The Rector's Corner

Today's hymn before the sermon is very familiar and well loved: 'Fairest Lord Jesus'. It makes a comparison between the wonder and beauty of Christ, and nature. In every stanza the comparison gives way to say that "Jesus is fairer. Jesus is purer. Jesus shines brighter." In the end, this is the only logical conclusion because, as both God and man, Jesus is the ruler of all nature...."Fairest Lord Jesus/ Ruler of all nature/ O Thou of God and man the Son".

St. John Chrysostom echoed this in one of his sermons:

"I do not think of Christ as God alone, or man alone, but both together. For I know He was hungry, and I know that with five loaves He fed five thousand. I know He was thirsty, and I know that He turned the water into wine. I know He was carried in a ship, and I know that he walked on the sea. I know that He died, and I know that He raised the dead. I know that He was set before Pilate, and I know that He sits with the Father on His throne. And truly some of these I ascribe to the human, and others to the divine nature. For by reason of this He is said to have been both God and man."

Not much is known of this hymn's origins. Some think it was sung by German crusaders in the 12th century as they made their long and dangerous trip to the Holy Land. (The tune is named 'Crusaders Hymn.) Others believe it was sung by Moravian Christians, followers of John Hus a famous Czech Preacher, as they were driven out of Bohemia in 1620. Wherever it came from, this hymn is perfect for the Easter Season. It exalts the Risen Lord and magnifies Him as Saviour.

Approximately 60 years after Jesus died and rose from the dead, St. Paul wrote his letter to the Church in Colossae, now in modern Turkey. Although a prisoner in Rome, Paul wanted to address a heretical philosophy that was circulating in Colossae. It insisted that angels were the intermediaries between God and humans, not Christ.

So, St. Paul wrote to the Christians at Colossae and reminded them of Christ's 'pre-eminence' – that He excelled and is distinct from all others. In his words:

"He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation. For by Him all things were created in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones (third order of angels) or dominions or rulers or authorities – all things were created through Him and for Him. And He is before all things, and in Him all things hold together. And He is the Head of the Body, the Church. He is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, that in everything He might be pre-eminent." (1.15-18)

And so we sing:

"All fairest beauty/heavenly and earthly/ Wondrously, Jesus, is found in thee/ None can be nearer, fairer or dearer, than Thou, my Saviour, art to me".
