To whom have we had the privilege of ministering? Missionaries have been coming from far and wide.

Last week we welcomed an American midwife serving in Chad, a French couple transitioning from Mali to Réunion Island, a French family serving in Congo-Brazzaville, a French couple returning from Cambodia, a French family returning from Papua New Guinea, and a Swiss couple planting a church in their home country.


This week we have three families serving in France, and the rest in Belgium, Togo and Switzerland.

While some have simply come for a much-needed rest, others are here for counselling and debriefing, totalling 45 hours of sessions per week for us as a team.

Letting go

Letting go can be a significant challenge when you've spent 18 years serving God in a country that you love, investing in people and projects that have given you as much as you have given them. The sense of loss is real, with all the sadness that it brings for adults and their children.

Sometimes the grief doesn't get processed because emotionally the missionary is still in their country of service even though physically they are back in their sending country. In some cases, a missionary will get emotionally stuck in a kind of no man's land where they have trouble embracing the next stage because they haven't relinquished the previous one.





Team and Family

Our team is keeping well, even if Covid did finally manage to find its way into our little village. Thankfully, we all recovered from our respective bouts.

Our children continue in their respective fields of work. All three have finished their studies.

Stephanie (23) has plenty of work as a camera operator in Scotland. Her film shoots are a mix of TV dramas, feature films, and advertising. **Danilo** (25), who is settled in Dublin, works as a part-time musician, and has another part-time to make ends meet. **Alexi** (27) has plans to join his brother in Ireland, which will be a fresh start for him.
