


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#### MINISTER'S EPISTLE

from the Minister

January, 1989 was a busy month for Geoff and me. On the home front, the nanny Kellie and Peter had expected in August had still not arrived. Since Kellie was teaching grades 11 and 12 at Collingwood and Peter was working Monday to Friday in Edmonton and Calgary, Geoff took our beloved baby Jen to the sitter's in North Vancouver every morning at 8 and picked her up at 5, except on Mondays, when together we spent my "day off" looking after Jen at home. Daughter Ellen had arranged a four month leave of absence from work to go trekking in Thailand and Nepal, an adventure requiring much detailed preparation. We took her to the airport January 26. It seemed a long time until we picked her up, thin but hale and hearty, on May 1.

Meanwhile, at church, the work of service preparation, marriage couples' preparation, various counselling sessions, Bible Study preparation, meetings, and hospital duty was heightened by calls for funerals on January 3, 21 and 30. I

was indeed grateful for the "Spiritual Renewal" day I had enrolled in, together with twelve other ministers from Vancouver-Burrard Presbytery. We continued to meet one day a month through 1989, under the spiritual direction of Elly Bradley.

In February, the Sword and Spirit study began as did weekly classes for the people who were preparing to join the church. Multi-cultural Sunday with guest speaker Bayani Baybay and his children's spirit-filled singing was a highlight for all, and the Jean Neil Unit provided after service fellowship over one of their famous "mouse lunches" of delicious home made soup and buns. In February we had to say good-bye to Debbie West, whose leadership with teens had been so helpful in the joint Catholic - United Church group. In Lent's first two weeks, a few people gathered each noon for prayer and meditation from Anne Ng's devotionals. February 27 to March 1 I attended the Jurgen Moltmann lectures at V.S.T. - a renowned theologian from the University of Tubanjen in Germany. Having been appointed to the Conference Interview Board which interviews intended candidates and full candidates for the ministry, it was a new and challenging experience to attend the first of these on February 23, others following in July, August, September and November. The calibre of students is amazingly high.

The May meeting of Conference in Terrace was an opportunity for Geoff and me to drive over the Duffy Lake road for the first time (it snowed!). We enjoyed Celia Huber's company on the long drive to Prince George on day one and to Terrace on day two, each day's long trip being nearly 12 hours long. The concerns addressed at Conference had a distinctly "northern" focus and it was enlightening and inspiring to experience the gathered church in a context which so broadened our perspectives of the many and varied dimensions of church life in B.C. The return trip via Ferry from Prince Rupert was gorgeous. I also returned from Conference with a new assignment, having been elected to Co-chair the Conference Division of Global Concerns.

Our second grandchild, Beverley Ellen, was born October 19, the day I returned from the church's national meeting of the Division of World Outreach in Toronto. I felt deeply moved and blessed by both of these inspiring events!

Looking back over the more difficult and painful aspects of the year, I've been reminded that in times of deep distress, my mother used to struggle inwardly and outwardly to trust and to practise what for her was a very special word of God from scripture: "My grace is sufficient for you". Today I know that the deep serenity centre out of which her faith flowed was more than simply her reliance on the sufficiency of God's grace. It was her experience of the reality of God's grace.

Do you remember the content of that scripture? Paul is telling the Corinthians about the thorn in his flesh which continues to harass him in spite of the depth of his service in Christ and personal experience of the Spirit. When he prayed repeatedly to the Lord that the thorn should leave him, God answered: "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness". We have all suffered painful thorns this year, be it the death or serious illness of loved ones, deep conflict between spouses, or heavto bear in family life, dis-ease over the homosexuality issue in the church, or the ache of estrangement. I know that prayers have flowed freely and that we have tried our best to support each other through pain and trouble. There has been much inward and outward struggle to trust and rely on God's grace, both in our caring for each other and in our journeying together through another year of trying to answer Christ's call to be His church as faithfully as we can. God bless you all for your prayers and dedication. I hope you have experienced, as I have, that when we are weak, God's power is made perfect, and that God's grace is indeed sufficient for our need, even when thorns continue to hurt.

By the miracle of God's grace, we come to the end of 1989 with a growing congregation; a fabulous organist, Joanna, and a wonderful and versatile musical instrument; a growing and long awaited choir about to become regular under the direction of Marilyn's enthusiastic leadership; the blessed responsibility of many children and teens to nurture; having met our budget, surpassed our Mission and Service allocation, and responded generously to many outreach projects besides. Very special thanks to Retta Behrner for outstanding support in the office; to Celia Huber for many long hours devoted to Presbytery as our rep.; to Walter Huber for dedicated leadership of the Men's Group; the United Church Community Christmas Care leaders and workers; especially Lou Rempel who co-ordinated the total food collection; the U.C.W. executive, unit leaders and members who have accomplished so much so well; to Maureen Gilmour for sustaining Caring Ministry with such gentleness and cheer; to George Gilmour who Sunday by Sunday opens the church, puts the heat on and sees to the details of readiness for worship; to the Session members whose faith and wisdom have steered us sensitively and at great cost of time and effort through some pretty rough waters; and to the Stewards who have kept us at the stewardship of financing the church's ministries and seen to the upkeep of our buildings. All who have helped in the Church School and especially Kay Lynch and Cathy Bourgh, superintendants, and the helpers with the Messenger and Explorer groups deserve our heartfelt thanks and ongoing support. To the new Ministry and Personnel Committee, thanks both for your efficient progress through the manual requirements and for your personal supportiveness. Carol Finnie and Monica Schwarz, thanks for your choir work with the children. To Syd Pudney who so ably filled the pulpit on two occasions when it was important for me to be away, my grateful appreciation. Kathy Davis' catalogwing of several dozen new books and general library upkeep has been much appreciated help. To Ev. Dawson, who keeps our buildings clean, thanks from us all. And to all of you in the congregation who by your worship and prayers sustain us all, God's richest blessings. I love you all dearly. May the grace and peace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you day by day.

#### SESSION REPORT 1989

Session of Squamish United met ten times in 1989. Highlights of activities were as follows.

<u>January:</u> Audio and video tapes about August 1988 General Council made available to the congregation; small individual and group fund raising efforts for the Crosby Province Wide Fund Raising effort encouraged.

February: New Sunday School Co-ordinators Kay Lynch and Cathy Bourgh welcomed. Multi-cultural Sunday held February 26.

<u>March:</u> South Africa Mission Dinner and Study Night held, with 48 people in attendance. Phone lists assigning congregation members to specific session members updated, to facilitate interaction between session and congregation.

April: Presbytery Pastoral Visitation team came up to Squamish April 18. A Potluck and Games night was held with 50 people in attendance.

May: Celia Huber and Rev. Burnett attended B.C. Conference in Terrace, B.C. May 12-15.

June: Sunday School picnic held June 12. Major annex cleaning set for over the summer. Gordon Sellers resigned from session. Session discussion held over effects of the Human Sexuality Report of General Council of August 1988. Secret Pals Project wound up. MMHS Response Invitation Project initiated. Investigation of a proposal to restructure session and board to a committee structure commenced.

<u>September:</u> Sunday School Kickoff Rally September 10. Spirituality Retreat with Elly Bradley held September 29 weekend. "A Place for You - Toward the Integration of Children in the Life of the Church" received and discussed.

October: Authority of Scripture Study packet made available to the congregation. MMHS Invitation to Respond Project completed and presented to Board and congregation and forwarded to Presbytery.

<u>November/December</u>: Session/Board Restructuring Committee struck and dinner/study session held December 12 with Rev. Brian Thorpe demonstrating concrete examples of how this new Committee Structure for Board would work. Membership - Initiation Remit tabled to January, 1990.

Over the year, Caring Ministry was active. Communion including children was held in our congregation this year, the first time with mixed reviews, thereafter with good acceptance. 6 new members were received by profession of faith, 6 new members by baptism and affirmation of faith and 4 new members by transfer and re-affirmation of faith. There were 3 child baptisms.

#### BOARD OF STEWARDS 1989 report

The Stewards committee had a relatively quiet year with no major projects. Building maintenance was restricted to small items, having accomplished some major repairs in the previous year.

Some further upgrading was done in the Annex with the help of the Sunday School teachers. This included painting the nursery and kitchen and installing a new linoleum floor in the kitchen. A number of small work-bees were held throughout the year to take care of routine maintenance items.

A new lawn mower was purchased in the Spring and volunteers kept the church grounds well trimmed. A new church sound system installed in late 1988 accounts for the other capital item shown in one of this year's financial statement.

We were again very pleased with the generosity of our congregation; total receipts and donations exceeded expenditures. We not only achieved a balanced budget but also surpassed our Mission and Service target by a small amount. This, plus over two thousand dollars in special appeals for M & S related projects is more than we expected in this year of conflict.

The Squamish United Church enters the new decade with a modest carry-over in it's current account plus over six thousand dollars in a building fund for future considerations or major building repairs, should they become necessary.

#### PRESBYTERY REPORT 1989

A few lines from the October issue of the Presbytery Newsletter read, "The purpose of the Vancouver Burrard Presbytery is to provide opportunities for leadership and training, spiritual growth and worship, and Christian fellowship between the 26 churches of Vancouver Burrard Presbytery".

During this past year, I have experienced all these aspects of Presbytery during its ten monthly meetings which are hosted each month by one of the 26 churches throughout our Presbytery. Each meeting consists of division meetings, supper, worship and the plenery session. Attendance at the monthly meetings is mandatory for the minister and one lay delegate from each of the churches within the Vancouver Burrard boundaries.

Presbytery divisions, which mirror those of B.C. Conference and the National Church, worked hard to conduct the business of the Presbytery and that of the wider church. For example the Global Concerns Division kept presbyters informed about the issues in the third world, and we were often encouraged to respond to the ugent needs of oppressed peoples in various ways. Closer to home, the Division of Home Mission kept active with protests addressing issues surrounding the housing crisis in Vancouver. The Presbytery also oversaw the valuable Multi-cultural and Ethnic Ministry and Youth were an active part of Presbytery. The Youth worked on a paper recycling project this past year and church offices were encouraged to participate. In February, the entire plenery session was given over to hear motions regarding the M.M.H.S. Report, and a system was established in the fall, to elicit responses to the homosexuality issue from the congregations. ( Our own congregation participated in this, and a small committee of Louise Martin, Lynette Halvorson and myself, collated the responses and forwarded them to Presbytery.)

An opportunity for me to experience leadership and training was afforded me during this past year, as I was nominated and elected to the Pastoral Relations Committee of Presbytery. This new position means I attend an extra meeting of Presbytery a month and I have changed my working division from Communications to Ministry, Personel and Education. At present, in my new role on the Pastoral Relations Committee, the Rev. Jim Elliot, from First United and I are working with the combined Pastoral Relations Committee from Gibsons United and St. John's United, Davis Bay, in their search for a new minister. I am excited about the potential for learning in this new position and honoured to be part of the process.

The highlight of the year for me was attending, as delegate, the 64th B.C. Conference in Terrace in May. Rev. Burnett, Geoff and I travelled the numerous miles by car to Terrace and experiencing the miles first hand gave us a better concept of the vastness of the province. The theme of the Conference was, 'Listening to Creation - Restoring the Harmony', and throughout the four days in Terrace there were many opportunities for all the 595 delegates to work, learn and worship together with the peoples of the north as the theme of Conference unfolded. The native indian community contributed in many ways to the success of Conference, and a special moment for us all came when Mr. Jim Angus, a native indian chief, was elected president of B.C. Conference, due to take up office at the Conference in May

of 1990. Staging Conference, in a northern community, for the first time was not easy in many ways, but it proved to be a very worthwhile experience.

As another year has come to an end, I am reminded of the frustration I often feel as our geographical location prevents us from joining with the other churches of the Presbytery when opportunities for fellowship arise. I personally feel fortunate that I am able to take a more productive part in the life of Presbytery. The minutes of all meetings are available to anyone wishing further information about any aspect of Presbytery.

#### BIBLE STUDY, FAITH NURTURE AND SPIRITUAL DEVELOPMENT GROUPS, 1989

(using United Church Resources)

#### 1. Kerygma: Winter/Spring '89.

A small group (all women) met most Thursday mornings from January 12th to the end of Lent, March 23, from 9:30 to 11. We studied the Introductory Unit, "The Bible As a Whole", which had three themes: What is the Bible?, How Did We Get the Bible?, and How to Study the Bible? This included a study of the gradual process of canonization of both Old and New Testaments and the fluidity of what was considered "authoritative" in various faith communities before Jesus' time, in Jesus' time, and in the early church and beyond. It was late in the 4th century before the 27 books of the New Testament we now have was approved as canon (scripture having authority). Participants had to memorize the 66 books of the Bible. We also learned the significance of biblical study words such as Septuagint, apocrypha, Deuterocononical, apocalyptic writings, and oral tradition. It was hard going, but study of the foundations of the Bible is valuable in understanding the Biblical interpretive traditions.

Then we tackled Unit 1. It's four themes were: The Exodus:
Pattern of God's Saving Acts; Deliverance After the Exodus; God's
Saving Act in Jesus Christ; and Deliverance of the Church.

Kerygma is a greek word meaning "message". The course, which has 10 units, is an in-depth wholistic approach to the Bible. Since all major Christian denominations affirm the entire Bible as our sacred book, Kerygma is designed to help participants become familiar with the whole Bible, studying the major themes that give the Bible its unity. Such a study is very different from our usual "piece-meal" approach to scripture, but to those who persevere through the entire course, it provides a high standard of Biblical literacy. I do hope Kerygma will find a place in our 1990 programmes.

#### 2. The Sword and the Spirit: Winter/Spring '89.

For this excellent series of video programmes a small group met weekly in homes on Wednesday evenings from February 22 to April 5. Produced jointly by the B.B.C. and U.C.T.V., the series offered large slices of the life and world of the Christian church in countries around the world. Especially inspiring were the powerful witnesses of ordinary congregations in places where political repression of Christianity is the norm. In the west, many congregations are getting smaller, but in developing countries the congregations were noticably huge — often several hundreds of all ages gathered to worship. The SWORD (in scripture, God's WORD) is certainly alive and active through the Spirit in Korea, Brazil, Poland, China, Africa and the U.S.A. Bill Burton of West Vancouver kindly taped the programmes for us and for our future use. The 6 or 7 participants unanimously recommend the series to others.

#### 3. Portraits in Spirituality: Fall '89.

A Vancouver School of Theology series for lay education in B.C., these T.V. programmes were hosted by Dr. Gerald Hobbs and the Rev. Beryl Ingram-Ward. Each one explored the spiritual journey and contribution of Christianity of eight different persons or groups, from

the 4th to the 20th century. With the help of a study book for background to each programme, and story telling, teaching and dramatized episodes from the T.V. segments, participants then engaged in lively discussion and selections of scripture study. Our horizons were stretched by the varity and richness of the traditions that have fed in to our tradition, and by the drawing of parallels to the contemporary church's work and witness and struggles to be faithful. After discussion, we watched a panel of lay people of various denominations discuss each programme with the teachers. Their questions and insights added a valuable dimension to our discussions. We met in the Huber's home for this series, and the 7 participants greatly enjoyed both the series and the warm fellowship over coffee and goodies. Thanks for the hospitality, Walter and Celia.

"Be doers of the word, and not hearers only" James 1:22 (RSV)

Many people in this congregation are "doers of the word". Since becoming a member of this church in 1963, I have witnessed a real caring attitude in members of our church family. I have also been a recipient of much of that love and care.

Our Caring Ministry team has been together since 1985, and although small in number, we try to support our minister as we are able to in visiting those who are sick, elderly, bereaved, etc. We realize we probably missed some folk who would have appreciated some contact but please know we really try to respond to every need that comes to our attention.

#### SQUAMISH RETREAT REPORT

On a beautiful Fall weekend, 16 members of our congregation participated in a spiritual Retreat.

The theme for the September 29,30 and October 1 weekend was "Drawing Nourishment from the Roots". Our Retreat leader was Rev. #### MESSENGERS AND EXPLORERS

An Experiment: Mid-Week Groups for Grade Schoolers: Fall 1989

After school midweek programmes for grade-schoolers however, have a long history in the United Church of Canada, because the forty minutes or so per week in Sunday School is insufficient time to do the nurturing in faith it is our responsibility to do. 
A quantity of food was purchased for a total cost of \$190.00. This cost was recouped from "the plate" as well as selling some of the excess food.
