We are so grateful to Pastor Cummings and all that he has brought to our congregation and look forward to the future and our "New Normal" under his leadership!

Pastoral Report

Living in a time of pandemic has made so many of us feeling diminished, even the church. From the beginning, we have been afraid to be outside or with others outside of family. The weight and constraints of the crisis have worked to limit gatherings and enjoyment of life. We are afraid of getting sick. We fear losing our job, complete debilitation or dying alone. Fear of losing loved ones is real, too.

The mental toll of COVID-19 is made evident by increased levels of anxiety in the community. Waves of infection and hospitalizations, inefficient distribution of vaccines and resistance to vaccine, along with efforts to keep the economy running have left strong feelings of frustration, displeasure, and hostility. In addition, divisive politics has caused awkwardness, loss of friendships, and arguments between members enough to hinder spiritual growth.

At Messiah, we have and continue to emphasize love. "God shows his love for us in that while we were yet sinners Christ died for us" (Rom. 5:8). Love sacrifices for the neighbor. "Love is patient and kind; love is not jealous or boastful; it is not arrogant or rude. Love does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice at wrong, but rejoices in the right" (1 Cor. 13:4-6). Love does not mean we will not have disagreements or experience brokenness for we know that love does not rule out hurts. However, love being one of nine gifts of the Spirit means that we receive divine aid. We do not go it alone. We "clothe ourselves with love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony" Col. 3:14).

How are we doing?

As Christians, we are reminded that fear can blind and prevent us from doing good. Instead, we accept the challenges facing our nation as opportunities to trust God and not let fear win.

Our Task Force/Ad Hoc committee has led the way by encouraging safe practices for gatherings including worship and taking the vaccine. With the vaccine in our arms, we no longer face an uncertain future but we continue to wear masks at worship. The hope is that most of our members, if not all, will receive the vaccine and build up immunity. Since there is no vaccine for infants through age 5 years, managing the virus like we manage the flu is our best approach.

Worship has and continues to be on Saturday at 5:30 p.m. and Sunday at 9:30 a.m. only. We offer three formats. Saturday is Casual worship with a traditional format that excludes sung liturgy. On Sunday, there are two formats–1st and 3rd is Contemporary worship with Revelations Praise Band, and 2nd, 4th and 5th is Traditional worship with sung liturgy and the organ.

Sunday School and Confirmation classes resumed on Sunday, September 19. Adult Education resumed on Sunday, October 3 and meets in the Sanctuary during Sunday School hour. We resumed distribution of the sacrament in the sanctuary with some modification on Reformation weekend. Holy Communion is administered by continuous table.

We persevere in this season of COVID 19 with a guarded approach until there is a sustainable decline in the number of COVID 19 cases, infection rate, hospitalizations, and deaths. There are no definitive plan to resume two worship services on Sundays. However, in October, we reintroduced **Coffee Hour on Sundays with Parish Life as host. This follows worship in the Fellowship Hall.**

Where are we going?

As a hybrid church, we acknowledge that we are being characterized by in-person and online worship. However, we struggle with our online identity as far as membership is concerned, its uniqueness, and what we are trying to convey.

In the traditional sense, we are rebuilding connections through in-person small group meetings, social events, and Christian education activities. We retain the ZOOM platform but have significantly reduced its use.

Every effort is made to visit the homebound, bring them the sacrament and help them feel connected with the church. Visitation continues to be a priority and includes reaching out to members who find it challenging to get out.

At one time, Messiah was a community church. Today, it is a church within the community because a handful of our members live in the community. We intentionally decided to remain in the community. Why?

Our vision expresses the idea of a place that is open and inviting to all, welcoming those in need and searching for the Word of God, and where wounds are healed, the lost found, the hungry fed, hope replace despair and lives are changed. The vision articulates ministry within and outside the walls of the church. Toward this end, we house and operate a Daycare on church property, host Park Crest AA groups, Al Anon, and NA groups. We charter the Scout Troop and Pack, support Holland Elementary School, and manage and run Messiah House in collaboration with Safe to Sleep.

Messiah's outreach extends beyond the Seminole/Holland neighborhood. However, in an effort to fully identify with our neighborhood, we are working with residents, the city and Community Partners of the Ozarks to reestablish the Seminole/Holland Neighborhood Association.

In our desire to serve God, we remain open to ideas from members. It would please me very much to see more members actively participate in the ministry and mission of Messiah. This would be exciting and fulfilling since "each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good" (1 Cor. 12:7).

It was a joy and relief when we hired Sydney Marsh as Office Administrator. She is a welcome addition to the staff. Also, we are getting closer to hiring a Director of Christian Discipleship. This individual will provide expert leadership in the area of children, youth and family ministry. Be praying for guidance as we finalize job description and advertise the position.

Messiah Lighthouse Report

Messiah Lighthouse Child and Family Development Center has served children and families in the community since October 2009. The mission of Messiah Lighthouse is to provide quality childcare in a Christian environment, with a focus on strengthening families through community support. Messiah Lighthouse is licensed to care for children six weeks to six years of age and has the distinction of being one of only 13 childcare facilities in Greene County to achieve accreditation through Missouri Accreditation for Early Childhood Education.

MLCFDC operates in partnership with the Lighthouse Child and Family Development Center, with community support from the Musgrave Foundation. Through this partnership, MLCFDC contracts for the services of our Center Director and receives financial support for the position of Family Support Coordinator, as well as support for three Professional Development Days for staff and coverage of expenses for onboarding of new staff members (physical exams, TB tests, background checks, First Aid and CPR training). As an organization, Lighthouse also operates a childcare center in partnership with Life 360 Church at The Fairbanks. The Lighthouse Executive Director, Liz Hahn, provides administrative expertise, grant writing, and leadership support to MLCFDC.

During 2021, MLCFDC experienced changes in the leadership team. Jessica Phillips began as Center Director in November, after serving as center director at another childcare facility in Greene County.

MLCFDC experienced leadership team changes in 2021. Jessica Phillips began as Center Director in November, after serving three years as a lead teacher and six months as center director at another Greene County childcare facility. Jessica has an Associate of Applied Science degree in Early Childhood Development from OTC, and received her Bachelor of Science in Child and Family Development at Missouri State University in December 2021. A search will begin in January for a Family Support Coordinator, following the resignation of Jeni Rousey, MSW, LCSW. Melody Farabee, Infant Lead Teacher and Assistant Center Director, worked a part-time schedule through most of 2021 due to family caregiving responsibilities, and we will welcome her back to full time in January 2022.

The COVID-19 pandemic continued to present challenges this year to enrollment and staffing; with occasional classroom closures necessitated by virus exposures and quarantines. Classrooms were realigned by combining preschool and pre-kindergarten students. Current enrollment is 34, 85% of current capacity of 40; the preschool enrollment is capped at 10, with four spaces held open until additional staff can be hired.


The MLCFDC ministry receives support of numerous members of the congregation. Special appreciation is extended to the following persons for their assistance in 2020:

We invite help with facility and playground workdays, gifts to the Tuition Assistance Fund to assist families in financial difficulty, regular giving in support of Center operations, and referrals of families in need of childcare. Above all, we ask for prayers for God's blessing on the children, families, and staff of this program

Altar Guild

Messiah's Altar Guild is a ministry of volunteers which serves God and the congregation by preparing the sanctuary and altar for worship services. Each week, members of the Altar Guild prepare the chancel for the celebration of Holy Communion. The Altar Guild also cares for the paraments for each season of the Church year, the altar linens, communion vessels, and sanctuary furnishings including the processional crosses, acolyte's candlelighters, and baptismal font. Members select appropriate banners for each season of the church year and prepare for special services such as Holy Baptism.

The Altar Guild consists of six teams who serve on a rotating basis: Terry Dunham and Susan Spaethe, Lisa Melgren and Betty Wiles, Cathy Murrell and Sue Polly, Linda Elliot and Linda Michael, Holly Marsh and Sydney Marsh, and Nadine Melgren and Nancy Hoeman.

The distribution of Holy Communion was modified during the first half of the year to accommodate pandemic precautions. While consecration of the elements took place at the altar, distribution occurred as worshippers left the sanctuary. We express thanks to Joy Ward for baking bread for consecration and to the Safety Shepherds for their assistance in preparing for distribution of the Sacrament in the narthex.

The silver communion ware, originally given to the church in 1988 in memory of Ople Kruse, a former Altar Guild chair, was re-plated this year by Theiss Plating of Webster Groves, MO. This work was made possible by a grant from the Endowment Fund. The Communion set was rededicated the weekend of Pastor Orin's Installation.

Worship & Music Committee

January 2021 marked the completion of Dawn Gutierrez's three and a half years as our Worship and Music Coordinator, as well as our Senior Choir Director. Although we are in the midst of a worldwide pandemic, Dawn is still excited to see what God has in store for Messiah Lutheran Church in 2022.

Sunday, January 3, 2021, a prerecorded quartet of singers offered "The Glory of Christmas" composed by Lloyd Larson. It was wonderful to hear this beautiful music at the start of the New Year. Two weeks later the children from God's Kids pre-recorded themselves singing segments of the hymn "This Little Light of Mine" which was then pieced together into one video by Morgan Benedict. Dawn has been very thankful for this option of prerecorded musical offerings. Although it takes a lot more time to coordinate between Morgan, Marilyn, and the singers each week, it kept special music alive in our church, which was not only important for our church musicians but for our congregation as well.

The Worship and Music Committee decided to cancel our in-person Ash Wednesday services on February 17, 2021, due to inclement weather. Evangelism Committee

Endeavor to bring new members to Messiah congregation. The most important work we do to fulfill this responsibility is to provide a meaningful welcome when visitors attend worship. To this end, we are indebted to those who faithfully serve as members of the Shepherding Teams. Working with those planning safe in-person worship, shepherding was carried out with a smaller number of shepherds who continued to focus on welcoming and facilitating changes as worship evolved, returning gradually back to pre-COVID processes. We continue to provide a welcome token and a follow-up message for all visitors. Plans are in place to receive additional members early in 2022.

Facilitate immersion of new members into the life of Messiah congregation. Opportunities for service are discussed with new members, and committee members follow up with individuals to ensure they are welcomed into the Messiah community. Remember that it is the responsibility of all members to reach out to invite those who are new to Messiah to participate in Messiah's programs and activities. Biographical information on new members, published in the Spirit, facilitates contact with those new to the Messiah community.

Be attentive to members who have lapsed in their worship attendance and/or congregational presence. With the pandemic still in our midst, the most vulnerable were encouraged to use careful judgment in whether to attend in-person worship...personal choice continued to be the theme. However, as vaccinations became available, it was good to see increasing numbers attending worship in person. We give thanks for the technology that allows us to provide virtual opportunities to worship via Facebook and YouTube. We are grateful for Morgan Benedict, our AV technician, and for our volunteers, Drew Bowman and Elaine Novak. If there are folks you are not seeing in worship, give them a call and tell them they are being missed, and, as activities begin to return, be sure to invite those who might still be absent.

Ensure that appropriate congregational correspondence is on-going with prior visitors, members, and distant and prior members. Maintaining a current pictorial directory of Messiah's membership is an on-going challenge. As soon as it is published—it is outdated. However, it is time for an updated edition. The committee has discussed a new format for the directory which would allow for intermittent updating when new members are received and changes occur in contact information of members. Be watching for more information. Everyone is encouraged to contact the church office to keep contact information current. The monthly Spirit Newsletter (distributed via USPS) and weekly Midweek Announcements (distributed via e-mail) are the current correspondence methods. If you are not receiving either of these and wish to, notify the church office. Being a subscriber to Living Lutheran is the best way to stay connected to the Evangelical Lutheran Church at the churchwide level. Messiah has a congregational subscription plan that provides the opportunity to subscribe at a reduced price. If you are not a subscriber and you are interested, contact Nathan in the church office. The ELCA is a church that values and encourages diverse voice and lively dialogue—you can be a part of that through Living Lutheran.

Seek ways to encourage Messiah members to be joy-filled, vibrant witnesses to Jesus Christ. Again this year, the committee was able to have a presence (although limited due to a conflicting Women of the ELCA event) at the September God's Work. Our Hands. We provided cold drinks, donuts and smiles for both those doing the work and members of the neighborhood who took advantage of Messiah's help cleaning up the Seminole-Holland neighborhood. Everyone is encouraged to participate in the adult education classes and Bible Studies that are offered at Messiah. Learning more about who we say we are as Lutherans and 'being in the Word' surely strengthen our ability to witness for our Lord.

The work of Evangelism is never done, and it is work each of us is called to do. Reach out to those you miss seeing around Messiah, invite acquaintances and those you meet who do not have a church home to come to worship with you or share that Messiah is on Facebook and YouTube, and live a life using words and actions to share how you experience God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit in your personal life.

- (3) Assembled **129 Baby Care Kits**, with gently used baby items purchased from thrift stores, plus 1570 volunteer hours spent knitting or crocheting baby blankets and caps, creating and sewing baby quilts, cutting and sewing baby gowns out of donated t-shirts, cutting and hemming baby blankets out of flannel or donated materials, and cutting and sewing 516 baby diapers, mostly from donated t-shirts. (each kit included 4 diapers, two safety pins, 2 blankets, 2 gowns or sleepers, 2 t-shirts, 2 bars each of 4 oz of gentle soap, 2 pairs socks, and a sweater or jacket with hood attached or a separate cap, and a new hand towel.)
- (4) We made 59 Quilts!! Thankfully, even though Covid-19 prevented the LWR volunteers from meeting in person very often to tie our quilts, we improvised and began our "Quilt in a Bag" project. The quilt tops (sewn by volunteers at home), quilts backs (mostly donated gently used bed sheets) and warm and natural batting in between, were assembled and the edges sewn together at home prior to tying. Faithful volunteers would check out a Quilt in a Bag at the church office, tie the quilt, and return it to usually check out another. **Total volunteers hours approximately 1600**.

Total hours volunteered-3,410; Total items sent-4,990.

Total boxes driven to St. Andrews Lutheran Church, ELCA, in Columbia, MO
(the LWR In-Gathering site) ...on September 10, 2021 ... 37 (boxes both Large and Medium sized)

Ordinary items we all take for granted and use every day mean so much to someone who has no towel, toothbrush, nail clipper, soap, or comb. For most of us, our homes contain more than one blanket or quilt to keep us warm; but for so many, a quilt with warm batting is precious for warmth and sometimes used to carry their few possessions as they flee natural disasters or war torn areas. In refugee camps, people sometimes use the quilts to form a shade from the sun or a wall for a little privacy. Baby Care Kits offer a few items for a mother to bathe and clothe her child. LWR is also working with communities to teach them how to become independent of the huge corporations, such as coffee companies. Now in many areas, the community has learned how to manage their own coffee plantations. With the adults tending the coffee process from beginning to shipment, the children of these families often receive a new School Kit so while their parents are working in the coffee plantations, the children are being provided a few school supplies to assist with their education. School Kits are so very precious to a child who has no school supplies.

Lutheran World Relief also offers HOPE, through the many ELCA GOOD GIFTS, which were featured in the Messiah SPIRIT during 2021 and also during six of the Lenten services which featured a SEASON OF HOPE: Sensing Hope, Hearing Hope, Seeing Hope, Smelling Hope, and Tasting Hope. The Messiah Endowment Fund continues to show strong performance from both equity market growth and congregational giving. 2021 saw over \$20,000 in donations, which was an exceptional year in the history of the fund. Higher-than-average gains over the past two years helped push the grant award limit (based on 5-year growth averages) to \$30,800 this year, of which \$29,820 was comfortably awarded. Grants this year included:

Security upgrades (capital)-7,000

Altar Guild silver re-plating (capital)-4,000

Lighthouse creative curriculum (community)-1,520

Holland school playground benches (community)-1,800

Messiah House transition program (community)-2,500

Safe to Sleep (community)-3,500

Lutheran World Relief supplies (mission)-1,500

AV/Music cameras and streaming hardware (mission)-6,500

ELCA seminary scholarships (mission)-1,500

No changes in the investment strategy or grant limit calculations are recommended as the fund appears to be working as intended by the visionaries who established it nearly 30 years ago. The Endowment Committee feels that there is an appropriate balance between the need to fund meaningful projects and the need for continued growth. The current gap between the fund balance and restricted funds (principle) is nearly \$200,000. This cushion is powerful in its ability to create additional funds, while at the same time, protect the original investments by congregational members.

Renewed in Mission

During 2021 there were three significant measures taken that supported Messiah's progress in paying off the debt incurred with the building project completed in 2009. First, in May, a successful appeal to members, Renewed in

Mission, resulted in 80 commitments totaling \$300,932 pledged to be given through June 2024 toward debt retirement. Secondly, in June the loan with

Thrivent Financial was renegotiated with the interest rate significantly decreased from 4.875% interest to 2.6%. Finally, a one-time principal payment of \$40,000, in addition to the regular monthly payments, allowed for a total debt pay down of \$117,268 in 2021. This leaves a debt balance as we begin 2022 of \$670,989.

We are thankful to everyone who has been generous through the years toward our Upon this Rock campaigns. That generosity has provided the attractive and plentiful space from which to live out our Mission. We welcome all to participate in our current campaign, Renewed in Mission. It is critical that all gifts given for Renewed in Mission be indicated as such. This indication ensures that gifts intended for debt retirement are not used for operating expenses.

We continue as people called to share the Gospel in today's world—eliminating debt will expand our freedom to further Messiah's ministry. If there are any questions about Messiah's financial activities related to debt retirement, Rex Johnson welcomes the conversation.
