The passion for travel and learning about cultures, foods and customs has always been a family theme.

"We are a well-travelled family and often have gone to visit relatives in Denmark," said Carla. "Our kids have traveled to Uganda, Ghana, France, Finland, Jordan and El Salvador for pleasure and University internships."



Carla's other travel destinations have included Africa, South and Central America and the Middle East.

During the winter, Brent and Carla and the kids love to go to Roatan for winter holidays. It's a beautiful island in Honduras, where Carla snorkels in the pristine coral reefs and Brent deep sea fishes.

"In the 90's the use of midwives was not easily done, but all of our children were quietly and quickly born at home using midwives," said Carla.

"Our children see the world as their backyard," said Carla. "They all have a vast world view and understanding, their open-mindedness, their compassion for social justice, and inclusion within the 2SLGBTQ+ community is important to all of them."

Each of their children has found their own unique path and have worked hard to create amazing work and life opportunities.

Janelle currently lives in Ottawa and works at the US Embassy. She likes cooking, going for walks, and spending time with her dog, Toby.

Taline and Jay are continuing their graduate studies. Taline lives in Regina and enjoys playing rugby and football and loves her job working with foster children.

Jay lives in Edmonton and is an accomplished violist. He spends a lot of time working on his camper van and camping in the summers.

Kayla is a substitute teacher with the Regina Public School Board, as she prepares to teach in Australia for the upcoming year. She likes being active, reading, and spending time with her friends.

Regina and Albert Park are great places to live and raise a family because of families like the Blakleys, who go out of their way to make this amazing community inclusive for everyone.
