


Mission Possible Update


Mission Possible has been busy this year with two projects in the Dominican Republic. First was the upgrade to the lighting for the TEARS soccer field. Lighting for the field was first installed in 2021. The original design called for 6 poles with lights – but due to global material shortages only 4 were available. In May of 2022 we funded additional lights for the existing poles and see the results below. The teams are now fully able to practice and play in the evening hours. This is a great blessing for the kids of the community.


The second project is the community baseball camp that will run from July 3rd through July 10th. Three mission possible members will be travelling to the Dominican Republic to host this camp. Over the last two years we have collected 100's of baseballs, gloves and shoes along with bats, bases, helmets and other coaching material. We have 9 hockey bags of equipment (50lbs each) ready to make the trip. 76 children will attend the camp, including 19 girls who have never played organized baseball before. It is our hope that the baseball camp leads to an increased participation for those children that cannot afford either the equipment or registration fees today. Please watch for future fundraising events to provide needed materials to support this program.

NEWS FROM ST. ANDREW'S UNITED CHURCH NEWS FROM ST. ANDREW'S UNITED CHURCH

On June 5th, as we continued the sermon series *Where Do We Go From Here?* twenty of us joined Julia as she spoke from Psalm 77. She asked whether we are entrenched or curious as we live life? Some of the statements that I put down from the message include the following we are asked to continue to

ponder: knowing right and doing right are two different things; anxiety can become debilitating; a willingness to be wrong and admit when we are wrong is one of the most loving things we can do; do we admit that we do not have all the answers. The psalmist who wrote Psalm 77 was entrenched in his view of God and required an attitude adjustment. So where do we go from here? We might cultivate curiosity and wonder which leads to expansiveness. So let us cultivate an attitude of curiosity as we experience life to be explored.

After we had sung our final hymn, Julia asked us to be seated as she had a video from Matthew that she wanted us to see. In this video, Matthew told us that for personal reasons he was resigning and that his last day would be Wednesday, August 24th. Our service then concluded with prayer.

On Saturday, June 11th, St. Andrew's United's Strawberry Shortcake Tea was held at Okotoks United Church. As people rushed in through the rain, they were seated and as everyone gathered, we were welcomed by Bonnie and heard Chrissy and Rod sing. After this we enjoyed our tea and strawberry shortcake and conversation among those seated. There was also a bake table. Final financial report yet to come. Thanks to all those who baked, set up, served, greeted, cleaned up, and helped in whatever way. Thanks also to Okotoks United for use of their building's foyer and kitchen for this event.

Sunday, June 12th saw fourteen of us gather with Matthew as he concluded the sermon series by using Psalm 13 which begins "How long, O God...?" Matthew used three concentric circles to describe what we can control in our lives. The smallest circle contains what we can control; the middle circle contains the small number of things we may have influence over in our lives; and the outer larger circle contains all those things we have absolutely no control over in our lives. As we thus move from the larger to the smaller circle we realize there are only a few things that we have control over. This is also where the psalmist moves in Psalm 13. The first stanza of the psalm contains those things we have no control over; the second stanza contains what we might be able to influence in our lives; and the third stanza of the psalm contains the smallest circle of what we can control as we practice gratitude which leads to joy. Thus if we focus on the wrong circle, we will have anxiety. However, if we focus on the smallest circle our anxiety lessens as we practice gratitude. So which circle do we desire to focus on in our daily lives?

A PLACE AT THE TABLE feasting at the theological banquet

A Place at the Table, Chinook Winds Annual Regional Meeting, 2022: Sally Salter and Mark Dutkoski are your representatives to the Chinook Winds Region. This was the first in-person meeting since the pandemic began which caused much excitement among those in attendance (some people attended via ZOOM). The event in Red Deer covered nearly three days, beginning the evening of May 5th and ending with Sunday morning worship on May 8.

Rev. Janet Gear, our theme speaker, spoke about "A Place at the Table: Feasting at the Theological Banquet" in terms of learning the languages of faith (the first language is life). She asked, "What is your faith leading you to do?" because how we live our faith is most important. She also discussed "Hope" – look around and see God's blessing at work. How the church lives expresses what it believes just like how individuals live expresses what they believe. Her final message was "differences do not divide, our judgement of others creates division".

Regional Business

We participated in the business of the region including:

- 1. Overview of the governance model
- 2. Presentation of the Chinook Winds draft Executive Policy Book
- 3. Motions were presented, discussed and passed the intentions of which were:
 - Elect new members to Chinook Winds Executive
 - Chinook Winds Region continue the process of becoming an Affirming Regional Council.
- 4. The work of different Ministries and Missions were explained with the focus of each presentation describing the support they can provide and how to access it.

The vote for Chinook Winds to continue the work towards becoming an Affirming Regional Council was based on the work of the Affirming Working Group of Chinook Winds Region. The Group has been working since 2020 to lead the Regional Affirming Process, discerning with leadership in our region on what it means to be Public, Intentional and Explicit in our declaration of solidarity with the 2S LGBTQAIP+ community and our Affirmation that all people will be included in our Regional ministries, and in all aspects of the Region's life and leadership without limitations based on identity, expression or orientation.
