to celebrate Maundy Thursday and Good Friday but it was decided not to introduce any major changes. It was agreed that the communion table and lectern would be draped in black for Good Friday Service.

April A National Church Women's Service was held on April 13 to celebrate the 50th anniversary since the first woman, Lydia Gruchy was ordained. in our congregation, many women participated and the history of some of the women in our church was highlighted. Our minister still feels we need to have a worship committee to help plan worship services on an on-going basis. The senoir choir agreed to participate in Sunday services until June. Stein Hoff reported that the AOTS Men's breakfast held in March was most successful with 25 men in attendance. More breakfast meetings planned.

 $\underline{\text{May}}$ Rev. Burnett and Norman Saugstad attended B.C. Conference in Vancouver, May 2 - 6. Inclusive Language - United Church guidelines booklet on this subject will be read by each Session member. Confirmation classes - our teens should be encouraged to take the membership classes in the fall.

June Congregational picnic held at Brackendale Secondary School on June 15 was successful. Sunday Service on June 15 focused on church camping. Session and U.C.W. jointly planned a fellowship event for the congregation and Pattullo's in appreciation for their contributions to the life of the church for many years. Gary and Heather Pattullo and children Karen and Ken, (who moved to Prince George) were honoured with a congregational luncheon, special programme and gifts. A Vancouver-Burrard Presbytery visitation team met with our Church Board on June 17. The team was headed by Rev. Murray Henderson of Capilano United Church. A very good sharing time was experienced.

Session wishes to involve the children in the adult worship service by including them in the act of worhsip of the offerings.

The new hymn book supplement will be out in May '87. Session encouraged church members to contribute \$1.00 per person to help with publishing costs. As our congregation responded so well, Session was able to order 100 copies of supplement on "early plan". These copies will be at a cost of \$3.35 rather than \$5.50, which non participating congregations will pay.

The following highschool grads received Bibles: Glen Davis, Patricia Fairhurst, Joan Shipp, James Walker, Angie Wilson and Teresa Wilson.

September CANEC opened a Vancouver branch at Conference office, 1955- W. 4th Ave. Church school report given by Grace Halvorson and 10 teachers on the roster. Carol Finnie will assist with the music. Marily Caldwell will lead both junior and senoir choirs. Skai Stevenson, Linda and Trevor Harris and Graham Dickson will help with youth programme. No permanent leadership as of yet. Our minister has completed a three wekk Alcohol and Drug Education programme for counselling and teaching purposes.

October Carol Finnie is now leading the junior choir. Young people taking the collection with Stewards is working well. Rev. Burnett is participating in the Marriage Preparation Course offered by Squamish Ministerial Assoc.

At the October service, Norman and Shirley Saugstad reaffirmed their marriage vows on the occassion of their 50th wedding anniversary, followed by coffe and a special anniversary cake for all. Discussion arose again concerning the overload of some church members. How can we spread the load? This is a concern we must respond to.

Mrs. Constance Rulka from Squamish officiated at Nov. 2 and 9 services. Chris Tinworth from Canadian Blind Missions spoke to the Sunday School. Confirmation classes were held with members to be recieved Dec. 14. Some visionary planning discussed and Session will make some requests in the 1987 budget. In order to inform the ocngregation on the subject of overload, a new format for the Annual Meeting will be planning by the minister, Grace Halvorson and Trevor Harris. The Advent-Christmas Season worship services have been jointly planned by Rev. Burnett and the church school so that there will be an intergenerational focus in our services. The special banners (previously made by Lou Rempel) will go up week by week throug Advent to highlight the anticipation of the approaching of Christ's birth. The Advent Clay event for the first Sunday in Advent is becoming a tradition with adult and children participating. A committe is contacting the Anglican and Catholic churches to do joint planning for "10 days FOR WORLD DEVELOPMENT" in the new year.

December On each Sunday in Advent, an advent candle was lit in the wreath and the children brought forward symbols depicting the themes of hope, peace and joy and light and they were placed on a Chrismon tree beside the Communion table. On White Gift Sunday, Dec. 7 speciale envelopes for First United and the M & S Fund were collected. The church school presented a play on the theme of "Christ the Hope of the World" The reception of members and celebration of Holy Communion took place on Dec. 14. The Christmas Sunday Fmaily service on Dec. 21 and the traditional Christmas Eve Candlelight and Carolling service were well attended. The members of Session I had the privileges of serving with: Nancy Hutchinson, Norman Saugstad, Don Halvorson, Skai Stevenson, Trevor Harris, Ruth Smith, Fern Green, Grace Halvorson, Syd Pudney and Stein Hoff. I have also worked closely with our minister, and she has always been most cooperative and helpful.

BOARD OF STEWARDS

The Board of Stewards had a quiet year with no large projects undertaken or major repairs of buildings needed.

The budget was close to being met this year but without the honorarium from the nursery in the annex, our 1986 budget would have had an added \$4,000.00 deficit.

There are many worthy projects and groups that our members contribute to, which don't show in our budget - such as the \$30,000.00 committment to Ventures in Mission, First United, Community Christmas Care, Christian Blind Mission and many others. These would show what a generous congregation we have.

Many thanks to Bill Bachuk, our faithful servant, who built the storage shed at the back property, fixed the hoses for watering in the summer and does most of our emergency work.

The Stewards sponsored the garage and plant sale in the Spring (\$691.30) and the congregational dinner in the Fall (\$342.00). Both were poorly supported, leaving the Stewards with the message that different projects need to be planned for the future.

The renovation of the bathrooms in the church will be undertaken in 1987 and a new roof at the manse will be the top priority in 1988.

I would like to thank the Stewards for their faithfulness this past year, each one has been a pleasure to work with.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

Though numbers were small (about 35 average attendance), V.B.S. was a successful outreach to many Squamish children again this year. However, there was a great shortage of staff and as I had to teach as well as co-ordinate this year, I really felt that I did no justice to either area. I could have used more involvement from our own church members, especially young people, who could assist the kitchen staff and the teachers. Those who did help out enjoyed the programme and have volunteered to do it again.

Many thanks to Nancy Hutchinson, Fern Green and Marnie Pool in the kitchen; teachers Shirley De Cook, Jackie Wilson, Linda Pickering and to Kindra, for coming when she could. Much appreciation to Maurlene Campbell for the posters.

Donations amounted to \$121.87, with much of that specified for our Mission project, which was the Christian Blind Mission International. Unfortunately, because we must prepare for numbers before the children show up, curriculum cost was \$220.24, leaving us with a deficit balance of \$93.37. Since at least half of the total givings was designated to CBMI, I feel that it should be forwarded to them and the Church cover the deficit.

The M & S Fund supports both Canadian and Overseas ministries.

Among many ministries supported in Canada are five hospitals and one medical clinic, ten prison chaplaincies, forty-two hospital chaplaincies, twenty-two native congregations and outreach ministries, sixteen down-town missions and forty-one crisis response ministries. Besides these projects, the M & S fund makes possible theological education and training, Christian Education and new church development. Through Overseas Ministries, the M & S fund supports one hundred and twenty-eight mission-aries in twenty-four countries. There are forty-one countries where the United Church supports missionaries and/or projects.

The above account does not include money donated by our congregations directly to First United, or the food donated to them. It also does not include pledges made to Ventures in Mission which are still being paid. The grocery tape project to provide vouchers for the Food Bank is a further outreach effort for our congregation.

In 1986 the women of the church knit 108 toques for First United and Christmas Care. We expect to continue this project and welcome contributions from anyone (including men). All the units participate in the making of camp kits for underprivileged kids. These consist of a toothbrush, toothpaste, so soap, a comb, towel and facecloth and are given to children from the inner city who arrive at camp with little more than a grin.

The food cart, to which many of you contribute, was emptied six times. The value of the groceries was approximately \$1,000.00.

We also collect labels from Colgate-Palmolive, Campbell soup and used stamps and glasses. A new project for 1986 was the collection of grocery receipts from the three major food outlets. We saved up \$5,000:00 worth of tapes and turned in each bundle for a \$20.00 grocery voucher. In the past year we collected enough tapes to contribute \$1,620.00 to the Food Bank.

Volunteers there, redeem the vouchers for food. Clients do not get vouchers. If all of you would remember to bring your tapes (and your neighbours'), I'm sure that we could double that amount. The Food Bank is in desperate need.

The ladies of the Alpha Unit meet on the first Thursday of each month in the church kitchen. Their favorite projects include the baking of cookies for the Handicapped Unit at First United and organizing a Spring luncheon for the same group.

The Harmony Unit sponsors the two rummage sales each year. These ladies often go out for lunch or dinner together. Along with the Jean Neil Unit, th they host monthly birthday parties at Hilltop House.

The Jean Neil Unit organized Church Mouse luncheons and made an occassional new banner. A first-time project was a highly successful garage sale.

The Mac Kenzie Unit is known for its interesting and informative programs. Their main money-raising project is from Regal sales. They also had a garage sale and sponsored a bake sale. A big service is provided to the congregation each week as Pat Pawlett (892-3450) and Betty Iverson arrange for infant care during the worship service. Adults are welcome to volunteer their time.

Each year the money we raise is donated to our local church, to the M & S Fund and to the Projects Fund (an umbrella group set up by Presbyterial to disburse money more evenly to other groups). We also uses about \$50.00 worth of coffee, sugar, tea, creamer and other goodies in the church kitchen each year.

In 1987 the UCW would like to co-operate with the Stewards in renovating the church washrooms. A substantial sum has been raised through special projects and Mrs. Rudy has set up a separate account to receive monies for this.

We value the support the congregation gives us and look forward to serving together in '87.

Last Fall, our group hosted a meeting on the Hospice and Palliative Care Program. The guest speaker was Mary Ellen de Grace, who is the Hospice/Falliative Care Co-ordinator for the Anglican Diocese of New Westminister. We also viewed the film "The Last Days of Living". Some of our members will attend a Hospice training course in Squamish starting this month and led by Mrs de Grace.

SQUAMISH UNITED CHURCH MEN

With considerable encouragement from Chris Burnett several very successful Men's Breakfasts were held at the Church this year.

Cur inaugural Breakfast was held March 22 with the cook, Norm Halvorson and his capable attendants arriving very early (7:30 on a Saturday morning!) to prepare a breakfast of pancakes, eggs, sausages, orange juice and coffee. By 8:00 am some of the early birds began to arrive and by 8:30 there were some twenty-five men in attendance. Following breakfast there was discussion of tentative plans for mens' activities in the church. Guest speaker, Rev. Bob Thompson, United Church Chaiplain at Vancouver General Hospital, briefly shared his experiences of his mens group at his home church of Deep Cove United before leading an informed devotional/meditation on "building relationships".

The second breakfast was held on May 31st. After breakfast and a devotional led by Chris Burnett, there was some discussion of future projects which could be undertaken by the group. Chris' challenge was for the men to raise funds for a T.V. and Video Recorder for the church. Major activity of the day was the work-bee for the Spring clean-up of the church grounds. With a dazzling display of pre-planning, Stein Hoff arrived with a load of "Pemberton's best" along with numerous flats of bedding plants. For the next three hours men swarmed over the grounds with lawn mowers roaring and lawn trimmers whining. Holes were dug for trees and shrubs and the flowers expertly planted.

Our third breakfast meeting of the year was held in November. The programme was viewing the film "Last Days of Living", which describes the hospice and palliative care program at Royal Jubilee in Montreal. "Hospice" is being considered in Squamish. The film initiated a most reflective, insightful discussion on the issue of providing support and care for the terminally ill and their families.

These three successful, though sometimes tentative ventures, have clearly demonstrated a need for and an interest in a United Church Men's Group in continued..

Squamish. Saturday morning breakfast meetings appear to be the most appealing and convenient format. And there appears to be a preference for informality rather than structure in meetings. Plans for 1987 already include a breakfast in February and certainly one in May for the church gardening project. There is a need for a co-ordinator to set dates for meetings and to delegate responsibilities but for the present the system of selecting an organizer each meeting may be working... and "if it ain't broke, don't fix it!". Perhaps too, in 1987 the group can rise to Chris' challenge to launch a project that would both contribute to the church's outreach while, at the same time providing a specific target for the group.



HOSPICE TAKES SHAPE IN 1986

In mid-October, Sherry Genderton phoned me to see if our church would be interested in helping her sponsor a public meeting to see if there was a felt need and a will towards beginning a hospice unit in Squamish. Things fell into place very quickly and with the support of our Caring Ministry team, a public meeting was advertised for Oct. 29 in our church with Mary Ellen de Grace of West Vancouver, a well-known consultant in the field, as guest speaker.

Twenty-five people turned out, mostly from local congregations and the hospital nursing staff and the interest level was high indeed. Greatly encouraged, we offered a second public meeting on November 26, at which a full length film "Last Days of Living" was shown. This film depicted a hospice team from the Royal Jubilee Hospital in Montreal at work in the lives of five families, in each of which was a dying member.

Mary Ellen had presented the concept of hospice and palliative care and several different models - ranging from multi-disciplinary hospital based teams to community based teams. She indicated avenues of available network and funding support and assured us that in the past ten years, hospice has become a reality in several small B.C. communities. The movie gave us great insight into the skills and kinds of support work needed.

After two meetings, about a dozen people felt committed to the task of going ahead to try to establish hospice in Squamish.

Now (January) the Squamish Doctors Association is behind the project and has appointed Doctor Louise Martin as their co-ordinator. Sherry got the School Board to sponsor an all day workshop followed by five Thursday evenings to train volunteers (begins Jan. 31, 1987). Several of our church members have signed up. Mary Ellen will teach.

Hospice teams provide on-going support for dying people and their families. The emphasis is on quality of life. We ask your prayers in support of this important venture.



ADULT BIBLE STUDY

The 1986 winter term Bible Study was "Images of a Suffering God", an indepth Old Testament course of ten sessions, offered by V.S.T. Dr. Jim Lindenberger and an excellent group of three lay people provided content and discussion/reflection which was always stimulating and challenging. Twenty-five people signed up. The difficulty of the subject matter proved heavy for some, and attendance was not as committed as for the "Discipleship" series. Those who persisted reported important growth in their understanding of the Old Testament and all experienced a broadening ability to apply to our own situations new perceptions of the many dimensions of God and God's actions in human life and history. It was a tough course, but good.

In the Fall, the Wednesday noon group studied the Rev. Bob Wallace's new book "Christ, the Joy" - a study of Phillippians by Paul. Everyone in this group of twelve was excited by the quality content of this course, some saying it was the best Bible Study they had ever experienced. In the format, Bob Wallace assigned us homework, each chapter for personal study and practical application. At the lessons, we shared this as appropriate, worked the passage for the day, and thoroughly enjoyed Bob's own reflections which gave rise to much discussion. The study continued weekly until Christmas.

If you haven't joined an adult study group yet, do come. Here are a few comments from a participant which might encourage you.

"Take home someting every day to enrich life ... time to think about meaning of scripture...much to apply to daily living Problems today not too different from Paul's - he rose above them with faith."

The good fellowship experienced in study groups is an important dimension, providing fun and laughter and opportunity for deepening friendships and affirming and supporting each other's jouneys in faith.

Peace and Justice Working Unit

The Peace and Justice Working Unit of Squamish United Church has maintained contact with the church at the Conference Level in an effort to inform and encourage members to take an active interest in peace and justice issues.

In the spring, a delegate attended a 3 day mini-conference/consultation with other United Church Peace Workers in the province. Sessions were led by David Pollock, Canadian Education Co-ordinator for Project Ploughshares and Rev. Donald Grayston, Director of the Shalom Institute. Study groups focused on such issues as nuclear testing in the Pacific, nuclear weapons and nuclear-powered vessels in Canadian waters, and non-provocative defense. Prayer and Bible study sessions reflected the spiritual aspects of peacemaking.

The Working Unit has delegates serving as liasons with the Squamish Citizens for Peace and is continuing the campaign against Star Wars and the escalation of the arms race.

At B.C. Conference in the spring, our unit requested that the 61st Annual Meeting of the B.C. Conference of the United Church urge the Provincial government to declare the province of British Columbia Nuclear Weapons Free Zone. The resolution reached thefloor and was passed.

The work of the Peace and Justice Unit goes on. With prayer and in faith we find joy in serving our Lord through an active concern for peace and justice.
