Alleluia! Christ is risen. Welcome to St. John the Evangelist.

We acknowledge that we gather at St. John's on the traditional and unceded territory of the Algonquin Nation. May we dwell on this land with respect and peace.

By attending this service, you are agreeing to appear on video in our on-line worship offering through St. John's website and Facebook site.

The modified *Yellow* stage of the diocesan Pandemic plan means various safety measures to help reduce the risk of COVID-19 transmission. It has proven very effective for our church.

Some restrictions have eased and this will continue in the weeks ahead. Readers, intercessor and preachers may now remove their masks when speaking.

- Proof of vaccination is **not** required to attend worship services. All of St. John's clergy have been fully vaccinated.
- Masks continue to be mandatory, even if you are fully vaccinated. Please wear your mask throughout the service except when receiving Communion. Physical distancing continues to be encouraged.
- Sunday School is offered in the Upper Hall. Children will join their families at the offertory.
- The offering plates will not be passed. You may place your donation in the box/bowl at the back of the church or at the exits. Thank you for your donation!
- Communion is now offered in **both kinds** for those who wish to receive it. The Greeter will indicate when you may leave your pew. Please make your way up the centre aisle to the clergy at the chancel steps to receive the bread, and then make your way to the table at the side aisle where you may receive the wine. The Communion assistant will say to you "The blood of Christ." You may choose to pick up the chalice and drink from it, or simply bow your head in response if you do not wish to receive. Please note that intinction (dipping the wafer into the wine) is not permitted. Once you drink from the chalice, place it back on the table. The Communion assistant will then wipe the rim and rotate it for the next recipient and you return to your pew via the side aisle. You may remove your mask when you receive Communion and replace it as you return to your pew. If you require Communion to be brought to you, please notify the greeter.

THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD

First Reading Acts 16:9-15

During the night Paul had a vision: there stood a man of Macedonia pleading with him and saying, 'Come over to Macedonia and help us.' When he had seen the vision, we immediately tried to cross over to Macedonia, being convinced that God had called us to proclaim the good news to them.

We set sail from Troas and took a straight course to Samothrace, the following day to Neapolis, and from there to Philippi, which is a leading city of the district of Macedonia and a Roman colony. We remained in this city for some days. On the sabbath day we went outside the gate by the river, where we supposed there was a place of prayer; and we sat down and spoke to the women who had gathered there. A certain woman named Lydia, a worshipper of God, was listening to us; she was from the city of Thyatira and a dealer in purple cloth. The Lord opened her heart to listen eagerly to what was said by Paul. When she and her household were baptized, she urged us, saying, 'If you have judged me to be faithful to the Lord, come and stay at my home.' And she prevailed upon us.

And there will be no more night; they need no light of lamp or sun, for the Lord God will be their light, and they will reign for ever and ever.

CONGRATULATIONS ST. JOHN'S

At its special Vestry meeting on Wed May 18, St. John's voted in favour of donating \$500,000 to Carebridge Community Support for the completion of its affordable housing build to be located at 44 Chambers St. here in Smiths Falls. A second Vestry will be held at a date to be announced to approve the terms of the rectory mortgage that is to be used to fund the donation in part. This is a good news story for our community and our church. Many thanks to everyone who carefully and prayerfully discerned and engaged in the discussions that enabled this to take place.

NO MOW MAY

As part of Creation Cares and our responsibility to renew and sustain the earth, St. John's is participating in No Mow May. We are intentionally letting the grass – and dandelions! – grow this month and not mowing the lawn. So, while the grass may be a bit longer and the lawns looks a bit unkept, it is only for the month. The bees, the butterflies and the birds will be happy!

RAISED GARDEN BED

Great news! A raised garden bed has erected in the area between the parish hall and the church. It will be used to grow produce and flowers and will be a learning resource for our Sunday School. Included in the plants are the "Three Sisters" – the traditional indigenous crops of beans, corn and squash. They are so named because these three vegetables complement each other in the garden as well as nutritionally. Corn provides tall stalks for the beans to climb up above the sprawling squash vines. Beans provide nitrogen to fertilize the soil (bean roots take nitrogen from the air and convert it into forms easily absorbed by other plant roots) and stabilize the tall corn in heavy winds. The large leaves of the sprawling squash plants shade the ground, helping to retain soil moisture and reducing weeds. In addition, these three crops are nutritionally complete and balanced when eaten together: corn provides carbohydrates; dried beans are rich in protein and contain amino acids; squash provide different vitamins and minerals not found in the other two.
