

REFORMATION LUTHERAN'S YOUTH SUMMER WORK PROGRAM

Thank you, Mt. Zion!! Your gifts via the Lenten Giving Cross totaled \$2275, nearly doubling our goal! That covers the scholarships for EIGHT children to attend Reformation's Youth Summer Work Program 2022!!! Thank you so much!

So, you say, why is the Youth Summer Work Program the Mission of the Month for May, then? Well, there are other expenses that Reformation needs to cover to give each child a great experience. Here are two specific ones. Each summer the kids are taken on a field trip. This summer they are going to a nature center, so transportation and admission costs must be covered, about \$35 per child. And to ensure that transportation issues don't keep kids from attending camp, families who need them are given bus tickets to get their children to and from Reformation each day.



Lunch is provided every day, as well. Several partner churches participate in this, each church supplying and serving lunch for a week. Mt. Zion is one of those churches. Total cost for a week of food and juice is approximately \$400.

Mt. Zion also sponsors the end of summer camp program. It is a celebration of the children's time together and of their accomplishments. Here they receive their back packs filled with school supplies for the coming year and some money to help with purchasing school clothing, etc. Every celebration should include a cake, right? So that is where Mt. Zion comes in. We sponsor the purchase of a large sheet cake complete with lots of gooey frosting in fun party colors to make the event even more special.

Any of the money you donate to the May Mission of the Month will go to Reformation to use specifically for the Youth Summer Work Program. So, the more we give, the more the coordinators can focus on the kids in the program and the less they have to worry about how to pay for it. Use your Mission of the Month donation envelope and note "Reformation Youth" in the memo section of your check, or choose the Mission of the Month option for on -line giving.

Whatever you are able to give, know it will go to help a child have an awesome experience this summer. It will be a positive experience which they can continue to build on.

Unfortunately, Wisconsin has double the rate of lead poisoning in children compared to the national average.

After two years of Covid precautions, Mt Zion's Women of Heart have decided to go back to meeting in-person on the first Saturday of the month, starting May 7. The meetings will be held in the Hearth Room at 8:30am.

For the last two years of Covid, the group met on Zoom to avoid inperson contact, but had decided to meet every week instead of every month. Now everyone misses the get-togethers at church, and yet hate to give up the weekly meetings on Zoom where we could get up and tune in without the travel. We decided to do both.

Our plan is to meet at church on first Saturday of the month and on Zoom all other Saturdays. All meetings are at **8:30 am**. We plan to format the study so that you can either choose to attend all meetings, or only occasionally. The in-person meetings will not be on Zoom. If you are unable to attend all meetings, we will bring you up to speed when

you can make it.

We will be starting a study of Acts in May, using the book "Acts for Everyone, Part 1" by N.T. Wright. Part 1 includes Chapters 1-12 of Acts, and the group will decide later if we will move on to Part 2 (the rest of Acts) or go to another subject. It is not necessary to have a copy of the book in order to attend.



The group is for all women (and girls) of Mt Zion, all ages and is a great way to connect with other members. Our studies are informal, conversational, and we learn a lot from one another and from the study material. Science Tidbits

Geese Police

Beginning in October, 2021, China began a new security policy on its 300-mile border with Vietnam in an effort to limit coronavirus entry via illegal immigration. They employed gaggles of geese to serve as security guards, ready to raise a terrible honking ruckus and bite anyone



trying to sneak across the border. Once these domesticated geese get acclimated to their environment and establish their territory, they fiercely defend it. And there is absolutely no training required.

That geese are helping uphold China's pandemic policy provides a new twist to an age-old practice, that of using geese as intruder alarms. Geese were domesticated over 5,000 years ago, making them the second oldest domesticated animal after dogs. There are many historical tales of goose "armies," including one story crediting geese with saving Rome from a Gaul invasion in 390 BC. Wrote a witness: "The goose is carefully watchful; witness the defense of the capitol when the silence of the dogs [apparently the dogs were uselessly noncommittal] would have betrayed nothing."

More recently, another gaggle, appropriately christened the "Scotch watch," patrolled 300 million pounds of Scottish whiskey in Dumbuck, Scotland from 1959 until 2012. And so successful was the U.S. army's 1986 deployment of 18 geese to safeguard radar and anti-aircraft installations in West Germany, that they "conscripted" 900 more for service in the region.

As suggested in the Rome story, geese may be more effective in this line of work than dogs because geese are more selective about raising an alarm. They restrict their warnings to intruders that encroach into their special area, while dogs can make noise just for fun or to engage in "casual conversation" with one another.

The ability of geese to serve in this capacity is no surprise to Lauren Thielen, a veterinarian who works with geese. She says, "If you walk onto a geese's turf, they will charge you, honk and use intimidation tactics, instead of running away as most birds would do. I always think of them as bossy birds."

Geese have excellent eyesight and can spot predators approaching from a great distance. But most fascinating is the fact that they can control each eye separately. Moreover, when sleeping, geese can leave one side of the brain awake and leave open the eye connected to it in order to detect threats. a rare phenomenon called unihemispheric slow wave sleep.

Wild geese typically make use of "security geese" on the edge of flocks to warn against threats. And they are so proficient at sensing danger that ducks and cranes will often feed with them for the added protection.

Dogs do have advantages in that their smell is much better and they can be trained for multiple purposes. Further, one would probably be more intimidated by a dog and its trainer than a guy with a goose. **Steve Downs**
